H A G U E, April 8.

**THE** H. E. Deputation of the States from Amsterdam still continue here, and the Estates of the Province remain assembled, without its being known when they will separate. The Reports here chiefly tend to Peace, because the People wish it, being now in an odd State of Incertitude, that can neither be called Peace nor War; We suffer under all the Evils of the one, without being any wise advantaged by the Blessings of the other. This fills our Heads with various Imaginary and romantick Schemes of the Assistance both we and Great Britain are to expect from Prussia, Russia, Bamberg, Munich and Dresden, all equally probable; but however, serve at once to amuse us, and to divert our Minds from the bitter Reflections, naturally consequent, of too regularly inspecting into our present unhappy Situation.

**Paris, March 12.** Two Officers lately arrived here from Scotland, dispatched by the young Pretender; and they have set forth Things in so favourable a Light, that we begin to talk with more certainty than ever of the speedy Departure of a Squadron from Breist, which, 'tis said, will be joined by some Spanish Men of War, and all the Privateers in this Kingdom that may be willing to assist in this Expedition.

**Portsmouth, March 10.** Three Days after the Arrival of Admiral Medley here, Mr. Desaguliers, the Dutch Consul, went to pay his Compliments to him, and at the same time represented to him, that as there was several Dutch Ships brought in here under divers ill-grounded Pretences, he desired the Admiral would be pleased to release them without Delay, seeing he was confident the King of Great Britain was too just and equitable a Prince to permit any Prejudice to be done to the Ships or Effects of any Power in Friendship and Alliance with him, especially when it made evident, that such Ships had been seized without any just Reason. But Admiral Medley answered Mr. Desaguliers very seriously; That he thought very differently upon this Article: That he had informed himself of the Reasons for which those Ships had been stop'd, and thought them just and equitable: That therefore he looked upon them as good Prizes: That the Persons interested might, if they thought proper, apply to the English Court of Admiralty; but that for his Part, he would not release a single Ship, without express Orders from his Britannick Majesty. Notwithstanding the many other Arguments Mr. Desaguliers made Use of with the Admiral, he was not able to make him change his Opinion.

**Edinburgh, March 17.** Last Week a great Quantity of shells, from the Tower were carried to the Castle.

There are 7 more Store Ships for the Use of the Army at Aberdeen arrived in the Road of Leith, and will sail immediately.

There are Letters which mention several Spies to have been caught at Aberdeen in Women's Habits.

**Glasgow, March 23.** We are told that Fort Augustus was invested on the 23d of February, and made a very good Defence for a Days: But their Magazine of Powder taking Fire, they were obliged to surrender the Garrison consisting of 1200 Men, who were made Prisoners, and sent to the West Coast.

**April 3.** They write from Marseilles, that the English are continually cruising before Barcelona and Cadix, to hinder the Spanish Transports for Italy from executing their Orders.

'Tis assured from Vienna, that the grand Designs of the King of Prussia will very soon appear to be in Favour of the Imperialists, in spite of all that the Emigrants of France give out to the contrary.

**April 10.** We are inform'd, that on Lord Crawford's advancing with a Party of 250 Dragoons, the Rebels raised the Siege of Blair, and retired 12 Miles, to Dalnacardish, leaving the Place in the Possession of Lord Crawford, and the Duke of Atholl.

They tell us from Glasgow, that when a Body of Rebels appeared before Fort William, the Garrison sallied out and kill'd 10, with the Loss of one Man only. — Some Time ago the Crews of two or three Ships of War landed on the West Coast, and burnt 16 Villages belonging to the Camerons, if a Number of their Huts may be so called.

**WILTANESBURG, June 3.**

By Capt. Parker, who sail'd from Whitehaven the 14th of April, we have Advice, That the Duke of Cumberland with his Army was still at Aberdeen, and that he could not march by Reason of the Snow and Ice. That he did not think proper to attack the Rebels till he had receiv'd an additional Reinforcement. That 4,000 Troops were embark'd for Scotland, and 10,000 more marching by Land, to join him. He likewise confirms the News of the King of Sardinia's having taken Asti and Alessandria.

**BOSTON, June 10.**

Saturday last John Fowler, late Boatman of His Majesty's Ship Wager, and John Warren, a Servant Boy belonging to the said ship, receiv'd Sentence of Death, at the Assizes held here, having been twice indicted, tried and found guilty of the Murder of William Conner, who together with James Bryant, both Mariners, was inhumanely stab'd on the 20th of November last.

