The following *Spirited Letter* (taken from the *London Magazine*, for January, 1763) was sent by Sir Edward Hawke, to the Duke d'Aiguillon, soon after the glorious 20th of November, 1759.

Royal George, December 22, 1759.

I HAVE the Honour of your Grace's Letter on the 11th Instant. In Answer to which, I beg Leave to acquaint you, that Capt. Oury has acted entirely by my Orders, and that I approve of what he has done. His Manifesto, of which your Grace has transmitted me a Copy, is a sufficient Proof of his Humanity, and the Tenderness of my Orders, which were not to fire unless he should be fired upon.

Without further Recollection, I need only have Recourse to my Letter to your Grace, of the 29th of November, by Lord Howe, with Regard to the Hero. My Words are, "I therefore claim these Officers and Men as Prisoners, and expect from your Grace's known Honour, that they be immediately delivered up to me." This Holf and Guns were not mentioned; for the first I had set on Fire, and the second I looked on as in my own Power to recover. Let me further beg your Grace to look over the Agreement you signed with Lord Howe: Is the Artillery so much as mentioned in it? No. Every Article of it I have strictly observed; exchanged Seamen, released Officers, Soldiers and Militia on the Terms of the Cartel, and sent the Guard Marines ashore on Parole. I could not help being surprised, that no Notice was taken in that Agreement of my Claims of the Hero's Officers and Men; and was answered—that Matter belonged to another Department, not to your Grace; which occasioned my writing to you again upon that Subject. I can only further assure your Grace, that had a Captain of a British Ship of War, under my Command, begged Quarter, and surrendered to the French; and afterwards ran away with the Ship, in open Breach of the Rules of War, I would have immediately delivered up the Ship, with the Commander, to have been treated as the Forfeiture of his Honour deserved. The same I should have expected from the Duke d'Aiguillon, if I did not consider him as the Subject of a State, in which the Will of the Monarch constitutes Right and Wrong.

I assure your Grace, upon my Honour, that I never heard of any Memorial to be presented to the Admiralty of England, who have no Concern in Matters of this Kind. By the Bounty of their King, British Seamen are entitled to every Thing surrendered by, and taken from, an Enemy in War. In their Names, and for their Benefit, I shall endeavour to recover the Hero's Guns, and also those of the Soleil Royal, which were deserted, and left to our Mercy; the Delivery of the Officers and Men, is all that depends at present on the Honour of your Court; the Artillery are within our Reach; our Endeavours to take them away being justifiable; I was in Hopes would not have been interrupted; but since your Grace and the Marquis de Broc, have thought fit to sit on my Ships, I shall take as severe a Revenge as I can, along your Coasts, as soon as I receive Supplies from Britain.

For I came out near eight Months ago, only furnished with Orders to decide the Fate of the two Nations with M. de Conflans in the open Sea; but when we met, as he did not choose to stay for me, he has thereby changed the Nature of my military Operations, and reduced me to the Necessity (entirely repugnant to my natural Disposition) of sending Fire and Sword into that Country, from whence your Grace, with forty Battalions under your Command, by the authenticated Instructions of Marshal de Belleisle, was to have spread the most dreadful Calamities of War, in Great-Britain or Ireland. I cannot persuade myself, your Grace could be serious, when you termed my Enterprises irregular; it was Mercenary, and I shall not hereafter be surprised, if, in the same *Gaite de Cour*, I should be accused of acting irregularly in attacking M. de Conflans (after a Chase of 20 Leagues in the open Sea) within your Islands, and on your Coast, and setting Fire to the Soleil Royal, &c.

As an Individual, I honour and respect the Duke d'Aiguillon: As a Commander of a British Squadron against a declared Enemy, I strictly obey the Orders of the Great King, my Master, only following my own Judgment, as Circumstances may alter.

MESSINA, December 14.

IN the Night between the 8th and 9th, we had such a Storm of Rain, Hail, Wind, and Lightning, that in less than an Hour the Torrents of Rain became so violent, as to remove Stones Ten hundred Weight, and break down several Dykes and Walls. The Water in many Houses was five Feet high. Seven Persons lost their Lives. Many Gardens and Fields are covered with Barbs and Stones to the Height of three or four Feet.

Capezio, Feb. 6. A Sort of contagious Distemper prevailing among the Garrison of this City, which has carried off Abundance of Men, the King has ordered most commodious and healthy Quarters to be provided for them.

By the last Year's Bill of Births, Deaths, and Marriages, in the Ballywick of Aggershus in Norway, it appears that two Women were each delivered of 3 Children at once; and another Woman brought forth five Children in one Year only. Among other Singularities, they reckon 750 married Couples, who have lived together 80 Years and upwards; 70 others who have lived together 90 Years and upwards; 22 Marriages from 100 to 105 Years Standing; and another, that has lasted 120 Years. They have also recorded the following Case of a Woman, remarkable for her Piety and

Misfortunes, who died last Year, aged 78: Her first Husband wilfully drowned himself; her second Husband lost himself in the Mountains; her only Son kindled a Fire of Wood in a Forest, and leapt into the Flames; and her Daughter, who was married, flung herself into a River.

Hague, Feb. 25. Private Letters from Stockholm acquaint us, that the Supercargoes appointed to go on board the next India Ships, are instructed to make due Enquiry, Whether the Opening a Commerce with Japan, be practicable or not? Whether a License may not be obtained from the Chinese Court, for carrying on a Trade to the Peninsula of Corea? And Whether, if this can be obtained, it may not prove a Means of sending their Manufactures into the northern Parts of Tartary?

LONDON, February 7.

Among the many uncommon and merry Pranks played by the Crew of the Active Man of War, who took the Hermione, is the following: Two of the common Sailors at Plymouth, after they had got their Prize Money, not only decorated themselves, but their Lasses also; one of them bought a sufficient Quantity of rich Brocade Silk to make his temporary Wife a full Sack; and insisted on its being lined with the same, which was done accordingly. The other hired three Post-Chaises to carry him from Plymouth to the Dock, which is about two Miles; in one of them he put his Oak Stick, in the second his Wig, and got into the third himself, and rode in State bare-headed. Afterwards these two jolly Tars met with one of their Meddles at a Public House, the Landlord of which not having any Thing they liked for Dinner, one of them ordered in a Frying-Pan, and a large Lump of Butter, desiring he would stand Cook, when they came to a Resolution, *Nemine Contradicente*, to fry their Watches.

About three Weeks ago, a Sailor came, accompanied by a female Acquaintance, to the House of a Silversmith, near Westminster-Abbey, and made a Purchase of a Wedding Ring, for which he gave 50s. He then asked if he could not have a Copy of his own Fancy engraved within-side directly; they told him, whilst he took a Walk round the Park it might be done, with which he was satisfied, and left to be engraved the following Couplet: *When Money's low, The Ring will go.* His Order was complied with by his Return, as promised: He then demanded of the Silversmith, what he would return him for the Ring, provided he wanted to dispose of it in a little Time? The Answer was, 24s. on which he departed with his Lady; but on Saturday last he came again with the said Woman to the Silversmith, with the Ring, and desired him to comply with the Agreement that had been made at the Purchase as afore said, and begged that he might be paid all in Silver, which, after he had received, with all the Freedom natural to those brave, but too imprudent Set of People, *There, my dear, said he, (dividing the Money) there are 12 for you, and 12 for myself. I shall get shipped tomorrow. If so be you do not alter your Condition before I come home again, and have a Mind to be concerned, if you shift your Quarters, send a Direction, and I will give a good Lookout for you.* He then giving his Wife, as he called her, a hearty Squeeze by the Hand, at the Shop Door, each went their different Ways, without any further Ceremony.

March 10. The Eclipse calculated to happen on the 13th of March 1764, is reckoned by some to happen on the 13th of the said Month, at the same Hour, and in Point of Darkness, to be equal to the Eclipse, which happened about 30 Years ago.

His Prussian Majesty, as soon as the several Evacuations are effected, proposes to make a strict Enquiry into his Finances; and it is said, that for the future the Court of Berlin will be much more magnificent than ever, in consequence of a Plan for reducing the Expence, without weakening the Strength of the Army.

They write from Hamburg, that their Public and Private Accounts from Warlaw do not at all agree. The former positively assert, that the King is out of Danger, whereas the latter insinuate, that Monarch is still extremely ill, and that his Son, Prince Clement, is also in a declining Condition.

The moderate Cardinals have at last so far prevailed with the Pope, that it is thought the Differences subsisting between the Holy See, the Crowns of France, Portugal, Naples, and the Republic of Genoa, will be speedily adjusted; to which, it is said, the Interposition of his Sardinian Majesty has not a little contributed.

The definitive Treaty of Peace is now ratified by all the belligerent Powers; and now let us hope to find, that Public Spirit, the glorious Principle of all that is great and good, is not so far from being cherished and encouraged, as to become ridiculous in this enlightened Age; but it would be a very useful Policy, and warranted by the Example of the wisest Governments, to make the natural Love of Fame and Reputation subservient in promoting that noble Principle.

Triumphal Arches, Columns, Statues, Inscriptions, and the like Monuments of public Services, have in former Times been found Incentives to Virtue and Magnanimity, and would probably have the same Effect on Britons which they had on Greeks and Romans.

And perhaps a Pillar of Infamy would be found a proper and exemplary Punishment in Cases of signal public Villainies, where the Loss of Fortune, Liberty, or Life, are not proportioned to the Crime; or where the Skill of the Offender, or the Nature of his Offense, may screen him from the Letter of the Law.

