Led by FSU President Jonathan Gibralter, the group will visit several schools, including Southwest University of **Nationalities** and Szechuan Normal

University in Chengdu and Hunan Normal University in Changsha, where Gibralter has been invited to give a speech at the university's 70th Anniversary ceremony.

"It is incredibly important that our students, faculty and staff experience other countries through study abroad, exchanges, sabbaticals and the presence of international students here at FSU,' Gibralter said. "We live in a global community, and to really understand what that means, you have to experience the people and cultures of nations overseas firsthand. We already have 16 students from Hunan Normal University at FSU this year, thanks to our previous efforts in China. During this next trip, we will solidify relationships with several new universities and foster our friendship with Hunan Normal University at their 70th Anniversary celebration.

The FSU delegation's journey follows several other successful trips to China by FSU students, faculty and staff - FSU education students learned about China's teaching methods and schools in January and the FSU Chamber Choir performed as cultural ambassadors in several areas of China in March. FSU began planning the delegation trip following the choir's

"We have both strong existing partnerships with schools in China and the opportunity to open doors at several new promising institutions. Incorruptible takes place in Priseaux, France, circa 1250 B.C.E. The future rests with the Pope, whose promised visit will surely entice pilgrimages and restore the abbey to its former glory. Everything goes according to plan until a rival church claims to possess the actual relics of Sainte Foy. Their bones are working miracles and their coffers are overflowing. All seems lost until the destitute monks take a lesson from a larcenous one-eyed minstrel, who teaches them an outrageous new way to pay old debts.

In this dark comedy about the dark ages, Michael Hollinger satirizes the fragility of faith in the face of survival. "Incorruptible" is a fun and gentle ribpoking look at how humans gleefully twist convictions to rationalize bad behavior.

'Let's Walk, Let's CHILL' Winners

FSU's Creating Healthy, Informed, Lasting Lifestyles (CHILL) Program recognized the top student and staff winners of its "Let's Walk, Let's CHILL" month-long physical activity competition during halftime of the FSU Homecoming football game on **Oct. 4**.

The top student winner, freshman *Robbie Wullschleger*, walked and ran for more than 102 miles and exercised for more than 73 hours during the course of the competition by playing and practicing his soccer skills. Wullschleger commented on the importance of his fellow Bobcats to maintain a healthy lifestyle based on national trends.

"The U.S. as a country is overweight, and we can help this by practicing physical wellness," Wullschleger said.

Top staff winner *Jaron Hawkins*, a lecturer in the Geography department, logged over 485 miles of walking and running. Hawkins, who is preparing for a marathon, enjoys running and averages 100 miles per week by running 90 minutes daily.

"My drive to improve competitively is what forces me to stay active," Hawkins said.

Top team winners *Doug Baer, Bobby Bonser* and *Tim Smith* logged over 276 miles by working out as a group. Baer, area coordinator for Residence Life; Bonser, a senior athletic training major and Smith, a graduate student in the Administration and Supervision program, schedule time to play a few games of ultimate Frisbee each week.

As part of the competition, FSU participants logged over 711 hours of physical activity on MyStartOnline.org, a free Web site provided by the American Heart Association.

Wellness Coordinator April Baer hopes that FSU participants will continue the momentum.

"The goal of this program was to promote healthy habits during an otherwise busy time for our students and staff," said Baer. "Each of our winners used their leisure time to be active; we hope that they will serve as examples of the overall benefits of leading a healthy and happy lifestyle."

Baer promoted this program through her ORIE class, which introduces firstyear students to the many exercise possibilities in the Frostburg area. "We are in a great location in Maryland, with beautiful scenery around us and a plethora of physical activities to become a part of. Students, faculty and staff are really missing out if they live here all year and don't take advantage of all the amazing trails, hikes, slopes and more," Baer said.

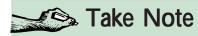

Youth Climbing Classes