We have Advice from the Eastward, that on the 14th Instant, a Party of about 20 Soldiers being appointed to guard some of the Inhabitants of Balmouth, while they kill'd their Corn, 3 of them were set as Centinels to look out; but so criminally carelless were they, that one of them lay down, another sat down, and the other fixing his back against a Tree, stood talking with his Companions till they were surprized by a Party of Indians, one of whom had hold on the Soldier that stood against the Tree, and the other two were shot dead before they could rise from the Ground. He that was kill'd by the Indian, was engaged

disengaged himself and ran, but was shot at and wounded in the Arm; however, he and the rest of the English got to the Fort, which was not very far from the Place of Action. In their Retreat they fired upon the Indians, and wounded one of them.

NEW-YORK, June 23.

By a Sloop arrived here last Saturday Night from Montserrat, but last from St Kitts, in 21 Days, from whence the sail'd in Company with a large Fleet homeward bound under Convoy of two Men of War, we learn, that Flour is exceeding scarce and dear in almost all the English Islands, occasion'd by the great Havock made among our Vessels by the French Privateers, who now are grown so bold and numerous as to come daily in Sight of Antigua; and by a Flag of Truce from Martineco, they learn, that there have been 12 Sail of Northern Vessels, besides Europeans, carried in there within a few Days, amongst whom were five from Philadelphia, by which Means Flour was become a mere Drugg at Martineco; that not above one Vessel in 10 bound to Antigua, had escaped falling into their Hands, and that out of Martineco only, they have upwards of 30 Sail of Privateers, and not an English Vessel of Force seen to disturb 'em, except Capt. Richards of this Port, who can't be thought can do much Good among so many.

We have a strong Report from Connecticut, that the Governor of that Colony has just received certain Advice by a private Hand, that one of his Majesty's Ships has taken and brought into Louisburg, a French Man of War of 20 Guns, loaded at Quebec chiefly with Beaver on Account of the Rochelle Company, bound for France, and that a Packet of Letters was found on board, giving an Account that they were in the utmost Distress in Canada for the Want of Salt; that their Magazine of Gun-powder was almost expended; and that if the English should make an Attempt to take them this Year, they should be obliged to surrender.

From the POSTSCRIPT to the Belfast News-LETTER, of the 29th of April, 1746.

From the EDINBURGH COURANTS.

EDINBURGH, April 20.

THE Transports, with the Troops on board from London, are just now seen coming up the Firth.

April 21. Late on Saturday Night, the agreeable News of his Royal Highness the Duke's obtaining a compleat Victory over the Rebels, arrived here. The Dispatches were from Inverness, and contained the following Particulars.

On Wednesday Morning, at 5 o' Clock, his Royal Highness marched from Nairn (12 Miles from Inverness). The Army had several Alarms; but at last the Rebels formed, about a Mile and a half South of the Lord President's House of Culloren; and about 5 Minutes past one the Cannon began to play, which continued very close, on both Sides, for about 25 Minutes: It was visible that our Artillery had the Advantage of that of the Rebels, as it was better served, and did great Execution. The Frasers and Mac Donalds, who composed their right Wing, made an Attack on his Royal Highness's left, and endeavoured to get in Sword in Hand; but were so well received, and the Fire so close and regular, that on the second Discharge, they fell into the utmost Confusion, and fled over an adjacent Hill. The whole of the Rebels followed their Example, and took to their Heels by different Roads, some towards Badenoch, others towards Fort-Augustus, and several by the Roads that lead to Ross-shire. The Duke's Army moved regularly forward; and the Campbells, the Duke of Kingston's right Horse, with the whole Dragoons, pursued, and did great Execution. When the Dispatches came off, the Pursuit was not over; tho' it had continued quite through the Town of Inverness. On the Field of Battle there were about 500 [agreeable to the Account which follows, and is more particular than the Printer, this ought to have been 1500] of the Rebels killed, and as many, as is supposed, by the Campbells and Dragoons in their Flight. Five Pieces of Cannon were found in the Field, and a vast Number of Colours. The Earl of Kilmarnock, Sir John Wedderburn, and the Person styling himself the French Ambassador, are Prisoners, with a great many others, whose Names were not then known.

The Army got to Inverness about 5 that Night, and found many of the Rebels concealed in Houses in their Way; a fine Magazine, and 4 pieces of Cannon, were found in the Town; which now are in Possession of his Royal Highness. Lord George Murray is wounded, Lord Nairn and that Gentleman

fled towards Badenoch. The French Picquets were at Inverness, and on his Royal Highness's Approach, surrender'd Prisoners at Discretion. The Rebels were 7000 strong. His Royal Highness, tho' in the Heat of the Action, is safe and in perfect good Health.

