P A R I S, December 19.

THE Judgment pronounced against several of our Officers employed in Canada, and who misbehaved there, is made public; most of them are condemned to Banishment for a certain Time, some more, some less; except the Sieur Bigot, Intendant of that Province, whose Banishment is made perpetual. They are moreover condemned to make Restitution of several Sums in Proportion to the Frauds they have been found Guilty of: The Sieur Bigot is to restore 4,500,000 Livres; the Sieur Varian, Director of the Marine at Montreal 800,000; M. Bread, Comptroller of the Marine, 300,000; M. Cadet, Purveyor-General of the Army 600,000; Pennyfiant, Maurin, and Corpon, Commissaries under Cadet, 600,000 each; Estabe and Martel, Keepers of Magazines, the former 30,000, and the latter 200,000; the Commandant, Laudriere, 5000; Dechainaux, Secretary to the Intendant Bigot, 30,000. In all 12,965,000 Livres.

L O N D O N, December 20.

The greatest Number of Ships ever known, are now fitting out in the River for the East-Indies, most of them new; they are to carry over a considerable Number of Land Forces.

Dec. 27. It is reported, that a Man of War found in Chaleurs Bay a Number of French Vessels, which being contrary to the Treaty, he fired and took them.

Tuesday Evening a young Lady, who, when at Age, will have a Fortune of upwards of Twenty Thousand Pounds, eloped with a Clergyman. She went from her Guardian's about four o'Clock, in order to go to the Play; but it is thought they went away directly for Scotland, her Guardian receiving a Letter from her the next Morning, in which were these Words: *Love has the Wings of a Dove, and I shall be got too far to be overtaken.*

Dec. 29. By a Letter from Dublin, dated the 20th Inst. we are informed, that the House of Commons of Ireland have voted an humble Address to his Majesty, condemning the North Briton, No. 45; and approving of the Peace, as honourable, advantageous, and adequate.

Jan. 3. The Louisa, of and from St. Maloes for Africa, of 300 Tons, who had been 150 Leagues to the Westward of Plymouth, was, by contrary Winds, forced back to that Place, and on Monday Night was drove on shore a little to the Westward of Plymouth Harbour; both the Ship and Cargo are entirely lost, and only five of the Crew are saved.

Jan. 14. Above 400,000 l. has been remitted the last Year into France, to support our People of Distinction, who have resided there.

The only authentic Account which has appeared of the late Affair in the East-Indies, is as follows: It seems to have come from the East-India Company.

"The Intelligence lately received from the East Indies, of Disturbances in the Province of Bengal, and the Causes of them; being variously related and misrepresented, we are sorry to acquaint our Readers, that we have good Authority to say, those Disturbances have risen chiefly, if not wholly, from the very unjustifiable Conduct of some of the Company's Servants, whose continual Abuses of the Company's Authority, to their own private Emolument, and to the Prejudice of the just Rights of the Country Government, which neither the prudent Remonstrances, nor the disinterested Example of the Governor [Mr. Vansittart, Brother to Miss Vansittart, Maid of Honour to the Princess of Wales] were able to restrain; having provoked the Nabob to some violent Measures on his part, have at length, as was perhaps at first intended, produced an open Rupture.

"On the 23d of June, Mr. Ellis, the Chief of the Company's Factory at Patna, thought fit to put himself at the Head of a considerable Body of the Company's Troops, and, upon what Provocation does not appear, to attack the City, which was carried with great Slaughter of the Inhabitants, and given up to Plunder. The [Indian] Governor of Patna making his Escape, joined a Party of the Nabob's Forces, who were marching to his

Relief, and hearing of the Disorder into which the English in the Town were fallen, attacked, and entered it sword in Hand, sparing none who were found in Arms. Ellis, with 3 or 400 Men, Europeans and Seapoys, escaped, and crossed the River.—The very Day this Misfortune happened, Mr. Amyat, who had been deputed from the Council at Calcutta to treat with the Nabob, and to dispose him to comply with the Demands they had thought fit to make on him, and who had attended the Nabob at Mongeer for that Purpose, accompanied with several other Gentlemen of the Factory, not succeeding in the Business of his Embassy, took his Leave of the Nabob, having received the necessary Passports to return to Calcutta, and set out in Boats with his Party, consisting of Messrs. Amphlett, Wollaston, Crooke, and Hutchinson, and the Lieutenants Jones, Gordon, and Cooper, with two Companies of Seapoys, and Twenty European Horsemen. Soon after their Departure, News arriving at Mongeer of what had passed at Patna, this unfortunate Party were followed by some of the Nabob's Troops, and, as is supposed, by his Orders; they were overtaken on the 3d of July near Muxadavad, and it is feared all, but Mr. Amphlett, who was carried bound to the Nabob, were cut to Pieces.

