The University Chorale with the Emmanuel Episcopal Chancel Choir will perform Giacomo Puccini's Messa di Gloria, featuring Kimberly Andrews (piano), baritone soloist, senior David McKinley from Hagerstown, Md., and tenors James Bowser (senior) and Aaron Torgerson (junior) from Leonardtown, Md

Puccini's Messa di Gloria was composed in 1880 as his graduation project at the Instituto Musicale Pacini in Lucca, Italy. Its first performance won great acclaim for the young composer, but it had to wait until 1951 for its second performance. Despite its liturgical nature one can already detect the great talent for lyricism and dramatic projection which characterize his operatic work.

Collegium Musicum will also perform "Si Ch'io Vorrei Morire" by Claudio Monteverdi and "Dainty, Fine, Sweet Nymph" by Thomas Morley, "Tsen Brider" arranged by Joshua Jacobson and "A Child's Journey" by Michael Horvitt and The King Singers' arrangement of "You Are The New Day" arranged by Peter Knight.

The Concert Band will conclude the afternoon with an evocation of the holiday spirit in Gustav Holst's "In the Bleak Mid-Winter," arranged for symphonic band by Robert W. Smith; Percy Grainger's "The Sussex Mummer's Christmas Carol," arranged by Larry Clark; and the "Coventry Carol" and "Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring" arranged by Calvin Custer.

AC and FSU to Present Mantovani Orchestra

Allegany College and FSU proudly present "Christmas with the Mantovani Orchestra and Chorus," a Mainstage Production, Tuesday, Nov. 30, at 7:30 p.m. in the Allegany High School Auditorium.

Mantovani's Christmas concerts are rich in the size and variety of their offerings. This big and dramatic performance will include ballet selections by Tchaikovsky, festive and fun favorites such as "Santa's Sleigh Ride," devotional pieces like "Onward Christian Soldiers" and numerous traditional melodies made special by the indelible stamp of the Maestro's cascading strings. Familiar and loved, the evening's music will entertain like old friends waiting to be heard after a long silence.

The Mantovani Orchestra has been delighting audiences for over 50 years with a sound made famous by its founder, Annunzio Paolo Mantovani. With a string section as its centerpiece, Mantovani would compose, arrange, transcribe and conduct the orchestra molding the sounds that he heard into interpretations of the music he wanted to present to his audiences. This formula produced the unmistakable "Mantovani sound."

By the time of Mantovani's retirement in 1975, he had become a household name in the field of popular

entertainment. Late in 1981, one year following his death, at the urging of a family friend, the Mantovani children, Ken and Paula, made their father's library of music available to symphony orchestras. From this, an idea was born to form another "Mantovani Orchestra" and send them on tour. Since 1983, the more than 41 performers have toured steadily, continuing to delight audiences throughout the world.

The Orchestra is led today by Charles Ellis, a conductor who has led the concerts of numerous symphonies including the Baltimore Symphony, Rochester Philharmonic, Jacksonville Symphony, East Texas Symphony and South Bend Symphony, among others. In addition, he has conducted operatic productions for the Boston Lyric Opera, the Goldovsky Opera Company and Boston Summer Opera Theatre.

A native of Boston, he holds degrees in music from Indiana University, New England Conservatory and the Johns Hopkins University. He resides in Baltimore where he is a member of the Mason-Dixon Baseball Umpires Association. Ellis is thought to be the only person ever to conduct a concert with the Baltimore Symphony and umpire a ballgame at Camden Yards.

Department of Social Work Sets Info Sessions


