From the LONDON GAZETTE. WHITE HALL, April 16, 1763.

O'N Thursday Night, Lieutemant Colonel Scott arrived with the following Letter to the Earl of Egremont Brigadier-General Draper, who also arrived himself about the same time.

Mazilla, November 2, 2762.

My Lerd,

PHILADELPHIA, June 16.

Extract of a Letter from Fort Pitt, June 2, 1763.

"Thursday last, just opposite the Fort, at Dusk, arrived a Number of Delaware Indians, with 15 Horse Load of Skins and Furs. Very early next Morning they came over the River, and dealt them all off, not seeming to care much what they took for them. Their Indifference, and uncommon

Dispatch, in Trading, gave us some Jealousies how they came by them. Just before they set off, I was standing with Mr. Alexander M'Kee, on the Bank of the River, when one of them came up and told him to go away, and that he must not stay more than four Days; these, with some other suspicious Words, made us imagine they intended fome Mischief; and immediately after they told Mr. M'Kee this, they fet off.—The next Morning we found, that all the Indians that lay up the River, a few Miles above us, and planted Corn, left their Towns that very Night, and took every Thing with them, which convinced us that they either intended, or knew of some Mischief intend-ed us.—Sunday Morning some People, belonging to Colonel Clapham, arrived at the Fort, and informed us that the Colonel, and four of his Peo-ple were killed by the Wolf, and fome other Dela-wares; and fince the Colonel was brought down and buried here, who was tomahawked and fealped; two Women were treated in fuch a Manner, that it would be indecent to mention it. Sunday Night the Enemy killed two of the Soldiers at the Saw Mill, and on Thursday burnt it.—Monday, a Man hired with Alison and Company, came to a Party sent down to bury the Dead, and informed, that he was in Company with Alexander M'Clure, driving 25 Horse Load of Skins and Furs, belonging to faid Company, Thomas Calhoon and Bro-ther, and several others, amounting in all to fourteen, who were fired upon by a Party of Indians, as they were croffing Beaver Creek, and feveral killed.—Calhoon, and two of his Men, have arrived fince, but no Account of the reft .- The whole Garrison have been very alert in putting every Thing in the best Order fince the first Alarm .- We have destroyed the Upper and Lower Towns, lay-ing them level with the Ground; and by Tomorrow Night we shall be in a good Posture of Defence.—Every Morning, an Hour before Day, the whole Garrison are at their Alarm Posts.—Ten Days ago, at Beaver Creek, they killed one Patrick Dunn, and a Man of Major Smallman's; also two other Men.—Capt. Callender's People are all killed, and the Goods taken.—There is no Account of Mr. Welsh, or Cape. Prentice, but it is feared they are likewise killed.—Mr. Crawford is made Prisoner, and his People all murdered.— Our fmall Posts, I am afraid are gone.—Detroit was attacked four Days without Intermission.—The French sent the Indians two Belts, and the English three, to defift, but they determined to continue the Attack, and were fighting when the Indian, who brought this Account to the Delawares, came away.—We fent two Men with an Express to Venango in the Night, but before they got a Mile on their Journey, were fired upon, and returned, one of them wounded.

From Fort Bedford we have the following Extrafts, June 5, 1763. " As the News current must have reached you, with various Circumstances, e'er now, the following is the most authentic that I can as yet depend on, viz. That Col. Clapham, one M'Cormick, two Women, and a Child, were murdered on Saturday, the 28th ult.—That a few Days after two Royal Americans were killed and scalped, within a Mile of Fort Pitt.-And that on efday laft one Smith was attacked by an Indian without Arms, at Beaver Creek, who endeavoured to put him under Water; but Smith proving too firong for him, put the Indian under Water, brought off a Piece of his Ear, and left him."

