Without his hard work, devotion, and determination for achievement, it would have been virtually impossible to realize factors now commonplace. His devotion and perseverance lend but even greater trust in him in the realization of our dreams for the future.

Dr. Hardesty received his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1932 from Randolph-Macon College, Ashland, Virginia, and did graduate work at William and Mary College, Johns Hopkins University, University of Maryland, and Western Maryland College. He earned his Master of Arts degree from Columbia University in 1934; and, on October 8 of this year, he was awarded an honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from Randolph-Macon College, Ashland, Virginia. The citation on the degree is as follows: "For many years a widely known and respected leader in public education in Maryland, President of Maryland State Teachers College at Frostburg since 1955, and excellent teacher of teachers and exemplar of the values of good teaching." He joined our campus as president in 1955 after having served in the capacity of Superintendent of Schools in Garrett County.

In view of his undying interest in perpetuating the progress of Frostburg State Teachers College, we take great honor in dedicating the 1960 NEMACOLIN to President R. Bowen Hardesty.

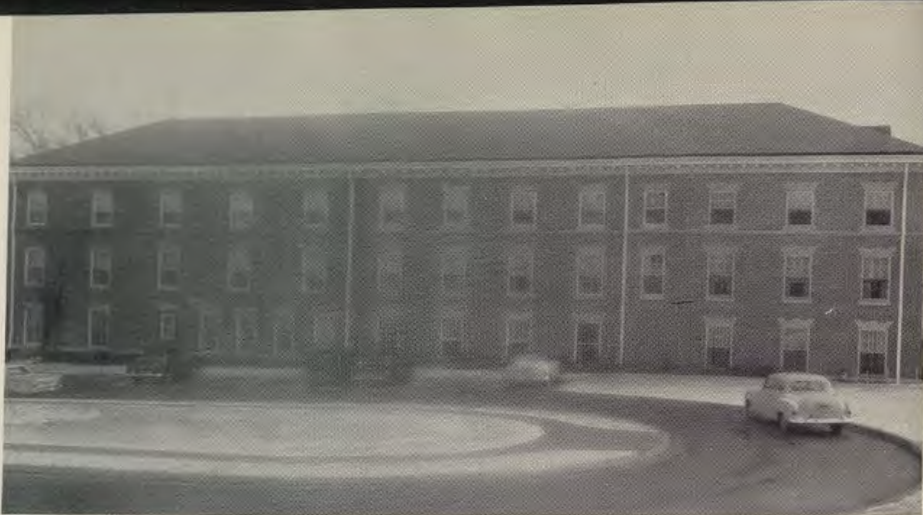

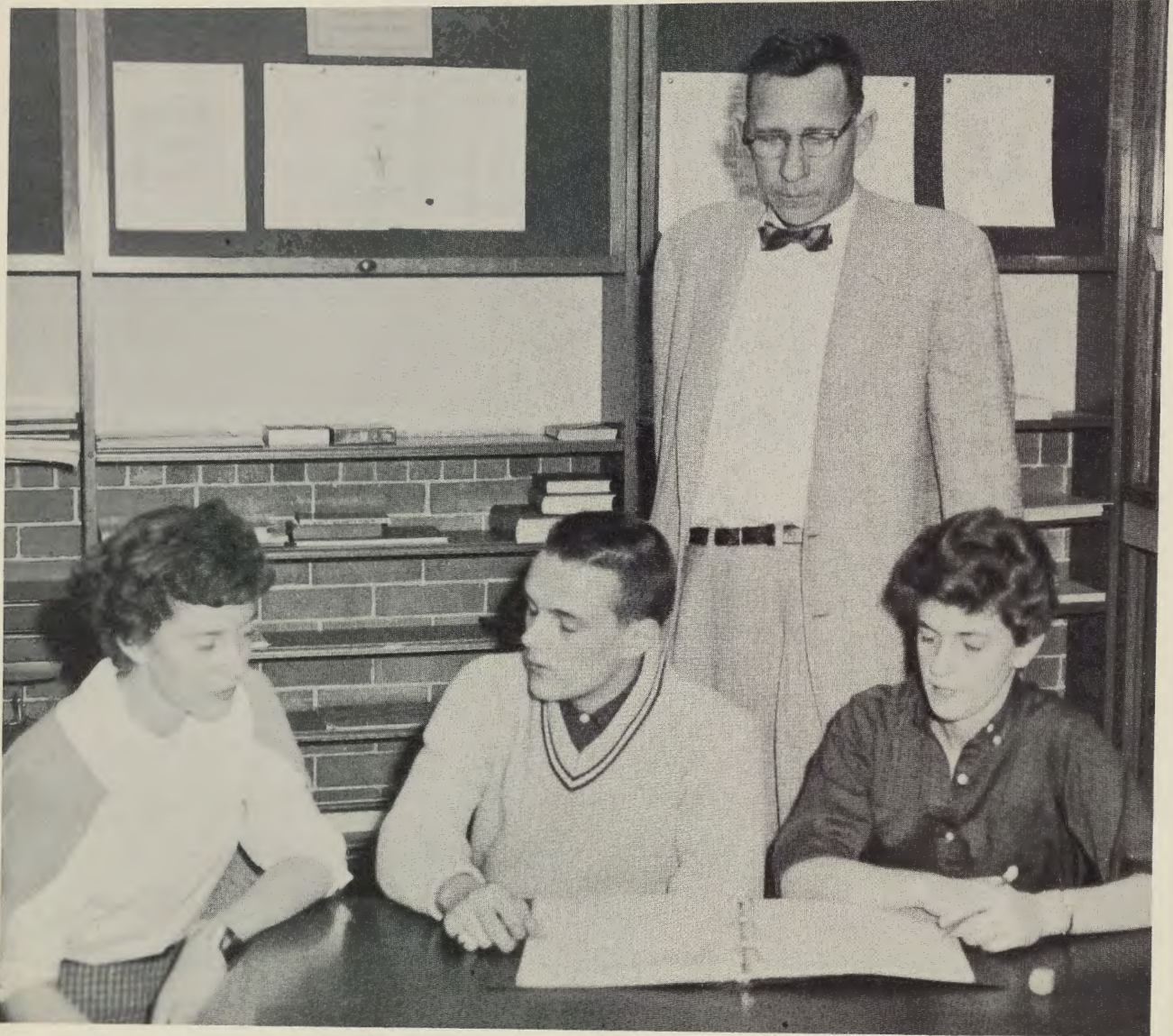

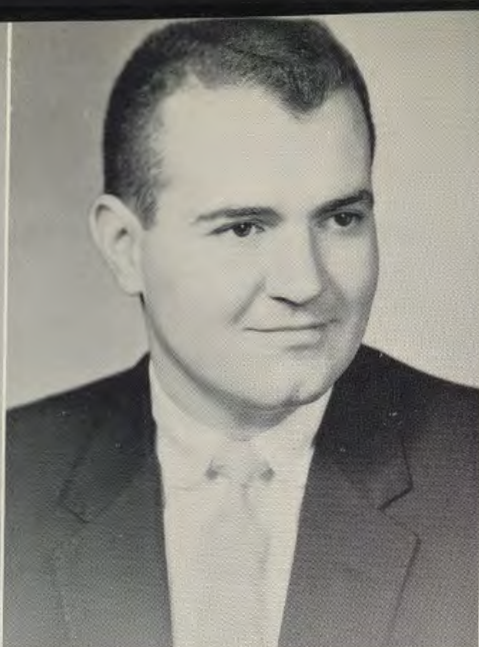

The art of living, therefore, entails a differentiation from the masses and society, and a conformation to God's way of life.

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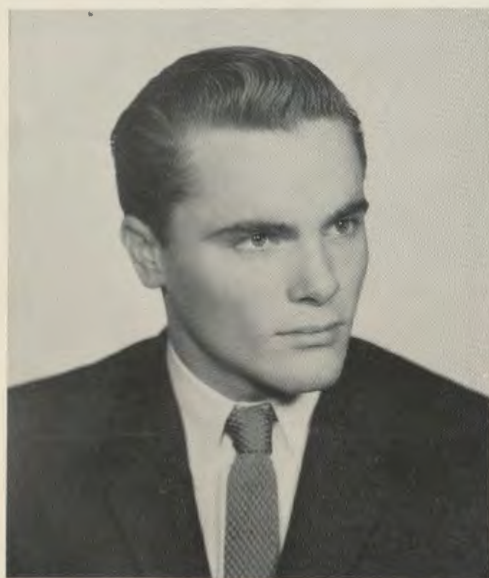
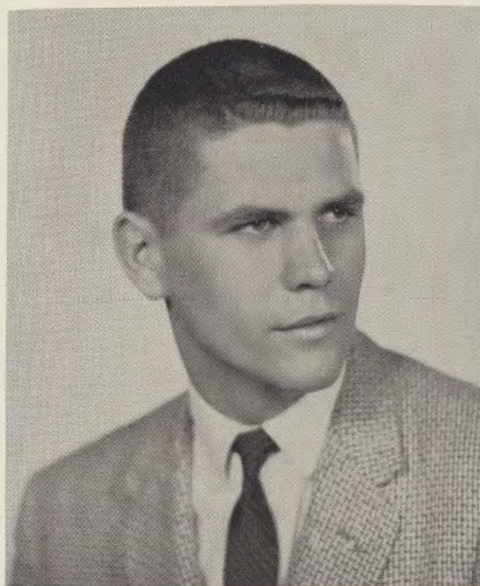

I'll have to close. It is almost seven o'clock and I have to go down to the library and complete my final history report.