March 19. Thursday about Noon John Rice, the Broker, was brought by one of his Majesty's Messengers to the Mansion-House, where he passed under a long Examination before the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, who committed him to the Poole County. There were present some of the Gentlemen of the Bench and South Sea Company. His Lordship examined him with great Candour, and indulged

him till this Day, to consider of his Affairs; when he was again examined, ordered him Pen, Ink, and Paper, and desired him, if he could think of any Thing that might, in any Respect, be of Benefit to the injured Parties, to commit it to Writing, and deliver it to his Lordship. He declared, that no Person had any Concern with him in the several Forgeries he stands charged with; and that having burned and destroyed his Papers before he went away, he was unable to give to clear an Account of his Affairs as he could wish. He was quite composed, and answered every Question without Hesitation. He was dressed in a blue Coat, a Bag Wig, and a Gold faced Hat.

Mr. Rice's Coach, Horses, &c. were sold by Auction, as follows: One Pair of Coach Geldings, 67 l. One Pair ditto, 62 l. One Saddle Horse, 26 l. One ditto, 31 l. 2 s. A Coach and Harness for 4 Horses, 106 l. 2 s. A Post Chaise, 43 l. A Negro Boy, 32 l.

A few Days ago, a Woman about thirty, who had been married some Time to an old Man of fifty, near Clerkwell Green, having some Words with her Husband, went to an Apothecary's in St. John's-Street, and asked for Twopenny-worth of Arsenic. He suspecting that she had no good Design, very discreetly gave her some Jalap, which worked her pretty strongly. The poor Woman imagining herself at the Point of Death, told her Husband what she had done, who went to the Apothecary, and he explained the whole Transaction.

Letters from the County of Tipperary in Ireland bring melancholy Accounts of the Outrages committed by those People called Levellers. They cut out the Tongue, and cut off the Lip of a poor Man at Castle Orway, and have greatly abused several other People in that Neighbourhood. The Lord Justices have ordered their Proclamation, with a Reward of 100 l. for discovering any Person concerned in the above Affair, and have sent down an Independent Company of Horse.

The following is said to be an exact Account of the Loss of Men we have sustained during the late War, in the Naval Service only.

The Widows left, supposing only a fourth Part of the Men married, are about 33,805, and if each married Man left only one Child, the Number would be above 67,600.

Out of 7000 Soldiers employed in reducing the Havannah, not above 1500 of them are now living.

By the above Account, which seems calculated with great Exactness, it appears, that no more than 1573 Sailors and Marines have been killed during this late War, in their different and glorious Engagements against the Enemy; and the amazing Number of those Dead of Diseases and Missing amounts to 433,708; half of which, at least, without Exaggeration, may be supposed to have perished by the Inclemency of the Weather, the Scurvy, or by living on salted Provisions. A most alarming Circumstance! that 132,196 more should die of Diseases, &c. than all the Efforts of our mortal Enemies could destroy in a long Six Years War; and certainly it merits the most serious Consideration of those in Power to preserve the Lives of our Sailors and Soldiers, always a Terror to the Enemies of Great-Britain.

The national Expence of last Year has been stated at 18,655,750 l. and of the Year before at 19,619,119 l. and these have been justly thought immense Sums. However, several Millions more annually; raised by the Government upon the People, ought to be added to those Accounts.

The Expence of 1761, then (exclusive of the long Annuity, that could not be bought up for Three Millions) is above Twenty-six Millions, which is more than One Million Sterling every Fortnight, expended by the Government. The Supplies for 1762, which are likewise burthened with an Annuity, amount by the above Computation to upwards of Twenty-five Millions. The Accounts of the two Years together, exclusive of the Annuities, are Fifty-one Millions; which is more than all the real Revenues of all the other Kingdoms of Europe united.

The public Entry of their Excellencies the Venetian Ambassadors, is put off till after Easter; Their Coaches, which came over from France, are the grandest ever seen upon such an Occasion; one is Red and Gold, the second Green and Gold, and the third Blue and Silver. The first Coach is to be drawn by eight beautiful Horses; and it is believed that this Entry will be the grandest ever seen in England. The Master of the Horses to their Excellencies has given strict Orders not to show the Coaches to any one before the Entry is made.

On Friday last came ashore at Margate, Capt. Jennings, and Cornet Sackville, with 25 Men belonging to General Walgrave's Regiment: They came from Wilmshurst, in the William, Capt. Plover, and in their Passage ran on the Kentish Coast, where they took to their Boats, leaving on board the Vessel, 12 Men, and 16 Horses. Two of the Margate Boats went out in quest of the Ship, which they

found the next Day, with her Hull several Feet under Water; the Men to save themselves, took to the Main and Foretop, and were all safely bro't on Shore at Margate on Monday last. The People saved nothing but what they had on their Backs, and had nothing to eat all the while they were in that distressed Condition. The Horses were all drowned in the Hold. From this the Report of a Vessel being lost, and only 15 Persons saved, took its Rise.

Last Week a Sailor who had been paid off on board one of the Men of War in Portsmouth Harbour, being in Liquor, swore he would throw his Wages overboard, which amounted to 24 Guineas, and actually did so, in spite of all that his Brother Tars could do to prevent it.

Amidst the Abundance of Tales received from Portsmouth, and other maritime Towns, with regard to the lavish Franks of Sailors, it is with Pleasure that we communicate an Instance of contrary Behaviour that happened lately at Southampton, in the Conduct of an honest, brave, and fortunate Fellow, who hath been many Years past stationed in the East-Indies, and who by Prize Money, good Economy and Industry, hath found Means to return possessed of upwards of One Thousand Pounds. On Enquiry after his Family, he found that his Father had been dead some Time, and much in Debt; he immediately made himself acquainted with the Creditors of the deceased, invited them to a Public House, entertained them with a handsome and plentiful Supper, and demanded each Person's Account, discharged all the Debts, and the Bill of the House, &c. the Whole amounting to more than One Hundred Pounds.

Jeuneuse, March 3. This Day the Earl of Sutherland's Battalion of Highlanders was mustered, reviewed, and lodged their Arms in Presence of Lieut. Col. Wedderburn of the 68th Regiment. The Regiment was very complete, and made a very fine Appearance; after having lodged their Arms, the Men were thanked by the commanding Officer of the Regiment, for their good Behaviour since they were raised, and received his Majesty's royal Bounty of Ten Shillings each; after which they dispersed according to the Orders, without the least Noise or Disturbance. Since this Regiment has been raised, there has not one Man deserted, and there has never been a Complaint from any Quarters they were in.

NEW-YORK, May 19.

On Tuesday last arrived here a Sloop from Martinico, which brought Letters for several Gentlemen in Town. We hear that a Vessel had just arrived there, that was met at Sea by another Vessel from the East-Indies, bound to England, having Col. Coote on board, who spent the Vessel till he wrote and sent on board her a Letter for General Rufane, Governor of Martinico, giving an Account of the Conquest of the Island of Manila, by Col. Draper, in November last, where he found Two Millions, some say Two and a Half Millions Sterling in Specie, and that a rich Acapulco Ship had also fallen into his Hands.

The same Day Captain — arrived here from the Havannah, which Place he left the Second Inst. He acquaints us, That the Day before he sailed from thence, an English Officer, that had formerly been a Sergeant, but had obtained a Commission for his Bravery at the Attack of the Moro, was executed there for the Murder of an English Soldier, which was occasioned by Means of a Woman; and that a Spaniard, who had been one of the Murderers of Messrs. Boyd and Reed, turned King's Evidence, and discovered the whole Scene; but notwithstanding, he was to be executed the 3d Inst. The Spaniard said there were six concerned, who all fled to the Mountains; and that by the noble Resistance made by Mr. Boyd, who got a Hangar in the Fray, they were almost cut to Pieces before they could finish him. Mr. Reed they finished at one Blow, as he was leaning down to draw some Wine out of a Cask for them.

ANNAPOLIS, June 2.

On Thursday last Died at his House at West-River, KENSEY JOHNS, Esq; High Sheriff of this County. He was a tender Husband, affectionate Father, sincere Friend, upright Magistrate, humane Officer, kind Neighbour, and cheerful Companion: His Death is sincerely lamented by all his Friends, and the Loss to his Family is truly deplorable, being snatched from them in the very Prime of Life, aged no more than 42 Years.

Saturday last Capt. Maynard, arrived in Patuxent from Landon, which Place he left the 27th of March. At the same Time arrived Capt. Brooks.

The Tobacco Fleet which sail'd from Maryland and Virginia, last November, and which bore away for Cork, as formerly mentioned, were arrived in London.

Capt. Maynard informs us, that on the 11th of May, about 900 Miles from Cape-Henry, the Cape bearing N W by W $\frac{1}{2}$ W, he met with and spoke a Schooner from Maryland for Barbados, Capt. Higgins of Dorchester County, having carried away both his Masts by bad Weather; but had got them on board again, and was in a fair Way of getting them up and proceeding on his Voyage.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, R.

WHEREAS a Definitive Treaty of Peace and Friendship between us, the Most Christian King, and the King of Spain, to which the King of Portugal hath acceded, hath been concluded at Paris on the Tenth Day of this last March; in Conformity therewith, we have thought fit hereby to command, that the same be published throughout all our Dominions: And we do declare to all our loving Subjects our Will and Pleasure, that this said Treaty of Peace and Friendship be observed inviolably, as well by Sea as Land, and in all Places whatsoever, strictly charging and commanding all our loving Subjects to take Notice hereof, and to conform themselves thereto accordingly.

Given at our Court at St. James's, the 27th Day of March, 1763, in the Third Year of our Reign.