"Upon Advice of these Incidents at Calcutta, the Council took upon them to set up Meer Jaffer, the Nabob formerly deposed, [the same who gave Lord Clive his great Fortune] the Company's whole Force was ordered to take the Field; under the Command of Major Adams, who was advanced as far as Cutwa, when the last Advices left him, and there was little doubt of his Success. It is hoped therefore, that long before now these Commotions have subsided, and that the Tranquillity of the Country is re-established."

Feb. 11. Tuesday and Wednesday last several poor Prisoners were discharged from the Marshalsea, by Virtue of a charitable Donation of 500 l. left for that Purpose by the Princess of Brunswick, before she left England; 500 l. was likewise left by her Royal Highness, for the Discharge of Prisoners in Whitechapel Goal.

A Repeating Watch, in a Ring, is making for his Majesty, by Mr. Arnold, in Devereux Court, Temple-Bar. This curious Piece of Mechanism is less in Circumference than a Silver Two pence; it repeats the Hours, Quarters, and Half-quarters, and runs upon Diamonds; the horizontal Wheel and Pinions are equal in Weight only to the 16th Part of a Grain of Gold, and the Pendulum and Spring equal in Weight only to the 200th Part of a Grain.

Jan. 12. Orders are given for building two Men of War at Woolwich, one of 90 Guns, and the other of 74; the former to be called the Queen, and the other the Canada; the Keels of both will be soon laid.

January 14. Yesterday a Bill of Indictment, for a pretended Theft of Papers belonging to Mr. Wilkes, was preferred to the Grand Jury for the County of Middlesex, by Mr. Wilkes's Friends, against Mr. Curry, one of the Witnesses to prove the Publication of the Essay on Woman, which the House of Lords has declared to be a wicked and blasphemous Libel; and the Republication of the North Briton, which both Houses of Parliament have declared to be a seditious Libel, aspersing every Branch of the Legislature, and tending to raise traitorous Insurrections against his Majesty's Government; but the Grand Jury, consisting of Gentlemen of Rank and Character, returned the said Bill *ignoramus*.

The Charming Kitty Schooner, William Conolly, Master, from St. Kitt's to Senegal, was taken by a Xebeque of Sallee, off the Western Isles, on the 24th of July last, under pretence that Capt. Conolly had no Mediterranean Pass, which, as the Vessel was only on the Trade from the West-Indies to Guinea, was needless, since those Ships do not come near the Straits. The Master of the Xebeque beat him cruelly, to force him to confess himself a Portuguese; and afterwards he was forced by Threats of Death, to sign a Certificate that the Salletine had taken nothing from them, though the Vessel had then been plundered of every Thing of Value. On the 28th of August at Noon

they came to an Anchor at Barbary, where they were again rifled. On the 2d of Sept. the Captain was taken out of his Bed, where he had been confined by Sickness some Weeks, and he and his Crew sent naked on Shore to an old Castle, and thence carried to Saffee; where the young Prince, being assured they were English, suffered them to go to the Houses of the Dutch and Danish Merchants, where they were well used, and from whence Mr. Conolly wrote a very long Account to Mr. Popham, our Consul General at Tetuan; but he died the 23d of Sept. at Saffee, from the cruel Treatment he had received.

The Bills of Paper Money which the French have circulated in Canada; and which, by the late Treaty of Peace, the French King engaged to clear, amounts to 250,000 l.

Jan. 17. Saturday was tried, by the Commissioners of the Court of Requests (commonly called the Court of Conscience) at Guildhall, a Cause betwixt a Citizen of London, and the Master of a Circulating Library, who was summoned for selling a spurious Pamphlet, called, An Essay on Woman, for that said to be printed by Mr. Wilkes; when after a very short Hearing, the Pamphleteer was ordered to return the Purchase-money, and pay all Costs; and was severely reprimanded for being concerned in so mean a Scheme.

Newcastle, Jan. 28. A few Days since a Gentleman of this Town, having a Suspicion that some of the Copies of an Essay lately published, which is a Scandal to Humanity, were in the Hands of some of the Booksellers here, went to each of them to enquire for a Copy; and finding a few in the Possession of only one of them, he, after getting all he had, paid for them, and instantly burnt them in the Shop, telling him, he hoped such a Scandal to the Press would never again be in his Possession.

B O S T O N, April 2.

Extra of a Letter from a Gentleman in London, dated February 12, 1764.

"A Change in the Ministry is expected, when 'tis said, Mr. Pitt, Mr. Legge, the Duke of Devonshire, Charles Townshend, Sir William Meredith, and Sir George Sackville, are to succeed George Grenville, Lord Egmont, the Duke of Bedford, Lord Sandwich, and Lord Hillsborough."