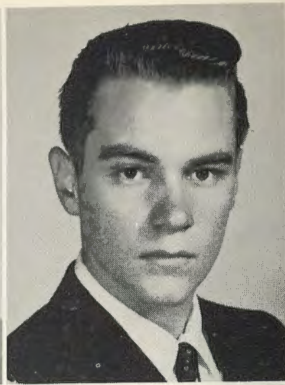

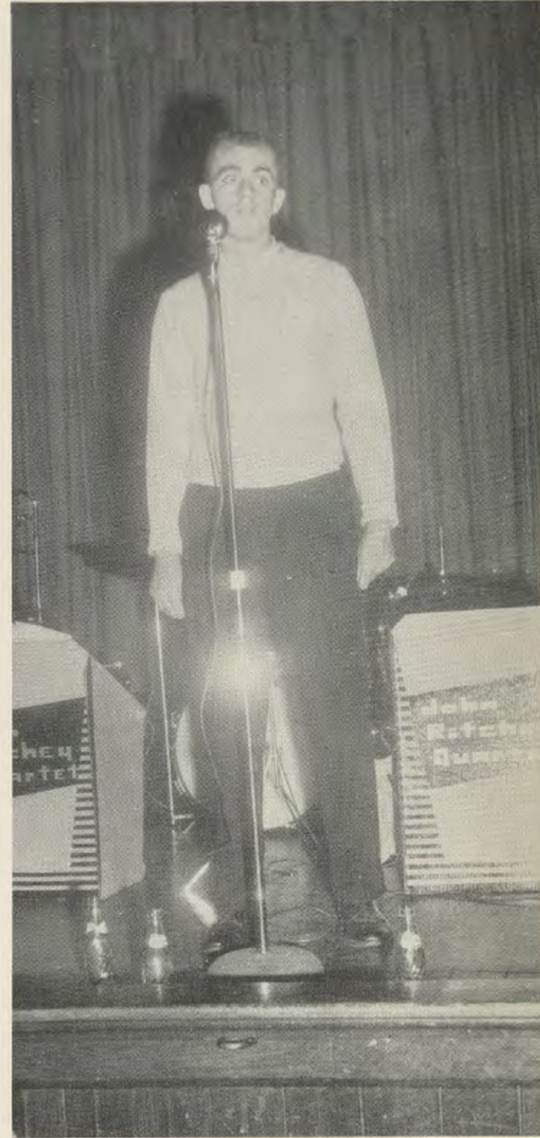
THANKSGIVING

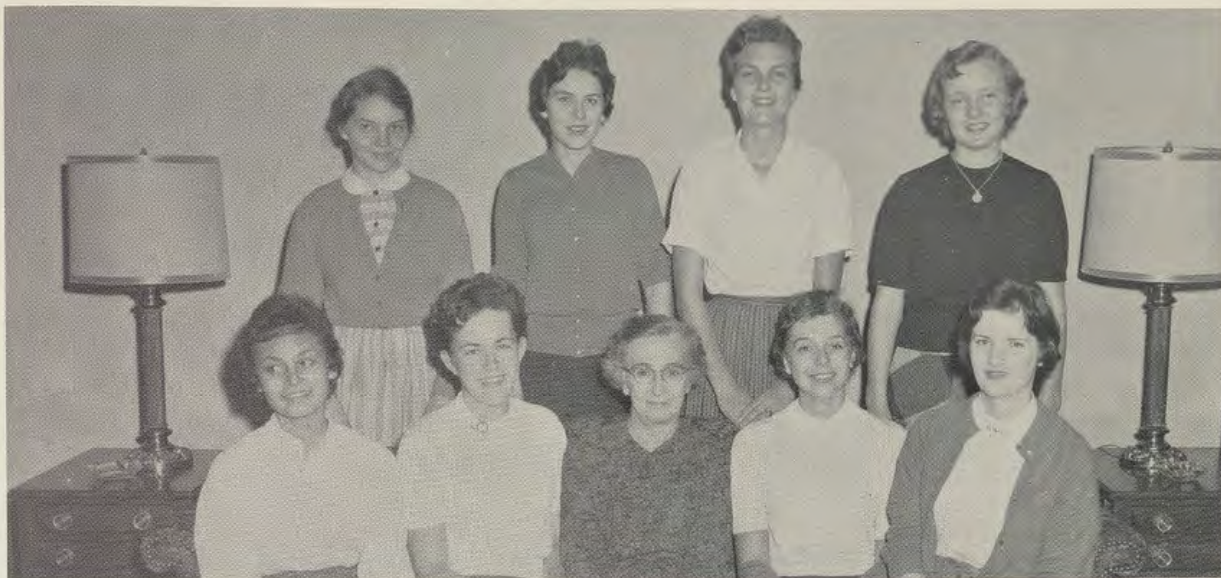