Q. O. D. Says the KING.

L. O. D. O. N. March 27.

Yesterday Morning the Peace was proclaimed, pursuant to his Majesty's royal Warrant, signed for that Purpose. The Ceremony was as follows:

At Ten o'Clock the Officers of Arms assembled at St. James's Gate, properly appointed, on Horseback; when the Proclamation of his Majesty's Declaration of Peace was made, with the usual Solemnity.

From thence they marched to Charing-Cross, in the following Order, viz.

Guards to Clear the Way.

Constables and Beadles, two and two, bare-headed, with Staves.

The high Constable.

The Officers of the High Bailiff of Westminster.

The high Bailiff.

The Grenadier Guards.

Knights, Marshal Men, two and two.

The King's Trumpets.

The Serjeant Trumpeter, bearing his Mace.

Pursuivants and Herald, two and two.

Norroy King at Arms, having on each side a Serjeant at Arms with a Mace.

Garret, Principal King at Arms.

A Troop of Horse Guards.

At Charing-Cross Peace was proclaimed a second Time.

From thence they proceeded to Temple-Bar, where the Officers of Westminster retired, and within the Gate the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Sheriffs performed the usual Ceremony, at their Entrance into the City.

Then Proclamation was made a third Time at the End of Chancery-Lane; then at the End of Wood-street, in Cheap-side, where the Cross formerly stood.

And the fifth and last Time at the Royal Exchange, during change Time.

Their Majesties, and most of the Royal Family, were at the Windows over the Gate-way at St. James's, to hear the Proclamation read.

It is said the Peace was proclaimed Yesterday, by Agreement, in Paris, Madrid, and Lisbon, as well as London.

Paul Filer, Esq. of Clifton, near Bristol, who died lately, has left to the Magdalen Hospital 2000 l. and to the Society for propagating the Gospel 2000 l. to be disposed of in the following Manner; 500 l. for propagating the Gospel in America, 500 l. for encouraging the Protestant Working Schools in Ireland, and the remaining 1000 l. for the Use of the first Bishop that shall be appointed in America, with the Interest of the same, provided such a See be constituted in 25 Years. And it is greatly to be hoped that such a well intended Bequest will not be lost for such a necessary Establishment in our now widely extended Empire in America; especially as many Romanist Bishops have been long established in those Parts by the French and Spaniards.

The late worthy Bishop of Chyren has told us, that in 1745 there were many Churches vacant in our Plantations, and many very ill supplied; nor could all the Vigilance and Wisdom of that Prelate, whose peculiar Care it was, prevent this, so long as these Churches are supplied from England: And supplied they must be with such as can be picked up in England or Ireland, until a Nursery of Learning for the Education of the Natives is founded; which might provide a constant Succession of learned and exemplary Pastors; and we may easily judge what Effect this must be supposed to have on their Flocks.

Most certainly, the Establishment of Episcopacy in our American Empire would be attended with infinite Advantages, as well to the Mother Country, as to her Colonies. American Missionaries may be then employed for the Conversion of America, and the Savages be brought to a Life of Civility and Religion.

The late Report of Justice in our Colonies is solely lodged in the King's sacred Person, with the Advice of his Privy Council, exclusive of Westminster-Hall, or any other Judicature. The brightening of this Jewel in the Crown, may not perhaps be thought unworthy the Care of the present happy Reign, to which the Improvement and future Security of so large a Part of the British Dominions, the Advancement of Trade, universally supporting the glorious Cause of Liberty, seem to be preserved by the peculiar Hand of Providence.

It is said, that the Design of putting all our Provinces in North-America under military Government, is laid aside.

The Betty and Ruth, Trumans, of Boston, was spoke with by the Betty, from Maryland, bound to the Orkneys, having lost her main-mast.

This Day the Definitive Treaty of Peace was proclaimed at the usual Place round the out Parts of London and Westminster, by the Sheriff of Middlesex, attended by the proper Officers.

We are informed, that the Right Hon. the Earl of Harcourt, Master of the Horse to the Queen, will be appointed Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.

And that James Stuart Mackenzie, Esq. Member of Parliament for the County of Ross in Scotland, will go Ambassador to the Court of France, on the Return of his Grace the Duke of Bedford.

March 28. The King of Prussia is coining new Specie to the Amount of Ten Million of Crowns.

A Contract has been made by a French Commissary now in England, for Twenty Thousand Suits of Cloaths, for the Use of the French Prisoners, to be delivered before their Departure for their own Country.

We can assure our Readers, that his Majesty will not visit his Electoral Dominions this Year.

It said the Queen lies-in in June.

The Heads of Peace set on Monday Night till near Ten o'Clock, and was never known to be fuller.

March 30. By the 5th Article of the Treaty of Hubert-

burgh, the Emperor Queen and the King of Prussia promise to release the Subjects of either, that were compelled to enter into the Service of the other.

And by an Article of the Treaty between the Kings of Poland and Prussia, the former cedes to the latter all that he possesse on the farther Side of the Oder, and the Superintendency of the Banks of that River; for which he is to receive an Equivalent, the Amount of which is not mentioned in the Treaty.

Ships of War are fitting out at Barb, to carry over Garrison to the French West-India Settlements.

To Martinico are to be sent 1050 Men, To Guadaloupe 1080, To Cayenne 540. To St. Lucia 200. To St. Domingo 450. In all 3330.

A new Treaty of Commerce is on the Carpet between France and Holland.

A Number of Teachers are retaining to be sent to New-York and Philadelphia, for the two Colleges established in those Colonies.

March 31. We are told, that a great Change is already begun amongst the Ministry. It is said his Grace the Duke of Devonshire will be made First Lord of the Treasury, in the Room of Lord Bute, who will be made Lord Chamberlain of the Household; Mr. Pitt to be Secretary of State; and several great Commissioners, who now enjoy high Posts, on their Resignation, will be created Peers.

Ten Ships of War are ordered to be fitted for North-America, and to be there stationed.

John Newe, Esq. of Plaidow, in Essex, was last Night interred at West-Ham. He has left, amongst other charitable Legacies, 100 l. to the Society for erecting Protestant Schools in Ireland; and 100 l. for the propagating the Gospel in foreign Parts.

We are assured, by authentic Advices from Paris, that the French East-India Company have presented a Memorial to the Court of Versailles, requesting to be exempted from sending a Garrison to Goree, as it is not worth the Expence.

Col. Josias Martin, Speaker of the Assembly in Antigua, is appointed Captain-General of the Leeward Islands, in the Room of George Thomas, Esq.

The Cargo of the Spanish Man of War lost near Ramsgate, is valued at upwards of 50,000 l.

If Credit may be given to some private Letters by the last Dutch Mail, Col. Draper has executed his Expedition against the Philippine Islands with Success.

Some of the French Inhabitants in Canada are selling their Estates to English Subjects, in Order to retire either to France, or to some of the French Colonies in America.

Last Wednesday a new Dock was opened at Plymouth Yard, to receive his Majesty's Ship Union, of 50 Guns; and altho' it was a remarkably low Spring-Tide, the water in, with the greatest ease, and had more Water than was sufficient. This Dock is reckoned the largest in England, and thought to be equal to any in Europe.

It is said Encouragement will be given to our disbanded Soldiers to go and settle at Quebec, and our other Acquisitions on the River St. Lawrence.

We hear that the Works of Milford Haven will be carried on, notwithstanding the Peace, which will be a Means of giving Employment to a considerable Number of our discharged Seamen and Soldiers.

The French have entirely evacuated all the Places belonging to the King of Prussia upon the Lower Rhine, and his Prussian Majesty's Troops have taken peaceable Possession of them.

General Kingsley's Regiment, which came over with the second Division from Germany, are ordered to Winchester. This Regiment has remarkably distinguished itself in nine Battles, in one of which they lost half their Men, and in the whole have lost near 2000 Men since the Commencement of the War, whose Places were continually filled up as Occasion required, to keep them complete.

Some Officers, and two Engineers, are gone, or going to Dunkirk, to view the Fortifications of that Place, which are to be demolished by Treaty, and to view the new Works erected during the two last Wars.

We hear that the Underwriters (in Consideration of the Bravery of our British Tars) are come to a Resolution to insure no Ships but those that are wholly navigated by such Hands, as it would be very impolitic to continue foreign Sailors in the Merchants Service after the Conclusion of the Peace.

Extract of a Letter from Portsmouth, March 24.

Yesterday the Tamar Sloop was paid off in the Harbour. There is an Order for six small Ships to be put in Commission again, the Rainbow (a 30 Gun Ship, which will be the Commodore's Vulture, Triton, Temar, Fly, and Piper Sloop, to go to Halifax.

It is said that the Garrison of Bellisle will be transported to Minorca.

Belfast, March 21. The Lords of Appeals have reversed the Judgment of the Vice Court of Admiralty of Jamaica, condemning the Ship General Johnson, and Brig Jenny, belonging to Belfast and New-York, for having loaded Sugars at Monto Christi, and ordered said Vessels and Cargoes to the Owners.

