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Delaney On Masters And Johnson

As long ago as 50 years, a gentleman by the name of Dickinson was well known in the United States from articles, which he wrote, on the subject of human sexuality. His articles were not based on laboratory research but were based on clinical evidence, interviews with people, and his own opinions. Fifty years ago Dickinson eloquently reminded the physicians of the United States that the gonadal impulses were here to stay, that people will continue to get married, and that they will continue to be confused about human sexuality. He argued and pleaded that the field of medicine take the lead in the area of researching human sexual responses. Almost 40 years passed without such research even though others echoed Dickinson's concern during those decades. Kinsey was really the catalyst, the great mover. He presented us with the results of his far-reaching survey of American sexual behaviors -- a survey which must have bloodshot many a puritan eye.

About this time, William Masters was a medical student who bravely told his superiors of his peculiar medical interest: the devotion of his life to the research of human sexual responses. With arched eyebrows his medical professors told him that researching sex was not without peril. Later, Masters took a position at Washington University in Missouri which enabled him to begin conducting lab experiments in human sexual response.

He took for a colleague and partner (and recently, a wife) Virginia Johnson, whose background is neither in medicine or psychology, but in sociology. He found her to be a person with whom he could communicate and he recognized that she had a wonderful ability to successfully work with people, a talent he knew he did not possess. In the last several years Masters and Johnson have published monumental texts on human sexuality. The most well known is their first: "Human Sexual Response," and their second, published a little over a year ago is entitled, "Human Sexual Inadequacy." Their first book was a sell-out even though most people impossible understand. It was so obtuse most people couldn't hack it. It was purposely written that way: almost undecipherable because they wanted the book to receive the "A" of scholarship and not the "X" of pornography.
Masters and Johnson have

not gone without criticism rather severe in two areas: an alleged breach of ethics in their research with respect to the use of some mechanical devices and the criticism that their research was generally immoral.

This evening, ladies and gentlemen, I would like to talk about what contributions Masters and Johnson have made to our understanding of human sexual responses. Permit me to present their research in three approach to Firstly, their research; secondly, what we have learned from their research; thirdly, psychological implications of their research.

First of all, their approach

to research depended on the pool of subjects. Initially, they recruited prostitutes as subjects. But when Masters and Johnson began their work they had to be pretty careful about publicity. They were afraid if their work became known to outsiders (A.M.A., D.A.R., AFL-CIo, and others who would be upset to hear about experimental subjects balling in the name of science) it would cease to be funded and come to a screaching halt. So, the researchers had to keep their work secret. Prostitutes, then, were their initial subjects and that was a pretty fair arrangement for the girls: Loads of male volunteers, (interestingly, male volunteers were easy to come-by) good pay and a very comfortable position. After a short period of time, Masters and Johnson found that prostitutes really did not fit the bill as good research subjects discontinued their services. It wasn't because the girls were laying down on the job but because prostitutes, due to their line of work, do not have a natural vaginal orifice. Tending to develop rather large vaginal passages from their unique kind of employment, they simply were not representative of the average female, and, hence, were not proper experimental subjects.

With a risky step forward, Masters and Johnson recruited people in the academic community to engage in sexual research. Astoundingly! many were willing to volunteer. In their research, Masters and Johnson have used family units (husbands and wives) and unmarried people ranging in age from 18-80. The majority of subjects were 18-50 years of age, the oldest subject being 82 (a Fabulous Frazier of the human species). Their use of older people has resulted in wonderful conclusions regarding sexual adequacy in old age. (Age aside, they found that if you're hot,

you're hot).