A large Catt of 700 Tons, a Transport from America with Troops, was lost on the Welch Hook on the English Coast, and every Soul perished.—Upwards of 30 Sail of Vessels have been lost on the same Coast and all the Crews perished.

N E W - Y O R K, April 9.

We can acquaint our Readers, from undeniable Authority, with some more Particulars respecting the Indian War.

Capt. Bull, with his Party of 13 Men, was escorted from the German Flats, by a Guard of Provincials. Bull's Second remains wounded at Aughquaga, under the Care of the Indians there, to whom Sir William Johnson has given five Prisoners, on Account of their good Behaviour: He has also distributed the rest amongst the Friendly Nations; putting them in the Places of their deceased Relations, which is an Indian Custom they always expect will be followed.

Capt. Bull, with his Party, resided at Kanestio; the Indians of which Village have been all along in Arms. He made large Offers of delivering up many English Prisoners, on his being set at Liberty.

Sir William Johnson, since the Prisoners were brought to him, has received Advice of the Success of a Party of ten Friend Indians, falling in with a Party of nine Delawares last Month, on the Frontiers of Pennsylvania, directing their Course against some Settlements, and singing their WAR SONGS; upon which the Friend Indians attacked them, killed the Head of the Party, and took three Prisoners, who (with the Scalps) were hourly expected at Sir William's. This is a lucky Circumstance; the Indians being once engaged in Blood, must carry on the War with great Alacrity, as the rest will never forgive them, nor will they probably stop till they have destroyed these troublesome People, who have annoyed all the northern

L O N D O N, January 18.

HIS Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince set out for Hays in a Post Chaise, attended only by one Gentleman and two Domestic, to pay a Visit to Mr. Pitt, with whom he had a Conference of near two Hours, and expressed great Satisfaction.

Jan. 25. This Day his Majesty went to the House of Peers with the usual State, and gave the Royal Assent to the Bill for Naturalizing his Serene Highness the Prince of Brunswick; to the Bill for punishing Mutiny and Desertion; and to some private Bills. His Serene Highness was present at the House when the above Bills were signed; dined afterwards at Leicester-House with the Princess and her younger Brothers and Sisters, and then set out with her Serene Highness for Lord Abercorn's, in his Way to Harwich. His sudden Departure has occasioned much Speculation.

Dr. Pierce, Bishop of Rochester, and Dean of Westminster, resigned both his See and Deanery, and retired to a private Life. His great Age disabled him for the conscientious Discharge of his Function, which was the sole Motive of his Resignation. He has no Pension or other Reward.

It is said all Officers belonging to the Regiments in North America, now in Great Britain and Ireland, on Leave of Absence, have received Orders to embark for their respective Corps without Delay.

It is said the present exorbitant and furious Proceedings of certain naval and military Agents, in Consequence of many heavy Complaints, will soon be curtailed by a parliamentary Restriction.

Jan. 19. It is reported, that a Commission has been lately dispatched to our naval Commanders in North America, to deal with all French Ships of Force, who shall appear within a certain Latitude of Newfoundland (where it may be presumed they have no lawful Business) as if the two Nations were at open War.

We hear six Regiments of Infantry from Great-Britain and Ireland, are soon to embark for North-America.

Jan. 20. Among the several Articles of the Growth of our new Colonies lately imported, are some Stalks or Fibres of Hemp raised in Florida, which are singly of so strong a Texture as to raise a Weight of Fifty Pounds; and at the same Time may be split so as to equal fine Silk; it is said that great Expectations with regard to Trade are formed from the Growth and Culture of this valuable Manufacture.

Upwards of Five Thousand German and other Protestant Families, are preparing, in the Course of the ensuing Summer, to embark, with all their Effects, for the English Settlements in North-America.

It is said Orders are sent down to Woolwich to make a draught from the royal Regiment of Artillery, to fill up the deficiencies in the different Corps stationed in the Garrisons in North-America, and that they will embark as soon as the season will permit.

Jan. 21. A new Packet will shortly be ordered on the New-York Station, in the room of the Countess of Leicester, lately lost.

We hear a Plan has been presented to the Lords of the Admiralty, for building some light Frigates, with Eighteen or a Side, and to carry 16 or 18 Guns, to be made use of in the West-Indies, instead of larger Ships.

We hear the Currency of the two Floridas is at last settled Five for One, which is thought to be the most proper Measure between that of the Islands and the Northern Colonies. They write from Germany, that the River Waer has somewhat overflowed its Banks, and hath laid the flat Country der Water, and several Vessels were carried out of the current into the Marshes, where they were lost.