New-Castle, March 29. By a Letter from Berwick, dated the 15th Instant, we learn, that dreadful have been the Effects of the late Storm along the Coast in that Neighbourhood. A large Vessel, Name unknown, attempting the Harbour at Holy Island, struck upon the Rocks, and immediately sank; all the Crew perished. Another Brigantine, very near the Entrance of the Bar, shared the same Misfortune. A third, a Sloop, belonging to Lynn, and laden with Coals from Sunderland, soon succumbed to the Fate of the former. And the Nancy, Bryan Hutchinson, a Brigantine belonging to Plymouth, laden also with Coals from the same Port, missing the Bar, amidst among the Breakers, and immediately righting again, drove upon the Rocks at the Castle-point; but four of the Hands were saved, by the Assistance of a Boat from the Shore; the rest, among which was the Master, having been with a crewboard; the Ship and Cargo it is hoped will be saved. A Ship, appearing to be pretty large, was seen on Sunday upon the Coast of the Farn Islands, with some of her Sails flying; from whence it is feared the Goods on board all lost. One also is said to be driven to the Eastward of the Islands, and another vessel, the floating in the East-way; still

a Ship driven ashore near this Place, the Port-plat of another smaller One near Boston. In these the Shores are strewn with Weapons and dead Bodies; a great Number of Ships perished, during the Storm, without the Islands, for Leith, about whose Safety there is little Reason to be anxious; and above twenty Sail of others got safe into Holy Island, though some of them have lost their Masts, and otherwise received Damage; and the Men are generally half-dead, with Hardships and Fatigue.

BOSTON, May 23.

Thursday last Capt. Gage arrived here in 22 Days from Martinico. A French Man of War was arrived there from France, with several French Officers on board, in order soon to take Possession of that Place. The English were in much Confusion on Account of their moving off so soon.

Extract of a Letter from Surinam, March 22.

A few Days ago an Express arrived here from Berbice, giving an Account that the Negroes of a Plantation, belonging to Mr. Vanderforter, had burnt the Houses, murdered the white People, and made off. Another Express arrived Yesterday, with Advice, that Twenty-two Plantations more were cut off by the Negroes, who in a most cruel Manner, murdered all the white People they could come at. The Inhabitants are in a most Miserable Condition, being obliged to take Refuge on board the Ships, and it is generally thought that the Colony will be entirely ruined.

By Advice from London, of the 23d of March, we learn, that the House of Commons have voted the same Sum as a Compensation to the Northern Colonies for the Year 1765, as was voted the last Session for 1761; which Sum was 233,000 l. Sterling.

We also hear, that it has been proposed to lower the Duties on French Melasses, from 6d. to 2d. per Gallon, in order the more effectually to secure the Payment; which it was thought would be carried through before the Rising of the Parliament.

Yesterday arrived here Captain Thompson, in 19 Days from the Hayannah, by whom we learn, that our Troops which remain there are in general very healthy, and that they were preparing to embark, as soon as the Spanish Soldiers, &c. should arrive to take Possession of the Place: That the Spanish Prize Men of War were fitted for the Sea, and lay ready to sail for England; but that the two Ships of the Line found on the Stocks were broke up, and the Dock-yards, Store-houses, &c. were all destroyed, and rendered useless.

NEW-YORK, May 30.

Joseph Murray, Esq; (a Gift also to the College) are immediately to be placed in the College Library, for the Use of the Students, under proper Restrictions and Regulations. With such essential Helps to Learning, may we not flatter ourselves with the Prospect of soon seeing our Youth, hitherto destitute of a Seminary of Learning, vie with our Neighbours in the Knowledge and Improvement of the Liberal Arts and Sciences? The rising Generation will now enjoy a Blessing our Fore-fathers were destitute of, and reap those valuable Advantages which the generous Donors had in View, by bestowing their Libraries on an Infant College, that has been honoured and promoted by the Legislature, several public spirited Gentlemen at home and abroad, and which, every Day, becomes more and more deserving the Countenance, Protection, and Assistance of every Person of Rank and Learning amongst us.

WILLIAMSBURG, May 20.

A Negro Boy in this City, set on by a Couple of Negro Fellows, went in his Mistress's Name to a Shop for some Arsenick to Poison Rats, and got a little; but took the Opportunity, when some Milk and Rice was on the Fire, to drop the Whole amongst it, unperceived: All the Family, consisting of 9 or 10 Persons, eat of it at Dinner, and in a few Minutes after were taken with a violent Vomiting; which creating a Suspicion of Poison being the Occasion, Physicians were immediately called, who ordered them what is necessary in those Cases, and it is hoped are now out of Danger. All the Negroes are taken up, and committed to Prison, and it is hoped will be made Examples of, to deter others from such Villainy.

PHILADELPHIA, June 2.

Yesterday arrived a large Spanish Ship bound from the Havannah to Cadix, having sprung a Leak at Sea, and is in great Distress.

Tuesday arrived here Capt. Whitlock in 26 Days from Barbador, who informs, that two small Pirate Sloops were cruising near Dominico.

ANNAPOLIS, June 9.

An Account, it is said, has been received by an Officer on the Frontiers of Pennsylvania, from Pittsburg, that on the 28th of last Month, Col. Clapbain, and several of his People (where they were posted is not said) were killed by the Indians; as were also Two of the Royal Americans at the Saw-Mill near Pittsburg; that it is likewise reported, that the Indians had attacked Fort Detroit, and reduced the Two Posts called Sandoski and Presquis, on the South Side of Lake Erie.

Yesterday arrived here the Sloop Somerset, Capt. Barwick, from St. Christopher, which he left the 15th of May. He informs us, that the Day before he sailed, a Gentleman there received a Letter from Guadeloupe, giving an Account, that a Spanish Pirate Schooner, of ten Swivel and two Carriage Guns, had taken Two English Brigs with 20,000 l. in specie on board. The same Schooner also took a Sloop belonging to New-Province.

FROM THE LONDON GAZETTE.

WESTMINSTER, April 19.

THIS Day his Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in his Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Stephen Robinson, Knight of the Bath, and one of the Secretaries of State, presented to his Majesty a Message from the House of Commons, containing a Petition from the Commons, that they might be permitted to present to his Majesty a Bill for the better Regulation of the Trade and Commerce of the Colonies, and for the more effectual Security of the same.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I CANNOT put an End to this Session of Parliament, without expressing my Thanks for the signal Zeal and Dispatch which you have manifested in your Proceedings, and which make it unnecessary for me to continue it any longer.

I informed you at your first Meeting, that Preliminary Articles were signed by my Ministers and those of France and Spain; I ordered them to be laid before you, and the Satisfaction which I felt at the approaching Re-establishment of Peace, upon Conditions so honourable to my Crown, and so beneficial to my People, was highly increased, by my receiving from both Houses of Parliament the strongest and most grateful Expressions of their sincere Approbation. Their Articles have been established, and even rendered still more advantageous to my Subjects by the definitive Treaty; and my Expectations have been fully answered, by the happy Effects which the several Alliances of my Crown have derived from this salutary Measure. The Powers at War with my good Brother the King of Prussia, have been induced to agree to such Terms of Accommodation, as that great Prince has approved, and the Success, which has attended my Negotiation, has necessarily and immediately diffused the Blessings of Peace through every Part of Europe.

I acquainted you with my own Resolution to form my Government on a Plan of strict Economy. The Reduction necessary for this Purpose shall be completed with all possible Expedition; and altho' the Army maintained in these Kingdoms will be inferior in Number to that usually kept up in former Times of Peace, yet I trust that the Force proposed, with the Establishment of the National Militia (whose Services I have experienced, and cannot too much commend) will prove a sufficient Security for the future.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I have seen, with the highest Concern, the great Anticipations of the Revenue, and the heavy Debts, which have arisen from the late War, which have reduced you to the unhappy Necessity of imposing further Burthens upon my People. Under these Circumstances, it is my earnest wish to contribute, by every Means, to their Relief. The utmost Frugality shall be observed in the Disposition of the Supplies which you have granted; and when the Accounts of the Money, arising from the Sale of such Prizes as are vested in the Crown, shall be closed, it is my Intention to direct, that the Produce shall be applied to the Public Service.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

The Extension of the Commerce of my Subjects; the Improvement of the Advantages we have obtained; and the Increase of the Publick Revenue, are the proper Works of Peace. To these important and necessary Objects, my Attention shall be directed. I depend upon your constant Care to promote in your several Counties that Spirit of Concord, and that Obedience to Law, which is essential to good Order, and to the Happiness of my faithful Subjects. It is your Part to discourage every Attempt of a contrary Tendency; it shall mine firmly to maintain the Honour of my Crown, and to protect the Rights of my People.

Then the Lord Chancellor prorogued the Parliament to Thursday the 23d Day of June next.

St. James's, April 20. His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to declare the Right Hon. Hugh Earl of Newmarket, Lieutenant General, and General Governor of his Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland.

April 22. His Majesty having been pleased to deliver the Body of the Privy Seal in his Grace George Duke of Marlborough, the Oath of Keeper of the Privy Seal was administered unto him; and his Grace took his Seat at the Board accordingly.

ADMIRALTY-OFFICE, April 19.

Copy of a Letter from Vice Admiral Cornwallis, to Mr. Cleveland, dated in the Bay of Manila, the 31st of October, 1762.

It is with the greatest Pleasure I have the Honour to acquaint their Lordships with the Success of his Majesty's Arms in the Reduction of the City of Manila, which was taken by Storm, on the Morning of the 6th Instant. In my Letters of the 23d and 31st of July, I painted their Lordships with my Proceedings to that Point; after which I used every possible Means at Madras to dispatch the Decline of the S. W. Monsoon making of the utmost Importance. To promote this End, I dispatched the Elizabeth, Captain Leach, Westmouth, Argos, with such of the Troops and military Stores as were to take her board; and on the 29th sent them away, under the Command of Commodore Tiddeman, to proceed to Manila, with a View that they might complete their Service there, by the Time I should arrive with the Remainder of the Squadron.