Edinburgh, April 22. The Account of the Victory obtained by his Royal Highness the Duke, over the Rebels, is confirmed. His Highness's Aid de Camp, Lord Bury, was dispatch'd at 7 o'Clock at Night, when the Action happened, with the News to his Majesty: He took the Advantage of the Shark Sloop, with a Design to have reached Newcastle; but the Wind proving contrary, he landed Yesterday at North-Berwick, from whence he sent an Account to this Place, and proceeded directly to London. — The Particulars which we have hitherto learned are, That the Battle did not last above half an Hour; during which Time no Quarter was given on either Side; and was exceeding bloody: That 1000 of the Rebels lay dead upon the Spot, and about 200 were killed and wounded on the King's Side. Capt. Grassie is killed, Col. Rich is wounded. The Regiments which distinguish'd themselves most, were Barclay's and Monro's; and it is particularly remarked, that the Scotch Regiments behaved with an extraordinary Bravery. The Earl of Ancrum saved Lord Kilmarnock's Life, who is now a Prisoner. The greatest Part of the Rebel Chiefs are killed or taken: It is particularly written, that amongst the former are Lochal, Duke of Perth, Lord Starhallan, and Lord Ogilvie; and amongst the latter, Sir A. Wedderburn, Lord Nairn, John Murray, Esq; Lord Lewis Drummond, Son to the Earl of Melfort, &c. &c. &c. The young Pretender is said to be wounded, and had fled thro' Inverness, pursued by the Light-Horse.

An Addition to this agreeable News is, that 400 Rebels and 300 French are Prisoners; and further, that the Lord Cromarty, who had sometime before been sent to destroy Lord Rea's Country, with about 100 Men, had been taken by his Lordship's and the Earl of Sutherland's Militia. The Battle was so desperate, that the Soldiers Bayonets were staid with the Rebels Blood up to the Muzzles of their Muskets; and the Streets of Inverness run with the Blood of those who were slain in the Pursuit.

*A Copy of a Letter from a Gentleman in the Army, to his Friend in this City, dated at Inverness the 16th Instant.*

At the last we have done it. — The Rebels have this Day met with a confounded Drubbing. — The Duke and all our Generals are well. — Lord Robert Ker is wounded; Col. Rich has lost his left Hand; Capt. Grassie, I am told, is among the slain: Our Loss otherwise is very inconsiderable. — Of the Rebels are a d—n'd Number kill'd, and an innumerable Number of Prisoners. Among the last is Lord Kilmarnock, Lord Lewis Gordon, and John Murray, &c. &c. &c. &c.

BELFAST, April 29.

*Extract of a Letter from Glasgow, April 24.*

"On Wednesday last there was a Battle between the two Armies, which began about 7 in the Morning; and tho' the Rebels rallied four Times, the Duke was victorious. The Battle was fought on a Moor, two Miles from Inverness, and was disputed by the Rebels with a great deal of Courage; but they could not stand it."

The Gentleman who brought the Letters from Edinburgh, says there was Express after Express coming in. By this Days Express there are Letters from Gentlemen in Aberdeen, who were Eye-witnesses to the Action, that the Rebels stood twenty-five Minutes before the Dukes Cannon, before they engaged; and when the Cannon ceased, they came down Sword in hand, as at Falkirk; but receiving the whole Fire of the Lines, they fled immediately to Inverness, whither the Duke follow'd, and storm'd the Place.

All the Letters mention the Lords Kilmarnock, Murray, Ogilvie, Elcho, and Duke of Perth, being taken Prisoners. The Duke, we hear, behaved nobly, and gave his Orders with the greatest Calmness of Mind imaginable.