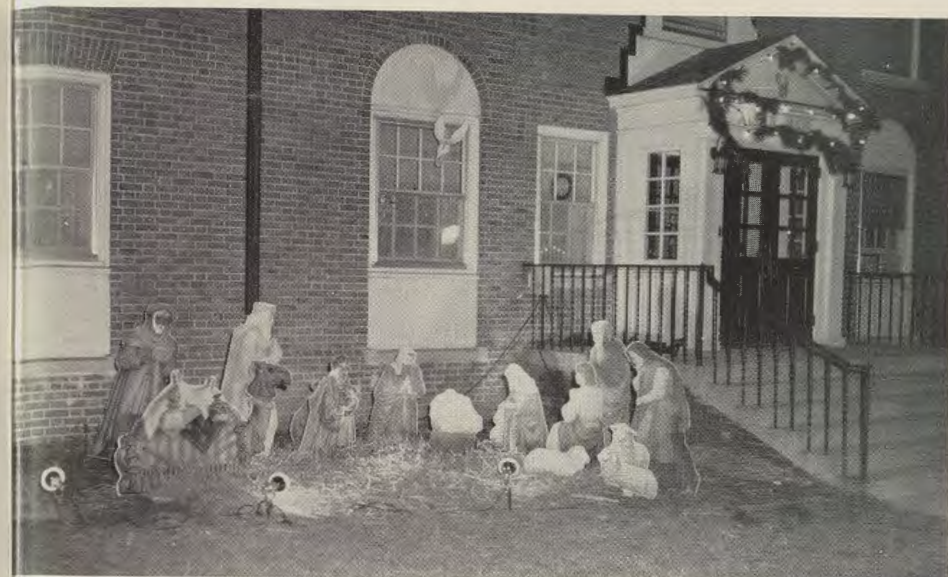

DANCE . . .



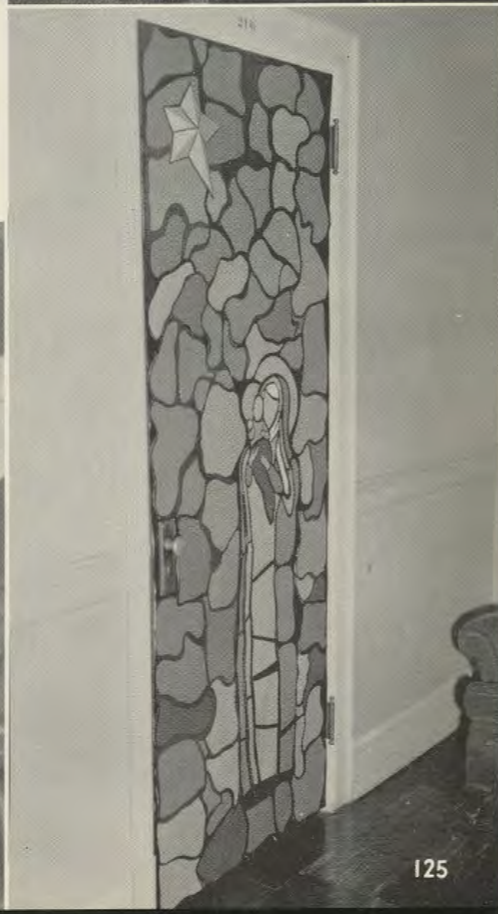

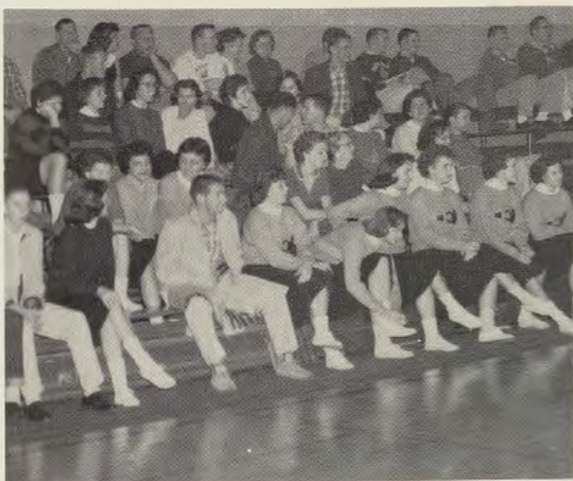
A CHEER FOR VICTORY...