A most shocking Murder was committed last A most shocking Murder was committed last Saturday at Taunton, by a Negro Fellow belonging to Dr. M'Kinstry;—a Sister of the Doctor's getting up early in the Morning to iron Clothes, the Negro (after making a Fire) got his Master's Horse, and left him at the Door, and finding an Opportunity took up a hot Flat-iron, with which he struck the Woman on the Back of her Head, and sugned her he reposited the Blow they do. and stunned her, he repeated the Blow, then drag-ged her down into the Cellar, and there with an old Ax struck her several Times; he then took the hot Iron, and rubbed over her Face, flicking the Point of it into her Eyes, whereby the was fcorched confiderably; after he had done this, he took the Horse and rode off.—The Family soon got up and found the Woman in the above Condition; she continued till the Evening of the next Day, and then died: The Negro was pursued, and taken up at Newport, and confessed the Fact.—What

induced the Fellow to perpetrate this Crime is not known, as he was always treated well, and there had been no Difference with him in the Family.

NEW-PORT, June 6.
The Brig Royal Charlotte, Capt. Taylor, arrived here laft Thursday from Annamaboa, on the Coast of Africa, after a Passage of 110 Days; by whom we have the affecting Intelligence of the the tragical Death of Capt. George Froft, and Mr. William Grant, his Mate, both of this Town, which was perpetrated by the Slaves on boar, his Sloop, as the lay at Anchor in the River Gabcone, in the Month of November last. Capt. Frost having Occasion either for some Wood or Water, fent two of his Men and a Negro on Shore for that Purpose, himself, the Mate, and a Negro, who belonged to the Vessel, remaining on board; and in the Mens Absence he unfortunately permitted the Slaves, to the Number of about 60, to come upon Deck, who immediately feized him, with the Negro Man, and threw them overboard. Mr. Grant at this Time lay fick in his Cabbin, unable to rife. Capt. Frost swam up to the Vessel, in order to get on board again; upon which the Slaves threw a Lance at him, which penetrated his Body, where it remained, and with which he attempted to gain the Shore, but after fwim-ming about Half the Way, he funk, and was feen no more. The Negro, who was thrown over with him, had the good Fortune to get fafe ashore.

The Slaves having now the Command of the Vessel, they brought the Small Arms, with several

Barrels of Powder, upon Deck; and on fome Blacks coming off in Canoes to retake the Veffel, the Slaves on board began firing with their Small Arms, but through Ignorance foon fet the Powder on Fire, and in the Explosion about 30 of them were destroyed. The Sloop was retaken 3 Days afterwards, when the most affecting Part of this Affair was disclosed; for on entering the Cabbin, the Corps of Mr. Grant was immediately discovered, with his Throat cut in a very shocking Manner, which was supposed to have been done as foon as Capt. Frost and the Negro were thrown.

A short Time before Capt. Taylor failed, he heard that the Slaves on board a Sloop belonging to Liverpool, role upon the People, wounded the Mate, and got Possession of the Vessel, which afterwards ran ashore and beat to Pieces.

NEW-YORK, June 16. Extract of a Letter from London, dated April 30. " This Day Mr. Wilkes Member of Parliament for Aylesbury, Writer of the North Briton, is fent to the Tower, by Warrant, for treasonable Practices (In other Words, for libelling the Government): In the faid North Briton the King's Speech is attacked and treated with unreferved Freedom; and the Warrant fets forth that he has endeavoured to fow Sedition, and alienate the Affections of his Majesty's Subjects.

" It will make a terrible Noise, and no Doubt the City will be all on Fire upon the Occasion; Lord Chief Justice Pratt has granted a Habeas Corpus, and Mr. Wilkes is to be brought, on Monday, to get Bail, if he can obtain it. He refused to apply to Lord Chief Justice Mansfield, as being a Sestehman. I do not imagine that ever Party Spirit carried People to greater Excesses, or was more violently agitated. It is probable Mr. Wilkes will remain in the Tower till the Parliament meets. The Duke of Bedford fet out on his Return for France Yesterday."

June 20. One or two Expresses have arrived here fince our last from Albany, with Intelligence, it is faid, of the Outrages of the Indians on our Out Polls and Back Settlements.