*A Letter from Inverary, dated April 20.*

**S**OME Posts ago I wrote you a pretty full Account of the Siege of Fort William, and the Behaviour of our Countrymen who were garrison'd there, and obliged the Rebels to leave that Place with discredit and loss of Men. Now I am to give you the news of the total defeat of that rascally Crew by the memorable Duke of Cumberland on Wednesday; having first promised, that these Villians had about a Month ago surprized 300 of our countrymen who were left by the Duke in the Braes of Athol, to protect the country, killed some, wounded many, and made the rest their Prisoners. That corps was commanded by Ardenstiff, Carraig, Kildalvan, Balcoyle, Dougald Campbell, Inveraw's Brother, young Rab Royban, young Birdisle, James Duncanson of this town, and Lieut. Archd. Campbell late of Danna: These Gentlemen were brought to Fort Augallus, and thence to Inverness, where they were barbarously treated and confined for above three weeks, to force them into the Pretender's service; but they swore they'd all go to hell bodily, e're they'd draw a sword for him. In that condition they were till Tuesday last, that the rebels, terrify'd for the great army under his Royal Highness then within three miles of Inverness, and not able to guard their prisoners, or leave so many of their army behind, allowed the gentlemen above mentioned to return home. They luckily escaped a trap was laid for cutting them all to pieces, and arrived here on Saturday safe, to the joy of friends and true Britons. One of them told me, our Highlanders at Fort William killed so many rebels as filled thirteen waggons that were driven off to Leharbar.

It's already mentioned that the rebels had about 300 private men from this shire made prisoners in Athol, except a few, who afterwards escaped; and about 200 of Lord Loudon's men, who were surprized in Sutherlandshire; both which were of signal service to his Highness the Duke in the action of Wednesday; for they, on their march to meet him, drew in a body in the center of the rebels army, and having sworn to be faithful to each other, they resolved, as soon as the armies engaged, to face on the rebels, and join their friends; which happened accordingly, and help'd to give the rebels the first shock.

But to the purpose.—As soon as the Weather permitted, the Duke of Cumberland left Aberdeen, and advanced towards the Spey, making the Argyleshiremen under Col. Campbell his advanced guard.—At Kieth, 80 Campbells on a picquet guard, were

attacked by 300 Rebels; they were beaten out of the town to the churchyard, and thence to the church, and there defended themselves an hour and half before they surrend'r'd; and when made prisoners, tho' the skirmish lasted 3 hours, they only had 9 men of the 80 killed; whereas there were 37 Rebels lying dead in the churchyard, and 13 in the streets of Kieth: However the Rebels carried away these prisoners, which they soon repented, as it fired the Campbells the more to rescue their friends and countrymen, and take blood for blood when they came to action.

From Keith the Duke advanc'd to the banks of the River Spey on Tuesday last, where were observ'd 3000 Rebels encamp'd on the other side to oppose his passing the water; He immediately ordered the cannon to be planted to dislodge the rebels, and to cover some troops who were to ford the river. The Argyleshiremen were desired to march over; and accordingly they waded, wavel deep, thro' the river, followed and supported by the Duke of Kingston's light horse. By this time the great guns had pretty much scatter'd the Rebels, and the light horse then attacking that of the rebels, while the Campbells assaulted their foot, they soon routed the scoundrels. They were much crush'd by Kingston's horse; and our short kills so effectually ended their Job, that the Duke of Perth's regiment of 1000 Men, who made the best resistance, were taken or killed; so nicely, that only the Duke himself, and a servant, of the whole brigade, escaped.

The Royal army having come thro' the water, proceeded on two miles, where a small body of the rebels who had intrenched there, were routed; and having come on four miles further that night, the army halted and refreshed.

Next day, being Wednesday, they marched; and within four miles of Inverness they spied the Rebels, in number about 9 or 10,000, drawn up in line of battle on the hill side. The royal army advanced to cannon shot, and formed in 3 lines, having the Argyleshire men thrown in snugly 'twixt the first and second ranks, to support any breach.

The armies cannonaded some time, and both advanced near enough for small arms; when the Duke ordered the second and third lines to fire, each line together, which they did very successfully: the rebels imagined the whole army had spent their fire; and, having given a full discharge of arms and hurra, they threw down their guns and plads, drew their swords, and came like furies on the Duke's army, expecting to break and massacre them as they did Cope's army at Preston; but while they were advancing on, his Highness made the first line fire their bayonets, and take a posture for resistance, which they did instantly, and so firm, that the rebels could not displace one man, though hacking on the barrels of their musquets; and the front line, having their shot reserved, poured it into the rebels breasts, who stood at the points of their bayonets, and brought them down like sterlings. They reeled and cried at this (saying) and getting just then the whole fire of the Argyleshire army, posted as before mentioned, and who had also kept up their shot, they run away like devils: as soon as they broke, the Argyleshire men were ordered to pursue with the dragon's, and accordingly drove after them with the broad sword; they soon came up with them, and being joined by their friends that were prisoners with the rebels, and who had played the devil with so many as stood about them as soon as they engaged, they continued pursuing and slaughtering for four miles, and could not be restrained by their officers (tho' interceding to stop so long as they had day light to pursue; so full of revenge they were for the loss and death of their countrymen, that were destroyed by the rebels and French.