Damage done in the Downs. On the 14th Inst. a Sloop was into Ramsgate, whose Master says he saw two Ships of each other, one of which foundered, and the other appeared to be in great Distress. A Brig, supposed to have been taking Goods out of the Earl of Holderness, was seen foundering in the Gulf Stream. One Ship in the Downs, lost all her Masts. A large Dutch Ship came into Ramsgate with only her Foremast standing. A Brig is ashore at Ramsgate, with her Mainmast gone. A Brig was ashore the North Foreland, but afterwards drove out to Sea with her Bowprit gone, and three or four Sloops ashore at Ramsgate, which are since got off, and in Harbour.

Jan. 24. So great was the Curiosity of some Ladies to see Hereditary Prince, that several offered Five Guineas each a Seat in the Boxes of Covent-Garden Theatre on Thursday Night.

They write from Ireland, that a Beggarman, died lately at R, in that Kingdom, aged 105 Years; and at Arkmore, the County of Wicklow, Mr. Henry Dwyer, formerly a considerable Farmer in the said County, died 120 Years old.

He died at Rofs, Mrs. Elizabeth Clifford, aged 127; she used to see her Offspring to the Fifth Generation.

Jan. 28. They write from Newbury, Berks, that the waters have been so much out, that the Church sunk two feet perpendicular, and the Inhabitants were obliged to use Sticks to get Sustainance.

By a Letter from Caernarvon, in Wales, we are informed a remarkable Wedding lately consummated at Llanthobrig, Parish Church of that Town, between Anthony Thomas, of the said Parish, aged 45, and Ellen Pritchard, of the Parish of Trewalchmai, in Anglesey, aged 24; they having been born deaf and dumb; and such had been a long Time their mutual Affection for each other, that whenever they met, they could never part without a seemingly great Reluctance.

Feb. 1. One of the most affecting Scenes at the Departure of the Princess Augusta, was as follows: When her Highness, who had kept up her Spirits surprisingly, was on the

Point of taking Coach, in going through the Hall, she found all her Servants, drawn up in a row, to take their last Farewell of an indulgent and most dearly beloved Mistress. The Sight of them instantly melted her into Tears, and clapping her Handkerchief before her Eyes, she hastened to her Carriage, unable to express the Emotions she felt in any Manner.

Feb. 11. The following little Anecdote is too affecting, and too interesting to every English Breast, to be passed over in Silence: When the March made Sail, in which was her Royal Highness the Princess of Brunswick, she was importuned by those about her to quit the Deck, and partake of some Tea or Coffee which was prepared below. No, she said, in one half Hour I shall be out of Sight of England, and I will gaze at the last Cliff of my dear native Country, till I can see it no longer.

Feb. 13. On Wednesday last a Duel was fought on Epping Forest, between Cornet Gardiner of the Carabiniers (and not Capt. Gardiner of the Marines, who distinguished himself last War at the Siege of Guadaloupe, tho' it was confidently reported to be the latter) and the Rev. Mr. Hill, Chaplain of Bland's Dragoons, when the latter received a Wound in his Body, of which he died on Friday Night, at his Lodgings in Johnson's Court, Charing Cross.

Feb. 14. It is said that the Right Hon. Lord Clive is preparing with all Expedition to set out for the East-Indies, in the first Ship that sails, his Lordship's Presence being thought necessary in those Parts.

His Grace the Duke of Bedford's Estate, which is situated at Thorney, about five or six Miles from Peterborough, which consists of above 10000 Acres of Land, is entirely under Water, 3 Feet deep, so that it looks like an continued Sea.

Last Week died on board a Ship in the River, coming from Bermuda, William Poppel, Esq; Governor of that Island.

Sunday last the Wife of a Barber, in the City of Durham, who was married the Day before, was delivered of Three Sons and a Daughter, who were immediately baptised by the Names of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Sarah. The Woman is in a tolerable good Way, but there seems but little Probability of the Children doing well. [This good fertile Wife was really very Quick.]

We learn from Hull in Yorkshire, that the Country adjoining to that Town, on the Holderness Side of the River Hull is totally under Water for several Miles; that though there are several Drains into that River, which carry off a great Quantity of Water, the Inundation rather increases than diminishes; that some Villages were quite deserted of Inhabitants, and that it was not without much Danger the Country People came to that Town, tho' over the Place where there was once a good Turnpike Road.