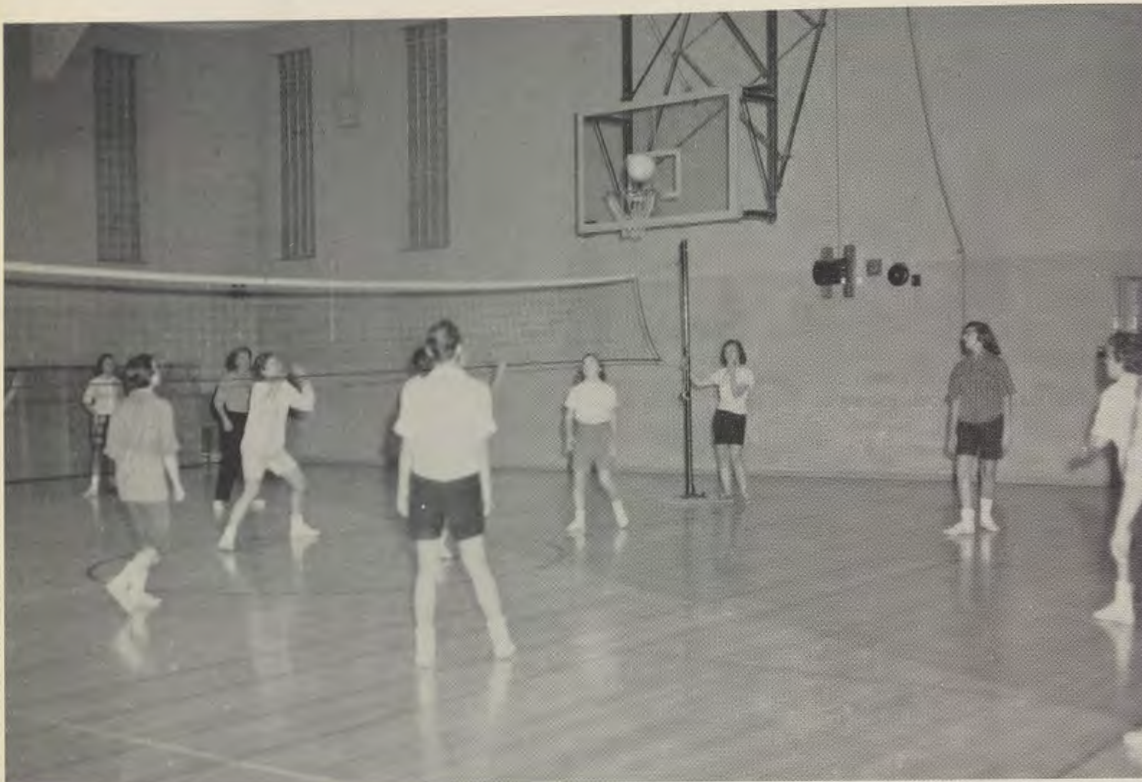

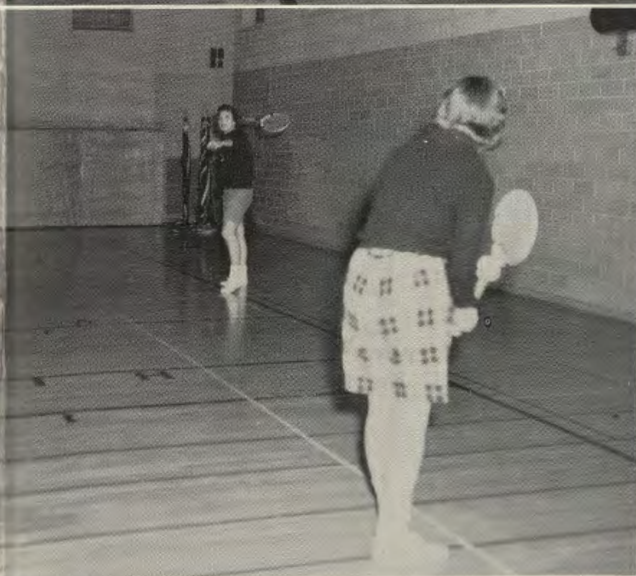


BADMINTON AND TENNIS