The loss on our side is incredibly small; but you never heard such slaughter as the Campbells made by the sword, and the regulars by their well-timed fire. One of our countrymen has got his hand dislocated by a stroke at one of 'em, where-with he cut away the man's face, belly, and thro' one of his thighs, quits at the knee! He owns he broke two swords that day doing execution, and had the third a French blade, where-with he wrested his hand, and then dropt it.

Their unlucky prince made his escape, with only 8 attendants, begging none would throng after him so as to discover him or prevent his escape; and the rest scattered in small bodies to all corners of the country; and I believe 1500 or 2000 men will go to-day from this to seek out for any of them who take this road. They want money and provisions, so that they must rob and steal for subsistence. And now, I think we'll destroy that nest of Scots Tories, and people a good country with loyal subjects.

Of our side are very few killed, some wounded dangerously and some slightly; but of the rebels about 3000 are killed on the field and in the pursuit, and a prodigious number wounded and made prisoners. Few or no gentlemen have escaped, as they prefer'd dying in the field to hanging on a gibbet. There are killed by this day's accounts, Duke of Perth, Earls Killmarnock, Nairn, Pittligo, Elcho, Ogilvy, Cromarty, Strathallen and his Son, Lords John Drummond and Lewis Gordon, and the Master of Lovat and General Stapleton, both Lochiels, Dangallon, Keppoch, Clanronald, Glengary, Lochgarry, Clunie, Struan, Acher, Ardheal, Innernahoyll, Torcastle, the Laird of Mc Lachlan, Kinneuchannch, and young Janiscuchonnull, all rebels, and many more that a sheet cannot contain. I am, &c.

P. S. Since writing the above we have another confirmation of the action in the above circumstances, with this addition of Lord George Murray's being found among the heather all mangled, and that the cruel execution among the rebels was owing in a great measure to their having shipp'd off for France forty three of our countrymen made prisoners at Keith and Athol. [Thus far the News-Letter.]

#### BOSTON, June 19.

Last Tuesday Capt. Long arrived at Marblehead, in about 8 Weeks from Cagliari on the Island of Sardinia, and 7 Weeks from Gibraltar: Capt. Long came to Town Yesterday, and confirms the good News of the Successes of the victorious King of Sardinia in Italy, against the allied Armies of France and Spain; and informs us, as Fact, That in the Month of March last, the said King's Troops being in Four separate bodies in Lombardy, at about 40 Miles Distance of each other, watching the Motions of so many Divisions of the Enemies Army, happen'd to attack them in every Quarter on one Day, and at about the same Time, and entirely routed each Party; who flying before the King of Sardinia's Troops towards the opposite Division of their Army for Relief, came together in Confusion in the Centre, where they were entirely defeated; above 4000 of the French taken Prisoners, and more of the Spaniards, great Numbers of them kill'd and wounded, with the Loss of almost all their Provision, Baggage, Arms, Ammunition, &c. the Infante Don Philip narrowly escaping; that the Remnant of the French Troops fled to the Mountains of Genoa for Safety, and the Spaniards towards Naples.—That this glorious Victory was obtain'd by the King of Sardinia's own Forces, the Austrian Army sent by the Empress Queen of Hungary to his Assistance, having been much retarded in their March by the unusual Severity of the Season; but as they had got very near, and consisted of about 30,000 Men, 'tis tho't the King of Sardinia, upon their Junction, with the Assistance of

the British Fleet, will be able to humble the Pride of France and Spain, and bring them to his own Terms.

Capt. Long also informs, That the Spanish Fleet consisting of 15 or 16 Sail of Men of War continu'd in the Harbour of old Carthage; and that Admiral Medley with most of his Squadron were at Gibraltar, careening and refitting.

#### NEW-YORK, June 30.

Saturday Morning an Express arrived here to his Excellency our Governor, from the Honourable Brigadier-General Gooch at Virginia; which, 'tis said, brings Advice, that that Gentleman intends to set out for this Place about the 12th of July.

#### Extract of a Letter from Caracas, dated June 11.

Just now a Sloop arrived here from Eustatia, who brings us the News, that a Vessel was arrived there from Holland in 5 Weeks, with an Account, that an outward bound French Fleet of ships had been met with and engaged by an English Fleet; in which the former were defeated, and a great Number of their Vessels taken.