A Letter from Yarm in Yorkshire says, "This Place has undergone a second Inundation within this Month. The former, of the first of December, you are already acquainted with from the public Papers; the latter began on Thursday, the 19th in the Morning, and rose to the Height of several Feet in every House in the Town. The Current of the River through the Streets was very violent, and attended with a terrible Wind, which seemed to threaten us with utter Destruction. As the Inhabitants had so lately suffered from the same Cause, they very readily took the Alarm upon the first rising of the River, and removed their Effects and perishable Commodities into their upper Rooms, which happily prevented much greater Losses than otherwise they must have unavoidably sustained, as the Flood continued for two whole Days. We have hardly a Garden Wall standing about the Town; and our Houses are so well reaped with wet that the Consequence may be very bad, especially as Coals are very scarce here, on account of the late rainy Season."

B O S T O N, April 5.

Extract of a Letter from London, Feb. 11, 1764.

"The French King has published an Arret, permitting the free Importation of Horses and Lumber into his Islands, to be paid for in Rum and Melasses."

Other Advices from London are, that the Trade between the West-Indies and North-America, as also the Revenues of the latter, are now under Consideration. The Duties on Melasses, Sugars, &c. imported into his Majesty's Plantations from the French, Spanish and Dutch Settlements in the West-Indies, but chiefly from the former, it is said, would be determined by the latter End of February last. Various are the Conjectures as to this Affair; by some it is said, a low Duty will be laid on foreign Melasses, 1 or 2 Pennies per Gallon; it is thought, it is as much as it will bear: That there will be a Duty of 10s. per C. Weight on foreign Sugars: A very large Duty, or total Prohibition of French Rum. It is also said, a Duty will be laid on Tea, on Wine and Fruit from Spain and Portugal, imported into the Plantations. It is said, that the Duty on Whalebone, exported from the Colonies of Great-Britain, will be taken off. It is said a Premium is likely to be granted on Hemp raised in, and imported from N. America.

The above we publish as Reports; the first Vessel from London, it is probable, will bring the Determination of them.

It is rumoured, that General Monckton will, at the earnest Request of the Colonies, be appointed Commander in Chief in North-America.

It is reported that Lord Egmont is to have the Property of the Island of St. John in the Gulph of St. Lawrence: The Tenure, by which Lord Egmont proposes to hold the Island of St. John, it is said, extremely well calculated for the Cultivation of that Island, and for the Advantage of the Trade, and particularly the Fishery of N. America; the Government thereof proposed, has not the least Resemblance or Analogy to the Proprietary Form of other Governments, often complained of; but, on the contrary, all their Inconveniencies are obviated.

The Island of St. Vincent, in the West Indies, is claimed by Lord Cordigan, as Heir to the Duke of Montague.

N E W - Y O R K, April 16.

Our last Advices received from above, are dated the 6th Instant, and are authentick, viz.

That John Johnson, Esq; Sir William's Son, has set off with about 200 Indians and Whites, to destroy the Towns on the West-Branch of Sasquehannah, &c. as many of the Delawares who have not retired farther South, are collecting themselves to have one Trial for their Country, which the whole Body of that Nation must abandon, if repulsed. There are 200 more in the same Service, under Capt. Montieur, and two other Officers; so that when Capt. Johnson joins them, we may expect to hear that the Enemy have received their Deserts.

Since the 8th ultimo, not less than 3000 Persons have been inoculated for the Small-Pox in Boston; and not above 5 of that Number died, and they were Children under 2 Years old, that had been troubled with other Infirmitie.

P H I L A D E L P H I A, April 19.

We hear from Northampton County, that one David Owens, a Defector from the Regulars, who has lived some Years among the Indians, came in last Week to one of our Out Posts, bringing with him five fresh Indian Scalps, and a white Boy, who was a Prisoner among the Indians, being taken by them last Fall, when they killed the People that were crossing Delaware in the Flat. They relate, that they were coming down Sasquehannah with nine Indians, viz. four Men, a Lad, two Women, and two Children, to fetch Corn; that they encamped at Night, and made a Fire to sleep by; that in the Night Owens waked the white Boy, and made him go from among the Indians, and lie on the other Side of the Fire; that he then removed their Arms, except two Guns, and a Hatchet; with the two Guns he shot dead two of the Indian Men immediately, and with the Hatchet dispatched the Indian Lad, the two Women, and two Children; but two of the Men made their Escape. Owens said not far from the Place till the Morning, when he scalped the two Men, the Lad, and the two Women; and then gave his Knife to the white Boy, bidding him scalp the two Children; but he declining it, they left them unscalped, and came away. Owens reports that 900 Indians were assembled, and waiting for others to join them in an Invasion of this Province; but the following Advices make this doubted.

Extract of a Letter from Johnson Hall, April 6.

"I have now upon Service, 200 friendly Indians, who will be able to free your Province from the Incursions of the Delawares, &c. The Senecas have been so greatly alarmed, at the Bodies of Indians sent out, that they have begged for Peace, and agreed to every Concession required of them. I thought this News might not be disagreeable to you."