After receiving the Embarkation of every Thing necessary for the Expedition, with a Dispatch much beyond my Expectation, as we had, from the whole Time of my being in the Bay, a violent Surf to be feared with, I left the 28th of August, the Ships under my Command, viz. Norfolk, Panther, and

Merita, Seaforth, South-Sea Castle Store-Ship, Admiral Store-Ship, Offshore Company's Ship, leaving the Falkland, at the Request of the President and Council, to convey the Essex India Ship, who was not ready to sail, having the Treasure taken on board for the China's Cargo, and to bring to Manila such of the Company's Servants as were to be put in Possession of that Government, if the Expedition succeeded.

The 19th I arrived at Malacca, and was disappointed in not finding Mr. Tiddeman there, who did not join till the 21st, having met with long Calms: The Difficulty of Watering the Squadron at this Place, made it the 27th before I could leave the Road.

On the 2d of September I arrived off Pulo Tisman, and was joined by Captain Grant, in the Sea-Horse, whom I had detached, upon my first Arrival at Madras, to cruise between this Island and the Straights of Singapore, to stop any Vessels he might suspect going to Manila.

On the 19th I made the Coast of Luconia, but was driven off again by a strong N. E. Wind, which separated some of the Squadron. The 22d the Gale broke up, and the Wind shifting to the S. W. the 23d we recovered the Land again; the next Day entered the Bay of Manila, and, in the Close of the Evening, anchored off the Fort of Cavite, with the whole Squadron, except the South-Sea Castle, and Admiral Stevens; the Falkland and Essex having joined me off the Coast. In the Night I sent the Mallet to sound about the Fortifications of Cavite, and, by their Report, found that it might be attacked by Ships.

The 25th, in the Morning, the Wind not being favourable to attack the Cavite, I took two of the Frigates, and with General Draper, and some other Officers, reconnoitred the Shore about Manila, and observed some Churches, and other Buildings, to stand near the Works, on the South Side of the Town, particularly towards the S. W. Bastion. We had some Design of attacking Cavite first, to have had the Convenience of that Port for the Shipping; but considered, that though the Attack should be attended with all the Success we could hope, yet it would cause a Delay of two Days at least, before we could Land at Manila, which Time would afford Opportunity to the Enemy to demolish the Buildings near their Works, and to prepare many Obstacles to our Landing, and perhaps recover from that Conformation our unexpected Arrival had thrown them in; and farther, Manila being the Capital, if that fell, Cavite would in Consequence.

From these Circumstances, I joined in Opinion with the General, to take Advantage of Circumstances so favourable for a Descent, and land the Troops with all Dispatch, and endeavour to get Possession of some Posts near their Works, which, if effected, would greatly facilitate the Reduction of the City.

In Consequence of these Resolutions, I immediately made the Signal on board the Sea-Horse, for the Squadron to join me, and for the Troops to prepare to land. About 7 in the Evening the 70th Regiment, with the Marines in the Boats, under the Direction of the Captains Parker, Kempenfelt and Breverton, pushed for the Shore; and under the Fire of 3 Frigates, effected the Landing at a Church called the Morita, about a Mile and a Half from the Walls. We had no Opposition from the Enemy, but some Difficulty from the Surf, which ran high, and bilged all the Long-Boats, but happily lost no Men. The next Morning the General took an advanced Post, about 200 Yards from the Glacis, and there, under Cover of a Blind, intended his Battery against the Face of the S. W. Bastion. The Number of Troops being small, I landed a Battalion of Seamen, of about 700 Men, under Command of the Captains Collins, Pitchford, and George Orry.

The 25th I dispatched three armed Boats after a Galley coming up the Bay to Manila; they came up with her, resolutely boarded her, and took her, notwithstanding the kept a smart Fire with Patterned and Musket; the mounted Carriage and 17 Brass Swivel Guns, and had 20 Men. By Letters found in her, we discovered she was dispatched from the Galleon St. Philipina, from Acapulco, and whom she had left the 10th of September, at Callagan, between the Embocadero and Cape Spiritu Santo. Upon this Discovery I came to a Resolution to send the Panther and Argos in Quest of her, but it was the 4th of October before the Weather permitted their sailing.

The 23th of September the General acquainted me, that he was beginning to work on the Battery, and that if some Ships could get near enough to throw Shot on the Works of the Town opposite to it, it might take off some of the Enemy's Fire and Attention, and thereby facilitate its Construction. In Consequence of this, I ordered Commodore Tiddeman, with the Elizabeth and Falkland, towards the Town, as near as the Depth of Water would permit, and to place the Ships in such a Position as would best answer the Purpose intended, which was accordingly done the next Day, and their Fire had a very good Effect.

On the 30th, the South-Sea Castle arrived with Stores, which were much wanted, particularly the entrenching Tools, for want of which the Army had been so greatly distressed, that I was obliged to employ all the Forces in making Spades, Pickaxes, &c. for them. The 31st of October I began to blow stiff, and in the Night increased to a hard Gale, which drove the South-Sea Castle ashore near the Palayrita, a little to the Southward of our Camp. This Accident, however, had some considerable Advantages attending it, as the Situation the lay in, made her Cannon a Protection for the Rear of our Camp. It was likewise the Means that all her Military Stores were got on Shore with Safety and Dispatch, and the Army supplied with the Provision she had on board, both which were Articles they stood in immediate Need of, and which could not have been supplied by Boats, as it continued blowing Weather for several Days after, and the Surf breaking very high on the Beach. This Gale was from

the W. S. W. directly on the Shore, which gave much Concern for the Elizabeth and Falkland, who were only in four Fathom Water, and, as I have since been informed, with the Seed of the Sea struck; but the Bottom being Mud, and soft to a considerable Depth, they received no Damage. On the 4th in the Morning, the General opened the Battery, which was so well managed, and seconded by the Ships before the Town, that in four Hours the Defences were taken off, and the next Day in the Evening, the Breach was made practicable.

On the 6th, at Day-light in the Morning, the General's Regiment, with the Sea Battalion, mounted the Breach; made the Attack, and soon got Possession of all the Bastions, which completed the Conquest. I immediately went on Shore, and, with the General, had a Meeting with the Spanish Governor, and some of his principal Officers, when a Capitulation was agreed on, that the Town and Port of Cavite, with the Islands and Forts depending on Manila, should be given up to his Britannick Majesty; and that they should pay Four Millions of Dollars for the Preservation of the Town and their Effects (a Copy of which Capitulation I have enclosed.)

On the 12th I sent Capt. Kempenfelt in the Norfolk, with the Seaforth and Seaforth, to take Possession of Cavite, agreeable to the Capitulation; by this Acquisition we are in Possession of a very large Quantity of Naval Stores; and besides the Advantage of almost every Convenience for refitting a Squadron, the People are supplied with fresh Meat and Vegetables in great Plenty.

The Siege, though short, was attended with many Difficulties, and great Fatigues, in which both the Officers and Men exerted themselves with the utmost Cheerfulness. We had constantly fresh Gales, a Lee Shore, and consequently a high Surf to contend with, which made it always difficult, frequently hazardous, and sometimes impossible to land with Boats. The Rains fell very heavy, and our little Army were surrounded and harassed by numerous Bodies of Indians, who, though undisciplined, and armed only with Lances, and Bows and Arrows, yet by a daring Resolution, and Contempt of Death, they became not only troublesome but formidable. I have the Satisfaction of acquainting their Lordships that throughout the whole Expedition, the most perfect Harmony and Unanimity has subsisted between his Majesty's Land and Sea Forces.

You will receive with this an Account of the Number of Officers and Men, both Seamen and Marines, that were landed from the Squadron, as likewise of the killed and wounded in each Corps. It is with Concern I acquaint their Lordships with the Loss of Commodore Tiddeman, who in attempting to enter the River in his Barge, the Morning after the Reduction of Manila, was drowned, with five of his People; by which unhappy Accident, his Majesty has lost a brave and experienced Officer.

Capt. Kempenfelt, by whom I send this (and will present to you for their Lordships, a Plan of the Town of Manila, and the Port of Cavite) has been of the greatest Assistance to me during the Course of this Enterprise; he is very capable of furnishing their Lordships with many Particulars necessary for their Information; and his great Merit makes it my Duty to recommend him as a very able good Officer. Copy of a Letter from Vice Admiral Cornwallis to Mr. Cleveland, dated in the Bay of Manila, the 31st of October, 1762.

IN my Letter of the 31st of October, I acquainted you of my having sent Capt. Parker, with the Panther and Argos, in Quest of the Galleon St. Philipina, from Acapulco, bound to Manila.

The 7th Instant Capt. King, in the Argos, returned with a Letter from Capt. Parker, acquainting me, that in Consequence of my Orders, having the 26th of October, got the Length of the Island Ceylon, near the Entrance of the Embocadero, in Pursuit of the Saint Philipina, where the Argos had come to an Anchor (and which he intended to do that Night) just as the Day closed saw a Sail, and stood to the Northward; at 8 in the Evening he got Sight of the Chace, about two Leagues to Leeward, but unluckily, by the Rapidity of a Counter Current, to what the Chace was in, was drove among the Narrows, in the utmost Danger of being lost, and obliged to anchor; the Frigate, having escaped the Danger of being lost, got up with the Chace, and engaged her near two Hours; but was so roughly handled, that Capt. King was obliged to bring to, to repair his Damages.

By this Time the Current slackened, which enabled Captain Parker to get under Sail with the Chace in Sight. About Nine the next Morning he came up with her, and after battering her near two Hours he struck. The Enemy made but little Resistance, trusting to the Immense Thickness of the Sides of their Ship, which the Panther's Shot was unable to penetrate, excepting her upper Works. Captain Parker was no less disappointed, than surprised, when the General came on board, to find that instead of the Saint Philipina, he had engaged and taken the Santissima Trinidad, who departed from Manila the 10th of August for Acapulco, and had got 300 Leagues in the Eastward of Embocadero; but meeting with a hard Gale of Wind, was dis-masted, and put back to sea. She had 100 Men on board, and pierced for 60 Guns, but when Captain King engaged her, had only 12 masted, and but 25 when taken; she drew 33 Feet Water, and is a much larger Ship than the Panther. I cannot ascertain the Value of her Cargo, but there is the Amount of one Million and a Half of Dollars registered, and she is computed to be worth three Millions.