What seems to give Credit to the above Letter, is a Report brought here by the Post from Boston, who says, that after he came out, he was overtaken by a Person just come in from Louisburg, in a small coasting Vessel; who assur'd him, that they had spoke with a Ship on the Coast, from England, which told them she came out in company with 9 Sail of Men of War and several Transports, all bound for the intended Expedition against Canada; and that in their Passage they fell in with a Fleet of French Merchantmen, consisting of upwards of 100 Sail, outward bound; under Convoy of 4 Men of War; with whom they immediately engaged, and had either taken or destroyed the greatest Part of them.—'Tis added, that several of those taken were bound for Canada, laden with Salt, Ammunition, &c. and as this Report is generally believed, we hope to hear it confirm'd; which will add fresh Life to the common Cause here, where the Levies for the intended Expedition go on bravely.

The SPEECH of his Excellency THOMAS BLADEN, Esq; Governor and Commander-in chief in and over the Province of Maryland, at the Prorogation of the General Assembly of the said Province, on Tuesday July 8, 1746.

Gentlemen of the Lower House of Assembly,

**Y**OU may always assure yourselves of my being greatly pleased with every real Disposition you shew, of Loyalty to his Majesty, and Compliance with his Royal Commands; but certainly the Act passed this Session, for substituting and conveying the Levies, would have been more agreeable to his Majesty's Directions, of raising as many as we could, if the Bounty had not been confined to three hundred: And I should have found it more practicable to conform to his Majesty's Order, in providing Cloaths for such Men, if you would have consented, any surplus Money, more than what was necessary for the express Purposes of that Act, might have been made use of for such Occasion of Cloaths, to be replaced by the Allowance directed by his Majesty to be made by General St. Clair: Nor do I understand why this Surplus was refused by you, to be applied to so necessary a Purpose as cloathing the Troops; when such an Application would have been only lending, for the Good of the Service, Part of the Money given.

At the same Time that I take this Opportunity of desiring you to be satisfied of my never having entertained the least Thought of infringing your Privileges in any Respect, I must also acquaint you, that I very heartily wish some Reports of a new and dangerous Doctrine (*viz.* The more Confusion, the better,) which in no Sense can be allowed to be within the Privilege and Freedom of Speech, may prove groundless; and that I may never be forced, by the Duty of my Station, to the disagreeable Necessity of taking Notice of any Words spoken in your House, which no Rule of Parliament can privilege.

Gentlemen of the Upper and Lower Houses of Assembly,

As I have now, on my Part, passed all the Laws offered me this Session, I hope you will, on your's, do every Thing for promoting the Peace of your several Counties, and a due Observation of the Laws.

PETERSBURG, April 5.

**T**HE Troops of the Empire are marching from all Parts into Livonia; and there are already in that Province near 30,000 Men. There has been sent to Riga a considerable Train of Artillery, and more are ordered thither. The irregular Troops, Cossacks, and Calmucks, which are drawn from the Ukraine, are arrived in Livonia, and cantoned on the Frontiers of Poland.

The Ministers of Great-Britain, Vienna, and Dresden, are every Day in Conference with the Great Chancellor Count Beustsch, on the Subject of a new Treaty, which is in a train of being soon concluded. As is likewise the Treaty with Denmark, in relation to the Affair of Sleswick.

*Chambery, April 5.* We are here under the greatest Apprehension of a Visit from the Piedmontese, as we are inform'd the King of Sardinia has resolved to reconquer this Duchy.

*Bologna, April 6.* We just now hear that about 1200 Spaniards, who remained on the Side of Fuentes and Lac Maggiora, having not had Time to retire and join the Infant's Army, have been made Prisoners by the Austrians.

*Turin, April 9.* The Artillery sent to Valenza is arrived there, and several Batteries are raised; so that the Place will soon be attacked in Form. Two hundred Gunners, and several Miners, are gone to be employed in that Siege.

*Vienna, April 15.* We are every Moment in Expectation of an Express, with the News of the Success of the Enterprize of General Brown, who has invested Parma, and cut off the Retreat of the Marquis de Castellar, who is shut up in that City with 500 Spaniards. We have it from very good Hands, that the Republic of Genoa is in great Consternation at the Turn which the Affairs of Lombardy are taking, and apprehensive that it's Dominions will become the Theatre of War. It's even suspected, that it is endeavouring to find out the Means of reconciling itself with the Imperial Court; and the rather, because the Marquis de Spinola, heretofore Minister from Genoa, to whom Leave was given to remain here by reason of his ill State of Health, was carried a few Days ago *incognito* to the House of one of the principal Ministers of the Court, with whom he had a long Conference. Several Expedients have been talk'd of, which 'tis said he has propos'd; and, amongst others, to pay a large Sum of Money.