Eleven years of research! Well, just what did they do? Two of the chiefly researched techniques were those of manual and mechanical stimulation to orgasm. One of the instruments used was the plastic penis which Masters and Johnson devised. A remarkable little instrument that was driven electrically! This was used to bring various female subjects to

different levels of sexual excitement while researchers made all sorts of internal measurements and photographs. They discovered events which no one had any idea occurred during sexual excitement and orgasm. Masters and Johnson have. long been convinced that sexual response is a Total human response - and they collected the evidence to hypathesis. prove their Orgasm, sexual responsiveness is not purely genital. The total physical organism is involved. Masters and Johnson assure us that if we think that all there is to sex is what is genital -- then we are missing more than half of the joy of sexual response. In sex, there is a giving of the person -- personalities are given and received. More about this later on this evening when we look at the psychological consequences of

their research.

For now, let's continue with their experimental approach: they conducted research on the various possible positions intercourse. Writers have been telling us for centuries about the joys of the various positions. And, many people wonder if they aren't missing something by not trying sex on the porch hammock or on a tree limb or in the bath tub. We'll take a look at this later, but, for now let's get back to the total organismic responce of sex. Masters and Johnson have classified the four phases of sexualresponse: the normal state, the excitement phase, the and plateau phase resolution phase. What are some of the things that measurably occur? Well, for example, the female breasts in the normal state have a position that is called the base-rate. In the average woman, during the second stage (excitement phase) when the initial physiological movements occur, the nipples begin to erect and there is veneous engorgement of the breasts. The breasts actually increase in size. Given further manipulation, the average woman reaches the plateau stage of high excitement. In this stage there is a marked engorgement of the aerold (pigmented area at nipple base) to the point of the breast protruding over the erected nipple. Just the breasts of the average woman (in some women the breasts increase as much as one-fourth). As elevation in excitement is reached from the plateu phase to orgasm a pink mottling appears over the breasts of 75% of women. This mottling or rash is often referred to as the sexual flush. During the resolution phase there is a rapid disappearance of the rash and detumesence of breasts showing again the nipple erection. The sexual flush appears across the top of the

breasts, on the forehead and the neck. It reaches its height during orgasm and then immediately disappears. The medical or physiological reason for the sexual flush is unknown. Sexual flush and nipple erection also occur in te male. The nipples of about 35% of men erect and sexual flush appears on the small of the back in about 50% of

Masters and Johnson also measured rectal movements during sexual response. The spincther muscles of the rectum contract voluntarily in many men and women during the excitement level. This voluntary contraction aids the male in thrusting and the female in contracting. During orgasm, however, both male and female have involuntary rectal muscle control.

Masters and Johnson, then, found total bodily response -things happen biologically, naturally!

Almost all the damn how-to-do-it sex books that people buy so readily have no scientific basis and are often actually harmful. Most marriage manuals are for the birds (actually, they'd probably break a wing following the directions).

Hyperventilation during sexual response is another measurable event mentioning. Though difficult (orgasm lasting only 3-5 seconds) Masters and Johnson were able to make these measurements. Hyperventilation is a deep, successive breathing, up to 40-45 breaths per minute. This is not brought on by fatigue or an excessive out-put of energy during sexual excitement. It's simply another of the organism's total responses to sex. Still another is a heart beat of 110 to 180 beats per minute recorded just prior to and during orgasm. The total organism involves itself! Another sexual response is perspiration in about 35% of women following orgasm. A filmy sheen developes on the back, upper lip, and forehead. As in the flushing response

the cause is not known. One very interesting research approach had to do with female masturbation. Masters and Johnson discovered that women quite naturally find the right way to masturbate. 95% of women never directly touch the gland clitoris. It's too sensitive!! About 85% of women stroke the anterior mons area or else either the right or left shaft of the clitoris. Some roll the hood back and use it as a manipulative device for stimulation. Only a small number of women can bear the intense excitement (over-sensitivity) of directly touching the gland clitoris. So great does the excitement become it often leads to a kind of numbness of the entire area. Often a woman will ask that manipulation be stopped because of the sensitivity and then there is a

drop from the plateau to the excitement state. Often, a guy cannot hang in that long, he tires. Frequently, the male is simply manipulating in the wrong way. As a matter of fact, ladies and gentlemen, there is ample evidence to show that even in radical cases, such as the surgical removal of the clitoris, there are no problems in achieving orgasm because the sexual response nerves are buried throughout the entire mons area. So, perfect practice makes for perfect orgasm. Practice also shortens the time necessary to reach orgasm. So,