Capt. King left the Panther with her Prize at an Anchor about three Leagues South of the Corrientes, at the Mouth of this Bay; and as I have sent a Reinforcement of Men with the Seaforth and Seaforth, I hope very soon to have them in Safety. I am, &c.

St. JOHN'S (in ANTIGUA) April 27.
Extract of a Letter from Bartholomew Putman, Master of the Schooner Leopard, who sailed from this Island the 21st Instant, bound for Martinico, dated Basseterre, Guadalupe, April the 25th, to a Person in this Town.

It is with much Grief I acquaint you of my great Misfortune, which I met with the 23d at one o'clock in the Morning, five Leagues Distance from Dominica, W. S. W. being boarded by a Spanish PIRATE, and after being stripped and used barbarously, was turned adrift with my Boat without Water, or Provisions of any Kind.

I cannot inform you rightly where she belonged to; only from what they told me, which was, that she did belong to the Island of Margarita, and that the Captain's Name is Antonio. She had one Carriage and 12 Swivel Guns, and 24 Hands; but had mangled six Persons, and for the most Part cruised off Dominica, and has been there for 5 Weeks. I beg you would send this Account to my Owners in Salem.

The above Schooner of Capt. Putman's is about 30 Tons Burthen, Newberry built, long and narrow; this her second Voyage from New-England; has a long Quarter Deck, which taken in her Main-mast and Pump; has a Scuttle under the Tiller before the Rudder-case of about 18 or 20 Inches square; her Cabin Floor mostly cased; has plain solid Quarter Pieces; had two Top-masts to carry standing Top-sails; tarred Sides, and black Bottom.

BOSTON, May 30.
By a Gentleman lately arrived from Jamaica, we learn, that on or about the first of April, a Number of Negroes in the Country having attempted an Insurrection on the Inhabitants, a Party went out against them, and speedily put a Stop to their Progress, after their barbarously murdering several of the Settlers there. Several of the Negroes were taken and executed before the Gentleman left that Place.

NEW-YORK, June 2.
On Tuesday last arrived the Brigantine Gosport, Capt. Alexander Taylor, in 8 Weeks from Gibraltar, from whence Admiral Saunders's Squadron sail'd for England three Days before he left that Place, where Sir Percy Brett, and Commodore Amherst, were left with 3 Ships of the Line, and 3 Frigates.

A few Days ago, a Man who came from North-Carolina to Trade on the Eastern-Shore, Forged a Parcel of Crop Notes, and Sold them to some Gentlemen in Talbot County for good Ones, and went off before the Roguery was discovered, with the Cash, to the Value of about Sixteen Hogsheds.

St. JOHN'S (in ANTIGUA) April 27.
Extract of a Letter from Bartholomew Putman, Master of the Schooner Leopard, who sailed from this Island the 21st Instant, bound for Martinico, dated Basseterre, Guadeloupe, April the 25th, to a Person in this Town.

It is with much Grief I acquaint you of my great Misfortune, which I met with the 23d at one o'Clock in the Morning, five Leagues Distance from Dominica, W. S. W. being boarded by a Spanish PIRATE, and after being strip and used barbarously, was turned adrift with my Boat without Water, or Provisions of any Kind.

I cannot inform you rightly where she belonged to; only from what they told me, which was, that she did belong to the Island of Margaritta, and that the Captain's Name is Antony. She had one Carriage and 12 Swivel Guns, and 24 Hands; but had manned six Pieces, and for the most Part cruised off Dominica, and has been there for 5 Weeks. I beg you would send this Account to my Owners in Salem.

The above Schooner of Capt. Putman's is about 80 Tons Burthen, Newberry built, long and narrow; this her second Voyage from New-England; has a long Quarter Deck, which takes in her Main-mast and Pumps; has a Scuttle under the Tiller before the Rudder-case of about 18 or 20 Inches square; her Cabin Floor neatly cased; has plain solid Quarter Pieces; had two Top-masts to carry standing Top-sails; tarred Sides, and black Bottom.

BOSTON, May 30.

By a Gentleman lately arrived from Jamaica, we learn, that on or about the first of April, a Number of Negroes in the Country having attempted an Insurrection on the Inhabitants, a Party went out against them, and speedily put a Stop to their Progress, after their barbarously murdering several of the Settlers there. An Account of the Expedition against Manila; and a Journal of the Siege; under the Command of Rear-Admiral CORNHAM, and Brigadier-General DRAKE. Communicated by Mr. Waters, Midshipman on board the Seahorse, a young Gentleman not 17 Years of Age.

September 25, 1762.

OUR whole Fleet arrived safe in Manila Bay, except the South-Sea Castle Bomb, and Admiral Stevens's Storeship, which parted company before we made the Philippine Islands. We anchored so late in the evening, that no landing could be attempted that night; all that could be done was to send the masters of the squadron to find a proper place for the descent, clear of rocks and shoals.

14th. This morning a Spanish officer was sent on board the Admiral, with orders to enquire the reason of our coming into their port, whether we had been drove in by distress or presumed to come in a hostile manner to their impregnable city; informing the Admiral and General that the custom was, never to admit foreign ships into their port, without first having permission. The Spaniards knew nothing of the war, and might be unprepared for us; but instead of discovering any signs of fear, when the General told him the cause of our boldness, he smiled, and said that the enterprise was rash, that he really believed their walls and ditch sufficiently protected them against our most vigorous efforts; but this security caused the distress into which they fell, for it is very plain they might have put themselves into a much better posture of defence, and made it a dear purchase to us. The General being desirous to reconnoitre the ground as soon as the Spanish Officer was dismissed, upon which he was attended by the Admiral and other principal officers on board the frigates; we sailed close by Fort Cavite, till we came to a church called Malata, about one mile to the Southward of Manila. This spot, from its situation, answered our purpose, the General determined it for the landing; in the dusk of the evening his Majesty's 79th regiment, with the marines and artillery, were landed, with two field pieces under the fire of the frigates, without meeting any opposition. This was no small point gained, and convinced us the enemy knew but little of the science of war, had they (as was expected) placed a field-piece or two on the beach, they must have killed a great number of our men.

15th. This morning the 79th regiment advanced to a church called Hermita, within 500 yards of the fort, where the General established his headquarters at eleven o'clock Capt. Fletcher took possession of St. Jago church, which was an excellent place for the engineers to observe the enemy's works from its top. Upon our troops advancing, the enemy began a brisk fire, which continued all the remainder of the day; the General was resolved to defend this post, and so prevented the enemy from burning the village between us and the fort; thereby securing to our army good quarters, without which the siege could not be carried on in that rainy season, for the soil is a thick mire, so that the natives support their houses six feet from the ground by posts.

16th. The enemy, sensible of their error in suffering us to take St. Jago church, advanced in the morning to the Bagumbay, a church 150 yards from the fort, to dislodge us from St. Jago, but were soon brought back. The enemy's dastardly behaviour induced the General to summon the Town; but the Archbishop replied, that the garrison was too strong of Europeans to be reduced, besides 15000 Indians. At Night began to play with two eight inch mortars.

17th. The Admiral landed 550 seamen, under the command of Captains Collins of the Weymouth, Pitchford of the America, and Curry of the Panther.

18th. In the morning the Admiral sent the Governor's nephew ashore; he was taken in the Bay, on his passage to Manila from the outward bound Gallion, arrived on the coast (which the Panther of 60, and the Argo of 30 Guns, were dispatched in quest of.) The General sent Lieutenant Fryer with a flag of truce to conduct him to the fort; but a body of furious Indians rushed out of the gate, and cut Mr. Fryer to pieces and mortally wounded the young gentleman. To-night the English produced a matted blind along the ground, marked out for the battery, to screen our workmen in the day from the enemy.

19th. The Elizabeth of 60 guns, Commodore Tiddeman, and the Falmouth of 50, Capt. Brereton, run as high to the fort as possible, and began cannonading. At night our men got two Royals up, and began with them, as well as the 8 inch mortars; the enemy returned several shells.

20th. The South-Sea Castle arrived, which made success appear the more certain, as he had all the intrenching tools, and a reinforcement of Seapoys, and the Nabob's Topazes, or Black Soldiers.

21st. The wind coming to blow very hard, the South-Sea Castle drove on shore. This was not unlucky for our troops, as they were immediately landed; and the shores they were in great need of; otherwise the high surf would have prevented the boats from landing.

22. Our engineers got the guns mounted for battering the bastion St. Diego.

23. At day-break our batteries were opened against the bastion, and in five hours time ruined its defences, and dismounted several of their guns; four of our guns were kept employed all night, to prevent the enemy from repairing the breach.

24th. The Spaniards, judging they must soon be exposed to an assault, resolved their Indians should fall upon our troops in the dark. Accordingly, in the middle of the night, 6000 Indians sallied out quietly, till they came to the seamen's quarters; then they began shouting, and running about in such disorder, that they were presently forced to retire; regardless of the constant firing which was kept upon them, they continued their effort till day light, and then retreated in confusion.

During the fray, a strong body of Spaniards forced our Seapoys guards at the Bagumbay fort; but a body of our men being sent to retake it, the enemy's loss in this affair was considerable. The Indians were so discouraged at this day's treatment, that several thousands of them returned to their respective homes.