*Hanover, April 19.* The Troops of this Electorate, which are to march into the Low Countries, are already in Motion; and in about a Week's Time will be in full March, so as to arrive in Brabant before the End of May.

*Lyons (in France), April 6.* All the regular Troops which were here, march'd the 30th past for Italy, and their Place is supplied by the Burghers. Commerce is here in a very bad State, and we look upon public Affairs to be no better. The Piedmontese have had the Assurance to make Excursions as far as Vachette, a Village about a League and half from Biancon. They had form'd a Design of surprizing that Town; but that Attempt failing, they avenged themselves by burning it to the Ground, to the great Prejudice of the Country. By the last Accounts from Italy, Affairs were there in a Confusion not to be express'd.

*Brussels, April 18.* General Lowendahl, pursuant to his Orders from Court, is making great Preparations for the opening of the Campaign; and the French Troops are in motion on all Sides, in order to form the Army. The States of Brabant have orders to furnish, under Pain of military Execution, two hundred thousand Rations, before the 20th, for the Use of the King's Troops. They write from Ghent, that 150 Pieces of Cannon are soon expected there, with a great Quantity of Ammunition.

*Moslin, April 21.* The Army of the Allies will be formed in two or three Days, and will be so disposed, and Measures so well taken, as that it will be in a Condition of opposing all the Enemies Enterprizes.

*Bruges, April 23.* The French Troops which were quarter'd at Dunkirk, Boulogne, Calais, Nieuport, Offend, &c. are in full March towards Brussels; and but very small Garrisons remain in those Places.

## L O N D O N .

*April 19.* It is said, that the Money taken from the Hazard Sloop, in the Bay of Tongue, has by his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland's Order been distributed; viz. 500 l. to Capt. Mackay, who seized her; 50 l. to the Commander of the Sheerness Man of War, who forced her on shore; and in proportion to the other Officers; and that the rest was distributed to the Crew of the Sheerness and Capt. Mackay's Men, amounting to five Guineas each Man.

There are twelve Pieces of Cannon, of 24 Pounds each, put on board a Ship at the Tower, with a considerable Quantity of Gunpowder, Ball, &c. designed for Cape-Breton.

It is reported, that a Person of Distinction has been here for some Days past, with a Commission of Importance from a certain Court.

On Friday Night the Right Honourable the Earl of Dunmore, who was left Commander of the British Forces in Flanders, arrived at his House in Hanover Square, from Holland; and on Saturday he waited on his Majesty at St. James's.

The Right Honourable the Earl of Rothes has now the Command of the Forces in Flanders.

Yesterday Mr. Ratcliffe, jun. and the other Officers, who were lately discharged from the Tower, embarked on board a Ship in the River for France.

We are informed, that the Right Hon. the Lords of the Admiralty were pleas'd Yesterday to send for Admiral ———, at which Time their Lordships struck his Name off the List of Admirals.

At the Court-Martial on board the Prince of Orange, at Deptford, the following Persons were last Week examined on Behalf of the Crown, on the Tryal of Vice-Admiral Lestock; viz.

On Monday, Capt. Thomas Drummond, who commanded the Cambridge at the Engagement in the Mediterranean; and Mr. Legge, a Lieutenant of the Elizabeth:

On Wednesday, Capt. Richard Jasper, then fifth Lieutenant of Admiral Matthews's Ship; Capt. Philip Tom, then second Lieutenant of the Norfolk; John Townes, master of the Oxford; and Thomas Graves, second Lieutenant of the Romney:

On Thursday, Mr. Roger Jones, first Lieutenant of the Romney; and Capt. John Towry, who then commanded the Buckingham.

And on Friday, Capt. George Berkley, of the Revenge. The Court adjourn'd to Yesterday Morning, 9 o'Clock.

There have been already examined, on Mr. Lestock's Tryal, 36 Witnesses; and there still remain to be examined 52, in Support of the Charge against the Prisoner.

Besides the Money already mentioned to have been found on board the Hazard Sloop of War, there have since been discovered 1000 French Guineas; besides several other large Sums, which were concealed in diverse Places of that Vessel.