Extract of a Letter from New-York, April 16.

"Sir William Johnson has concluded a Peace with the Chenowees. They are to deliver up the Murderers of one Hewlick, and two other Indian Traders, and for this have left three Hostages with Sir William. They are to deliver up all the Prisoners they have, Defectors and Negroes, amongst them. They have ceded to His Majesty the Carrying Place at Niagara, and some other Posts; have taken up the Hatchet against His Majesty's Enemies; are to send a Number of Warriors to act against the Shawanese and Delawares; and are to call in all their People that are among them. Sir William has several Parties out, above 400;

L O N D O N, January 18.

HIS Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince set out for Hays in a Post Chaise, attended only by one Gentleman and two Domestic, to pay a Visit to Mr. Pitt, with whom he had a Conference of near two Hours, and expressed great Satisfaction.

Jan. 25. This Day his Majesty went to the House of Peers with the usual State, and gave the Royal Assent to the Bill for Naturalizing his Serene Highness the Prince of Brunswick; to the Bill for punishing Mutiny and Desertion; and to some private Bills. His Serene Highness was present at the House when the above Bills were signed; dined afterwards at Leicester-House with the Princess and her younger Brothers and Sisters, and then set out with her Serene Highness for Lord Abercorn's, in his Way to Harwich. His sudden Departure has occasioned much Speculation.

Dr. Pierce, Bishop of Rochester, and Dean of Westminster, resigned both his See and Deanery, and retired to a private Life. His great Age disabled him for the conscientious Discharge of his Function, which was the sole Motive of his Resignation. He has no Pension or other Reward.

It is said all Officers belonging to the Regiments in North America, now in Great Britain and Ireland, on Leave of Absence, have received Orders to embark for their respective Corps without Delay.

It is said the present exorbitant and usurious Proceedings of certain naval and military Agents, in Consequence of many heavy Complaints, will soon be curtailed by a parliamentary Restriction.

Jan. 19. It is reported, that a Commission has been lately dispatched to our naval Commanders in North-America, to deal with all French Ships of Force, who shall appear within a certain Latitude of Newfoundland (where it may be presumed they have no lawful Business) as if the two Nations were at open War.

We hear six Regiments of Infantry from Great-Britain and Ireland, are soon to embark for North-America.

Jan. 20. Among the several Articles of the Growth of our new Colonies lately imported, are some Stalks or Fibres of Hemp raised in Florida, which are singly of so strong a Texture as to raise a Weight of Fifty Pounds; and at the same Time may be split so as to equal fine Silk; it is said that great Expectations with regard to Trade are formed from the Growth and Culture of this valuable Manufacture.

Upwards of Five Thousand German and other Protestant Families, are preparing, in the Course of the ensuing Summer, to embark, with all their Effects, for the English Settlements in North-America.

It is said Orders are sent down to Woolwich to make a draught from the royal Regiment of Artillery, to fill up the deficiencies in the different Corps stationed in the Garrison of North-America, and that they will embark as soon as the season will permit.

Jan. 21. A new Packet will shortly be ordered on the New-York Station, in the room of the Countess of Leicester, lately lost.

We hear a Plan has been presented to the Lords of the Admiralty, for building some light Frigates, with Eighteen Guns of a Side, and to carry 16 or 18 Guns, to be made use of in the West-Indies, instead of larger Ships.

We hear the Currency of the two Floridas is at last settled Five for One, which is thought to be the most proper Medium between that of the Islands and the Northern Colonies. They write from Ocracoke, that the River Water has somewhat overflowed its Banks, and hath laid the flat Country for Water, and several Vessels were carried out of the current into the Marshes, where they were lost.

Damage done in the Downs. On the 14th Inst. a Sloop was into Ramsgate, whose Master says he saw two Ships of each other, one of which foundered, and the other seemed to be in great Distress. A Brig, supposed to have been taking Goods out of the Earl of Holderness, was seen foundering in the Gulf Stream. One Ship in the Downs, lost all her Masts. A large Dutch Ship came into Ramsgate with only her Foremast standing. A Brig is ashore at Ramsgate, with her Mainmast gone. A Brig was ashore the North Foreland, but afterwards drove out to Sea with her Bowprit gone, and three or four Sloops ashore at Ramsgate, which are since got off, and in Harbour.

Jan. 24. So great was the Curiosity of some Ladies to see Hereditary Prince, that several offered Five Guineas each a Seat in the Boxes of Covent-Garden Theatre on Thursday Night.

They write from Ireland, that a Beggarman, died lately at 100, in that Kingdom, aged 105 Years; and at Ashmole, the County of Wicklow, Mr. Henry Dwyer, formerly a considerable Farmer in the said County, died 220 Years old. He died at Ros, Mrs. Elizabeth Clifford, aged 227; she lived to see her Offspring to the Fifth Generation.