25th. The breach being practicable, and all the defences ruined, the General gave the necessary orders for the assault, privately to the principal officers only, fearing that any public notice relating thereto, might be carried to the enemy by deserters or spies.

26th. At four this morning, the 79th regiment, with the Company's troops and the seamen, marched up to St. Jago's church. A little after day light, a volunteer party of sixty men from the different corps, appointed for the forlorn hope, headed by Lieut. Russell, of the 79th regiment, mounted the breach, and was in possession of the bastion before the enemy had time, after the alarm, to assemble the garrison. The General immediately followed with the rest of the troops, whose presence had so good an effect, that it fired the men with bravery. The Spaniards flew to their churches and houses, whence a tolerable resistance was made for some time; many, to avoid the fury of the conquerors, jumped into the river, and about 300 were drowned. The Governor and principal officers flew to the citadel, but soon surrendered prisoners at discretion. A party of our marines took possession also of Cavite; our hundred refusing to surrender at the Royal Gate, were put to the sword.

FRANCIS WATERS.

In another Account of this great Acquisition, relating the Transactions of the 1st of October, published in the London Gazette, is the following. "About 3 Hours before Day 1000

of the Indians attacked the Cantonment of the Seamen. They were encouraged to this Attempt by the incessant Raids, in which they flattered themselves our Fire Arms would be useless. Their Approach was favoured by a great Number of thick Bushes that grew upon the Side of a Rivulet, which they passed in the Night, and by keeping close, eluded the Vigilance of the Patroles. Upon the Alarm Col. Monlon, and Capt. Fletcher, with the Picquets, were dispatched to the Assistance of the Seamen, who very sensibly kept firm in their Posts, and were contented to repulse them, till Day-break, when a fresh Picquet of the 79th Regiment appearing upon the Indians' right Flank, they fled, were pursued and dispersed with the Loss of 300 Men. Had their Skill or Weapons been equal to their Strength and Ferocity, it might have cost us dear. Although armed chiefly with Bows, Arrows, and Lances, they advanced up to the very Muzzles of our Pieces, repeated their Assaults, and died like wild Beasts, gnawing the Bayonets."

BERLIN, April 5.

IT is hardly possible to express the Joy with which the Inhabitants of this City received their Sovereign, who arrived here the 30th of last Month, in perfect Health. They pierced the Air with repeated Acclamations of, LONG LIVE OUR KING AND FATHER! To which his Majesty most affectionately vouchsafed to answer, LONG LIVE MY DEAREST SUBJECTS, MY BELOVED CHILDREN! In this Manner he was ushered to the Palace, where he supped with the Queen, and all the Royal Family. The next Day he received the Compliments of the Nobility, foreign Ministers, and dined with Duke Ferdinand of Brunswick, who arrived here from Magdebourg the Day before his Majesty. In the Afternoon his Majesty, accompanied by that Prince, went to visit the Princes and Princesses, his Brothers and Sisters. The greatest Rejoicings have continued ever since, and last Night the whole City was magnificently illuminated.

LONDON, April 18.

The Augusta Yacht is fitting out with all possible Expedition, and will sail in a few Days for Holland, in order to bring over the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick, to espouse a Princess, who is justly distinguished by the Character of being one of the most amiable young Ladies in all the World.

On Saturday Afternoon last a Body of Sailors assembled on Tower-Hill, and having heard that several Thieves and Pick-Pockets had disguised themselves in Sailors Habits, they thought of the following Expedient to discover whether any of these Gentlemen had got amongst them, by making every Man say his Complaint; two Fellows seemed to know little about the Matter, on which they were asked, How do you put your Ship about? They replied, Their Ship was never put about all the Time they belonged to her! The Yacht then stripped the two pretended Sailors, tied them to a Post, each Man gave them a Downy Lash a-piece, they were just about their Business.

Extract of a Letter from Gibraltar, March 10. The first Lieutenant of the 11th went out a few Days ago to shoot Gulls, but not having killed any, the Purser laughed at him, and told him he was but a bad Marksman. The Lieutenant answered, he could shoot as well as any Person in the Garrison. The Purser replied, I'll hold you Half a Guinea that you don't hit me with a single Ball at the Distance of 40 Yards: Done, says the Lieutenant, and let us immediately go ashore and try. Accordingly they both went ashore to the

Dock-yard, and the Lieut. measured out the Ground; and then being a Wooden Horse for the Support of the Cable, he rested his Piece on it and aimed at the Purser at the Dock-gate. The Centinel asked him what he was going about? He answered, Only to shoot an old Purser that is weary of his Life. He then called to the Purser (who stood facing him) to know if he was ready? who answered, he was; on which he fired; and the Ball tore the Purser's Foot and Leg, in a terrible Manner, that the Surgeon was obliged to cut off his Leg immediately. A Mortification ensued, and the old Man next Day gave up the Ghost. The Lieutenant yielded up himself a Prisoner directly, and Yesterday he was Tried and found Guilty; but his Sentence is respited till his Majesty's Pleasure is known. — He said but little at his Trial: His own Captain and several others, gave him a very good Character.

Letters from France advise, that the King of Spain will not be any great Loser by our taking the Manillas, as the Whole of that Trade was in the Hands of the Jesuits. A Proposal was made to the late King of Spain to put a Stop to that Trade, it being a Loss to the King and the Spanish Nation; but the Jesuits had Art enough to prevent its taking Effect.

A Squadron of Ships of War is getting ready to sail for the Mediterranean, with the several Officers appointed to command in the Island of Minorca, and with the Squadron many Transports will sail, laden with great Quantities of warlike Stores and Provisions; but we do not hear of any Troops going there from England or Ireland.

A Number of People, by Royal Bounty, will very shortly embark for America, to settle there with their Families.

The last Letters from Spain bring Advice, that some Ships with Troops on board, were sailed for the Havannah.

A Letter from Paris, dated April 18, says, "An infinite Number of young People are under Engagement to embark from Breit, in the Course of next Month, for the new discovered Island in the East-Indies."

Several Transports are ordered round to Plymouth, to take three Regiments on board, that are ordered to Gibraltar, to relieve Part of the Garrison of that Place.

It is said the Militia is to be kept on the present Establishment for three Years; each County to keep up its Complement of Men, who are to be mustered and instructed in the Military Exercise 28 Days in each Year, which are to be appointed by the Officers.

Yesterday Morning a Gentleman, walking by the Serpentine River in Hyde-Park, was crossed two or three times by a well-looking young Man, who at last made a full Stop before him, and bid him stand. The Gentleman upon this demanded what he wanted; to which the poor Man, bursting out into Tears, answered, I want to rob you, but can't. The Gentleman's Humanity was struck at so great an Instance of Sensibility, and assuring the Man he might be under no Apprehension, enquired into the Motives which induced him to take so dangerous a Course; when it appeared that the poor young Fellow had been a Midshipman on board a Man of War, but that his Ship being paid off, he was out of all Manner of Employment, and reduced to the utmost Distress, having an infirm Mother to support, besides a Wife and two Children. The Gentleman was so much affected at his Story, that he gave him two Guineas, and dismissed him, with some cordial Advice upon the proper Methods to pursue, which the other seemed to receive with the most lively Marks of Gratitude and Satisfaction.

Part of the Troops now in Portugal will be draughted off for Minorca, in order to garrison that Fortress.

It is now said that the Treasure, &c. taken at the Manillas, is not so great as at first reported.

It is said that 18 Boxes of Silver, which the Jesuits were sending out of France, have been seized.

A Treaty of Commerce between the Courts of Versailles, Madrid, and London, is talked of, by which great Advantages will accrue to the three Nations.

A Treaty of Marriage is on Foot between the Archduke Peter Leopold of Austria, aged 15, and the Princess Maria Beatrice, Daughter of the Hereditary Prince of Modena aged Fourteen.

Great Insurances have been making for some Days past on a very rich Ship coming from the South-Sea, on which they give 25 Guineas per Cent.

His Prussian Majesty has directed the Pictures of all the great Officers who fell during the late War, to be painted by the best Masters in Germany, in order to adorn a new Room at Potsdam, which is to be called, The Hall of Heroes.

Not a Day or Night passes without Robberies, such Swarms of Rogues has the Peace let loose upon us, which are daily increasing, as the Ships are paid off.

May 3. On Saturday last, John Wilkes, Esq; Member of Parliament for Aylesbury, was taken into Custody, by four of his Majesty's Messengers, and committed Prisoner to the Tower, by the Secretaries of State; being charged with writing a Paper published in the North Briton of Saturday the 23d of April last. The same Afternoon a Motion was made before the Lord Chief Justice of the Court of Common Pleas, Westminster-Hall, for a Habeas Corpus to remove him from Confinement, that he might answer to the said Charge in Court. Accordingly this Morning, about Half past Ten o'Clock, he was brought in a Coach from the Tower of London, attended by the Deputy Constable, and other Officers, over London Bridge, and St. George's Fields, to the Court of Common Pleas, Westminster-Hall (which was much crowded on the Occasion) in order that he might be admitted to Bail, which he refused, pleading by his Council, Mr. Sergeant Glynn, for his Discharge. The Point in Debate, which lasted from Eleven o'Clock till a Quarter past Two, was concerning the Validity of his Commitment; and, after several learned Arguments, it was postponed till Friday Morning next, and Mr. Wilkes was remanded back again to the Tower; his Friends, in the mean-Time, are to have free

Access to him. Mr. Wilkes himself spoke much on the Occasion.