The Empress of Russia has not yet declared her Mind, with regard to her Accession to the Treaty of Dresden, which has been demanded by the British and Prussian Ministers. The Troops of this Princess in and about Livonia, which are all ready for Action, are computed at about 70 or 80,000 Men.

Dublin, April 26. Wednesday Morning last, about eight o' Clock, his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, and his Lady the Countess of Chesterfield, embarked on board the Dublin Yatcht with a fair Wind, for England; and landed safely at Parkgate the next Morning about Ten, in good Health.

The Hanoverian Forces contracted for, and which are to serve in Flanders this Campaign, are 5000 Horse, and 13000 Foot; and the Queen of Hungary is to furnish 50,000 Men, to act in conjunction with them and the Dutch, for which her Imperial Majesty is allowed a Subsidy of 400,000 Pounds.

B O S T O N, June 20.

Last Wednesday arrived here Capt. Saunders, in the Country Sloop, from the Eastward, and brings Advice from St. George's That about a Fortnight ago 13 of the Soldiers belonging to the Garrison there, being at some small Distance from the Fort, a Rivulet running between, divided into two Parties, one of the Parties consisting of 5 Men, carelessly lay down their Guns, and strol'd a little way from them; about 7 or 8 of the Enemy Indians which were skulking about, perceiving it, intercepted and got between them and their Arms, which they seiz'd and firing upon them, kill'd one of them named Timothy Cummings, wounded another, and carried another off, the rest escaped under the Fire of the Garrison; the other Party retreated as fast as they could, and all-soon got to the Garrison, except an old Man, who could walk but slowly; one of the Salvages seeing him, came up so near as to lift up his Hatchet in order to dispatch him at once, but the Man having his Gun charg'd turn'd about and presenting it, shot the Indian Dead upon the Spot; and being within the reach of the Guns at the Fort, which kept off the other Indians from molesting him, he stay'd and scalp'd him; and we hear the Scalp is brought to Town.

We are inform'd, That Yesterday was se'en-night about 100 of the Indian Enemy assaulted 10 Men, who were at Work within sight of Fort Massachusetts at Hoosuck, in the County of Hampshire, and kill'd Elisha Nims, and a Soldier who went from Marlborough, wounded Gershom Hawks in the Arm, one Perry escaped and went to Fort Pelham; the other Men with great Resolution fought their Way to the Fort, some firing 5 or 6 Times on the Enemy; one of the Indians was shot dead not far from the Fort: The Enemy being so much Superior to the Number of Men in the Fort, lying round them till the Evening, they could not go forth to scalp the Indians that were killed.

Yesterday arriv'd a Vessel at Marblehead from Louisbourg, having but a short Passage, by which we hear, that Admiral Warren having embark'd in the Chester Man of War, for this Place, had sail'd; and having been out three Days met his Majesty's Sloop Hinchinbrook, with Dispatches, whereupon he immediately put back, and had got into Louisbourg Harbour before this Vessel came away.

A N N A P O L I S.

On Wednesday last died here, after a very short Illness, Mrs. ALICIA ROSS, Wife of JOHN ROSS, Esq; of this City. She was a good Wife, a tender Parent, a sincere Friend,

and a kind Neighbour, so that her Death is greatly lamented by all her Acquaintance.

We hear from Dorchester County, that Mr. Daniel Sullivan is Elected a Representative for that County, in the room of Mr. Francis Lee made Clerk of Cecil County.

On Friday last one Anne Newman was committed to Prison, here, on a strong suspicion of Murdering her Bastard Child.

On the 6th Instant at Night, the Schooner Peggy, belonging to Hampton in Virginia, bound to this Place with Passengers, was struck by Lightning, near Sharp's Island; the Main Mast was rent in pieces from Top to Bottom; and ten Persons on board, being struck by the same Lightning, lay for some Time as dead, but happily coming to themselves, they were seized with violent Vomiting, and the Cabin was fill'd with a strong Smell of Sulphur.

By a Vessel, which arrived at Oxford last Saturday, we have English Prints to the 12th of May; which mention the great Rejoicings in all Parts of England, for the late Victory over the Rebels: That 2600 of them were killed on the Field of Battle, and in the Pursuit; with the Loss only of 47 Men killed on the King's Side, and 258 wounded: That the young Pretender is strolling in the Camerons Country, with about 20 or 30 Followers: That in Flanders the Allied and French Armies are in Sight of each other, and a Battle daily expected: &c. &c. The Particulars of the Battle between the Duke and the Rebels, with the other News contained in those Papers, must be postponed, by reason of their coming too late to hand.