Jan. 25. They write from Newbury, Berks, that the waters have been so much out, that the Church sunk two perpendicular, and the Inhabitants were obliged to use Sticks to get Sufficiency.

A Letter from Caernarvon, in Wales, we are informed of a remarkable Wedding lately consummated at Llanabeg, Parish Church of that Town, between Anthony Thomas, of the said Parish, aged 45, and Elin Pritchard, of the Parish of Trewalchmal, in Anglesey, aged 45; they having been born deaf and dumb; and each had been a long Time their mutual Affection for each other, that never they met, they could never part without a seemingly great Reluctance.

Feb. 1. One of the most affecting Scenes at the Departure of the Princess Augusta, was as follows: When her Highness, who had kept up her Spirits surprisingly, was on the

Point of taking Coach, in going through the Hall, she forgot all her Servants, drawn up in a row, to take their last Farewell of an indulgent and most dearly beloved Mistress. The Sight of them instantly melted her into Tears, and clapping her Handkerchief before her Eyes, she hastened to her Carriage, unable to express the Emotions she felt in any Manner.

Feb. 11. The following little Anecdote is too affecting, and too interesting to every English Breast, to be passed over in Silence: When the Match made Sail, in which was her Royal Highness the Princess of Brunswick, she was importuned by those about her to quit the Deck, and partake of some Tea or Coffee which was prepared below. No, she said, in one half Hour I shall be out of Sight of England, and I will gaze at the last Gliff of my dear native Country, till I can see it no longer.

Feb. 13. On Wednesday last a Duel was fought on Epping Forest, between Cornet Gardiner of the Caribbeens (and not Capt. Gardiner of the Marines, who distinguished himself last War at the Siege of Guadaloupe, tho' it was confidently reported to be the latter) and the Rev. Mr. Hill, Chaplain of Bland's Dragoons, when the latter received a Wound in his Body, of which he died on Friday Night, at his Lodgings in Johnson's Court, Charing Cross.

Feb. 14. It is said that the Right Hon. Lord Clive is preparing with all Expedition to set out for the East-Indies, in the first Ship that sails, his Lordship's Presence being thought necessary in those Parts.

His Grace the Duke of Bedford's Estate, which is situated at Thorney, about five or six Miles from Peterborough, which consists of above 19000 Acres of Land, is entirely under Water, 3 Feet deep, so that it looks like one continued Sea.

Last Week died on board a Ship in the River, coming from Bermuda, William Popple, Esq; Governor of that Island.

Sunday last the Wife of a Barber, in the City of Durham, who was married the Day before, was delivered of Three Sons and a Daughter, who were immediately baptised by the Names of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Sarah. The Woman is in a tolerable good Way, but there seems but little Probability of the Children doing well. [This good fertile Wife was really very Quick.]

We learn from Hull in Yorkshire, that the Country adjoining to that Town, on the Holderness Side of the River Hull is totally under Water for several Miles; that though there are several Drains into that River, which carry off a great Quantity of Water, the Inundation rather increases than diminishes; that some Villages were quite deserted of Inhabitants, and that it was not without much Danger the Country People came to that Town, tho' over the Place where there was once a good Turnpike Road.

A Letter from Yarm in Yorkshire says, "This Place has undergone a second Inundation within this Month. The former, of the first of December, you are already acquainted with from the public Papers; the latter began on Thursday, the 20th in the Morning, and rose to the Height of several Feet in every House in the Town. The Current of the River through the Streets was very violent, and attended with a terrible Wind, which seemed to threaten us with utter Destruction. As the Inhabitants had so lately suffered from the same Cause, they very readily took the Alarm upon the first rising of the River, and removed their Effects and portable Commodities into their upper Rooms, which happily prevented much greater Losses than otherwise they must have unavoidably sustained, as the Flood continued for two whole Days. We have hardly a Garden Wall standing about the Town; and our Houses are so well steeped with wet that the Consequence may be very bad, especially as Cattle are very scarce here, on account of the late rainy Season."

B O S T O N, April 5.

Extract of a Letter from London, Feb. 11, 1764. "The French King has published an Arret, permitting the free Importation of Horses and Lumber into his Islands, to be paid for in Rum and Melasses."