We are informed, that upon a certain Commoner's Arrival at the Tower, he told the Lieutenant he had a particular Favour to ask him; which the latter politely assured him he might command, if consistent with his Office. He then requested he might be lodged in a Room which had never yet been inhabited by a SCOTCH REBEL. The Lieutenant replied, he feared he had made a Request out of his Power to gratify.

Cork, March 24. Saturday last one of the People called Levellers or Whiteboys (who was concerned with about 20 others in carrying off William Howay, from the House of his Master, John Willington of the County of Tipperary, Esq; and in barbarously cutting his Tongue and Chin, with a Knife, on the 18th Day of February last) was capitally convicted at the Assizes of Clonmell, and received Sentence of Death, to be executed within two Days.

Gloucester, April 11. On Saturday last the following Address was presented to Charles Barrow, Esq; one of our Representatives in Parliament, by Deputation from a public Meeting of a large Number of his Constituents, who drew up and signed the same at the Boothall in this City.

"SIR,

"Alarmed at the late fatal Blow to Liberty, we, a considerable Part of the Body of Freemen of this City, animated by a lively Sense of Gratitude on your Arrival here, have publicly assembled to manifest our high Esteem of, and to take this, the earliest Opportunity, unanimously to return our sincerest Thanks, for your upright Conduct in Parliament, on all Occasions; but more especially for that last Instance of your watchful Care over our Liberties, by your steady and vigorous Opposition to a late Bill for laying an additional Duty on Cyder and Perry, by Way of Excise; any Extension of which having ever been deemed dangerous to the Liberties of a free People.

"However ineffectual those your utmost and best Endeavours may have proved, yet nevertheless you are equally entitled to our warmest and most grateful Acknowledgments; and will, we are persuaded, always be remembered by us and others our Fellow-Citizens, with the most affectionate and unfeigned Gratitude."

LONDON, April 18. The Indictment against Mr. Rice, the Broker, for Forgery, was laid for only 500*l.* though he had transferred of the Lady's Stock 19,900*l.* Mr. Fennellett, one of the Clerks of the South Sea-house, was the first Witness called, who proved the filling up the Letter of Attorney. Mr. Louth, another Clerk of the South Sea-house, proved the filling up the Transfer, saw Rice execute it, and swore that he witnessed the same. Mr. Ball the Supervisor, proved the Letter of Attorney passing the Committee. Mr. Montague, the Deputy Accomptant, acquainted the Court of the Stock being replaced to Mrs. Pierce, after the above fraudulent Transfer. Mrs. Pierce was then called, who being shown the Letter of Attorney, denied it being her Hand writing, and deposed she never gave him any such Power. No other Witness was called on Behalf of the Prosecution. The Court then acquainted Mr. Rice it was his Time to make his Defence, who answered he had nothing to say, but desired some Gentlemen might be called to his Character, two of which were sworn, who spoke of him as a Person of Credit in his Profession. The Court acquainted him, where Proofs were positive, Character would have little Weight, so no more were called. Mr. Rice then urged, that he had been offered Protection at Cambridge, if he would have changed his Religion. He was dressed in a Suit of light Grey, trimmed with Black, and had a Bag Wig on; he was indulged with being at the Inner Bar, and was allowed a Chair; seemed much affected, and shed Tears most Part of the Trial.

About Five in the Evening he was again brought up to the Bar, with the other Prisoners, to receive Sentences of Death, which was passed upon them, in a most pathetic and moving Manner, by the new Recorder. The Court was not full, owing to the Demand for the Galleries being One Guinea for Front, and Half a Guinea for back Seats.

April 19. Mr. Rice the Broker is not confined in the Cells of Newgate, but is favoured with an Apartment on the Master side. Yesterday Mrs. Rice presented a Petition to his Majesty, in Behalf of her Husband, now under Sentence of Death in Newgate; on Delivery of which she was so overcome with Grief, that she fainted away.

There is something singular in the Fate of John Turner, a Convict, under Sentence of Death in Newgate; he stole a Silver Tankard on Monday last, was taken on the Tuesday, sent to Newgate on the Wednesday, capitally convicted on the Thursday, and received Sentence of Death at the Old-Bailey on Friday.

April 21. There were found at the Manillas, among many other Curiosities, and brought here by Col. Draper, eight Copper Plates, on which are engraved a most particular Map of the Philippine Islands adorned with the Customs and Habits of the Inhabitants of those Parts, which was done by Order of the Governor, and dedicated to his most Catholic Majesty.

We are informed that Mr. Rice is very ill in his Room, in Newgate, and that not any one Acquaintance is permitted to see him.

BOSTON, June 9.

A most shocking Murder was committed last Saturday at Taunton, by a Negro Fellow belonging to Dr. McKinty;—a Sister of the Doctor's getting up early in the Morning to iron Clothes, the Negro (after making a Fire) got his Master's Horse, and left him at the Door, and finding an Opportunity took up a hot Flat-iron, with which he struck the Woman on the Back of her Head, and stunned her, he repeated the Blow, then dragged her down into the Cellar, and there with an old Ax struck her several Times; he then took the hot Iron, and rubbed over her Face, sticking the Point of it into her Eyes, whereby she was scorched considerably; after he had done this, he took the Horse and rode off.—The Family soon got up and found the Woman in the above Condition; she continued till the Evening of the next Day, and then died: The Negro was pursued, and taken up at Newport, and confessed the Fact.—What

induced the Fellow to perpetrate this Crime is not known, as he was always treated well, and there had been no Difference with him in the Family.

NEW-POR T, June 6.

The Brig Royal Charlotte, Capt. Taylor, arrived here last Thursday from Annamaboa, on the Coast of Africa, after a Passage of 110 Days; by whom we have the affecting Intelligence of the the tragical Death of Capt. George Frost, and Mr. William Grant, his Mate, both of this Town, which was perpetrated by the Slaves on board his Sloop, as she lay at Anchor in the River Gaboon, in the Month of November last. Capt. Frost having Occasion either for some Wood or Water, sent two of his Men and a Negro on Shore for that Purpose, himself, the Mate, and a Negro, who belonged to the Vessel, remaining on board; and in the Mens Absence he unfortunately permitted the Slaves, to the Number of about 60, to come upon Deck, who immediately seized him, with the Negro Man, and threw them overboard. Mr. Grant at this Time lay sick in his Cabin, unable to rise. Capt. Frost swam up to the Vessel, in order to get on board again; upon which the Slaves threw a Lance at him, which penetrated his Body, where it remained, and with which he attempted to gain the Shore, but after swimming about Half the Way, he sunk, and was seen no more. The Negro, who was thrown over with him, had the good Fortune to get safe ashore.

The Slaves having now the Command of the Vessel, they brought the Small Arms, with several Barrels of Powder, upon Deck; and on some Blacks coming off in Canoes to retake the Vessel, the Slaves on board began firing with their Small Arms, but through Ignorance soon set the Powder on Fire, and in the Explosion about 30 of them were destroyed. The Sloop was retaken 3 Days afterwards, when the most affecting Part of this Affair was disclosed; for on entering the Cabin, the Corps of Mr. Grant was immediately discovered, with his Throat cut in a very shocking Manner, which was supposed to have been done as soon as Capt. Frost and the Negro were thrown over.

A short Time before Capt. Taylor sailed, he heard that the Slaves on board a Sloop belonging to Liverpool, rose upon the People, wounded the Mate, and got Possession of the Vessel, which afterwards ran ashore and beat to Pieces.

Extract of a Letter from London, dated April 30.

"This Day Mr. Wilkes Member of Parliament for Aylesbury, Writer of the North Briton, is sent to the Tower, by Warrant, for treasonable Practices (In other Words, for libelling the Government): In the said North Briton the King's Speech is attacked and treated with unreserved Freedom; and the Warrant sets forth that he has endeavoured to sow Sedition, and alienate the Affections of his Majesty's Subjects.

"It will make a terrible Noise, and no Doubt the City will be all on Fire upon the Occasion; Lord Chief Justice Pratt has granted a Habeas Corpus, and Mr. Wilkes is to be brought, on Monday, to get Bail, if he can obtain it. He refused to apply to Lord Chief Justice Mansfield, as being a Scotchman. I do not imagine that ever Party Spirit carried People to greater Excesses, or was more violently agitated. It is probable Mr. Wilkes will remain in the Tower till the Parliament meets. The Duke of Bedford set out on his Return for France Yesterday."

June 20. One or two Expresses have arrived here since our last from Albany, with Intelligence, it is said, of the Outrages of the Indians on our Out Posts and Back Settlements. And a Gentleman who left Albany last Thursday, informs, that the Evening before, a Man arrived there, who had been wounded by the Indians at a Place called Green Bay [we suppose near Fort Detroit] which he said was entirely destroyed; and that Fort Detroit must have been taken by the Time of his Arrival. He further added, that the Indians had taken nine Battoes, and killed and scalped three Men; and that there were many others missing, particularly Forty of the Queen's Independents, supposed to be cut off.

Several Companies of the Artillery Men embarked Yesterday, said to be ordered Upwards, to reinforce the Garrisons.

A Letter from Albany, dated the 15th Instant, says, "I am sorry to inform you of the bad Success of our Indian Traders: The French Indians have cut off all the Posts and Battoes between Niagara and Detroit, and it is generally believed that Detroit is cut off also.—I am doubtful of the Consequence.—We have an Account of one Evert Wendell being killed, and John Wendell mortally

wounded; they were attacked 40 Miles above Niagara, having 9 Battoes, and 35 Men, out of which Number only 11 are returned to Niagara; they were attacked the 2d Instant. Lieut. Caylor, with 100 Men, was attacked the 28th ult. within 50 Miles of Detroit, and has only brought to Niagara 30 of that Number."