Other Advices from London are, that the Trade between the West-Indies and North-America, as also the Revenues of the latter, are now under Consideration. The Duties on Melasses, Sugars, &c. imported into his Majesty's Plantations from the French, Spanish and Dutch Settlements in the West-Indies, but chiefly from the former, it is said, would be determined by the latter End of February last. Various are the Conjectures as to this Affair; by some it is said, a low Duty will be laid on foreign Melasses, 1 or 2 Pennies per Gallon; it is thought, it is as much as it will bear: That there will be a Duty of 10w. per Q. Weight on foreign Sugars: A very large Duty, or total Prohibition of French Rum. It is also said, a Duty will be laid on Tea, on Wine and Fruit from Spain and Portugal, imported into the Plantations. It is said, that the Duty on Whalebone, exported from the Colonies of Great-Britain, will be taken off. It is said a Premium is likely to be granted on Hemp raised in, and imported from N. America.

The above we publish as Reports; the first Vessel from London, it is probable, will bring the Determination of them.

It is rumoured, that General Monckton will, at the earnest Request of the Colonies, be appointed Commander in Chief in North-America.

It is reported that Lord Egmont is to have the Property of the Island of St. John in the Gulf of St. Lawrence: The Tenure, by which Lord Egmont proposes to hold the Island of St. John, is, it is said, extremely well calculated for the Cultivation of that Island, and for the Advantage of the Trade, and particularly the Fishery of N. America; the Government thereof proposed, has not the least Resemblance or Analogy to the Proprietary Form of other Governments, often complained of; but, on the contrary, all their Inconveniencies are obviated.

The Island of St. Vincent, in the West-Indies, is claimed by Lord Cordigan, as Heir to the Duke of Montague.

N E W - Y O R K, April 16.

Our last Advices received from above, are dated the 6th Instant, and are authentick, viz.

That John Johnson, Esq; Sir William's Son, has set off with about 2000 Indians and Whites, to destroy the Towns on the West-Branch of Sasquehannah, &c. as many of the Delawares who have not retired farther South, are collecting themselves to have one Trial for their Country, which the whole Body of that Nation must abandon, if repulsed. There are 200 more in the same Service, under Capt. Montieur, and two other Officers; so that when Capt. Johnson joins them, we may expect to hear that the Enemy have received their Deserts.

Since the 8th ultimo, not less than 3000 Persons have been inoculated for the Small-Pox in Boston; and not above 5 of that Number died, and they were Children under 2 Years old, that had been troubled with other Infirmities.

P H I L A D E L P H I A, April 19.

We hear from Northampton County, that one David Owens, a Defector from the Regulars, who has lived some Years among the Indians, came in last Week to one of our Out Posts, bringing with him five fresh Indian Scalps, and a white Boy, who was a Prisoner among the Indians, being taken by them last Fall, when they killed the People that were crossing Delaware in the Flat. They relate, that they were coming down Sasquehannah with pine Indians, viz. four Men, a Lad, two Women, and two Children, to fetch Corn; that they encamped at Night, and made a Fire to sleep by; that in the Night Owens waked the white Boy, and made him go from among the Indians, and lie on the other Side of the Fire; that he then removed their Arms, except two Guns, and a Hatchet; with the two Guns he shot dead two of the Indian Men immediately, and with the Hatchet dispatched the Indian Lad, the two Women, and two Children; but two of the Men made their Escape. Owens staid not far from the Place till the Morning, when he scalped the two Men, the Lad, and the two Women; and then gave his Knife to the white Boy, bidding him scalp the two Children; but he declining it, they left them unscalped, and came away. Owens reports that 900 Indians were assembled, and waiting for others to join them in an Invasion of this Province; but the following Advices make this doubted.

Extract of a Letter from Johnson Hall, April 5.

"I have now upon Service 200 friendly Indians, who will be able to form your Province from the Incurfions of the Delawares, &c. The Senecas have been so greatly alarmed, at the Bodies of Indians sent out, that they have begged for Peace, and agreed to every Concession required of them. I thought this News might not be disagreeable to you."

Extract of a Letter from New-York, April 16.

"Sir William Johnson has concluded a Peace with the Chenootes. They are to deliver up the Murderers of one Hewlitt, and two other Indian Traders, and for this have left three Hostages with Sir William. They are to deliver up all the Prisoners they have, Defectors and Negroes, amongst them. They have ceded to His Majesty the Carrying Place at Niagara, and some other Posts; have taken up the Hatchet against His Majesty's Enemies; are to send a Number of Warriors to act against the Shawancho and Delawares; and are to call in all their People that are among them. Sir William has several Parties out, above 400;

one Party of 200, commanded by his Son; he expects very good Accounts from these Parties, and hopes to bring about a general Peace with the Indians."

ANNAPOLIS, April 26.

Lately Died at his Seat on Patowmack, in Charles County, BENJAMIN FENDALL, Esq; formerly Clerk of that County.

Two Days ago a little Child was burnt to Death on Kent-Island, by her Cloaths taking Fire; the Parents being from Home, and leaving only Two Children in the House.