Another interesting discovery: when a woman reaches the plateau level there is vasco congestion of the pelvic area. A great deal of blood flows into the area and further increases excitement. Often the male can't hang in there long enough. and soon ejaculates detumesence sets in and he is no longer able to operate. Many men, the researchers discovered, do NOT, for one reason or another, manipulate their partners so that they can reach orgasm. Masters and Johnson claim that this is cruel in that a lot of women lay in the sack after the guy comes off and the women are really physically distressed because of the presence of vasco congestion. It takes a period of time for that congestion to pass! The woman is at the pinnacle (plateau stage) and raring to go and manipulation is needed not only for physical release but for all the other things that both of them hoped that orgasm would bring: joy, warmth and security. For some stupidly formed moral reasons some women do not feel that the men should continue and manipulate them to orgasm. (No Religion teaches that a woman should simply lay there and not be satisfied).

Masters and Johnson have also discovered a fort concerning the reproductive functions of the female. They found that the woman as she has biologically created tends to retain sperm and dam it up in a pool area at the rear of the vagina. When surgical cutting is necessary to help birth, the repairing of the opening never quite equals the vaginal floor that is there by nature. Women who have had one child often find it difficult to conceive another. Research discovered that for these women one of the reasons is that as soon as the penis is withdrawn there is no damning or trapping of the sperm and about 70% of the sperm is lost through spilling. A woman cannot become pregnant unless some of the sperm is retained at least for a short period of time.

During our presentation this evening, ladies and gentlemen, I think we are in agreement that Masters and Johnson's

The show will be produced in collaboration with the Department of Music.

Director of the Salisbury State Theatre is Dr. Leland Starnes, Associate Professor of Speech and Theatre, who comes to Salisbury State after almost four years as Director of University Theatre at the University of Pittsburgh. A graduate of Harvard University, Dr. Starnes completed a B.A. degree in English and an M.A.T. degree in Education, and later obtained his doctorate from the Yale School of Drama with a specialization in Directing. He taught at the Yale School of Drama and directed the Yale Dramatic Association for eight years before accepting his position as Director of Theatre at Pittsburgh.

Working with Dr. Starnes as Technical Driector and Designer will be Robert Cloyd, Instructor of Speech and Theatre, who has a B.F.A. in Design from Carnegie-Mellon University. Cloyd is presently completing his M.A. from Syracuse University and came to Salisbury State after two years of teaching at Onondaga Community College and designing for the Syracuse Repertory Theatre, the Syracuse Syr Famous Artist Playhouse, and the Carousel Players.

Dr. Starnes and Mr. Cloyd have announced plans for a subscription season of "significant world drama, exciting experiment, and exhilarating entertainment.
We're going to begin," Dr.
Starnes says, "in the Starnes says, enthusiastic intention involve our students -- and thereby our audiences - in active interpretation of the works of the important artists of the more traditional theatre forms even as we undertake experiment in the revolutionary modes now being practiced by provocative, avant-garde groups all over the world. And to dispel any impression that we breathe too heavily with awareness of our own Profundity and Significance, we're going to begin our own season with a production of one of America's lightest and brightest musicals. We're determined that the new Salisbury State Theatre will be for everyone a place of rich vitality and joy. Significant theatre - if it is indeed significant - must be an event that its audiences attend with a sense of

pleasurable anticipation and excitement rather than from any heavy awarenss of duty "cultural enrichment" truly fine theatre, we all know, arouses within its viewers of every level the excited curiosity to see even the direst truth carried out to its logical culmination beacuse of its very theatricality. This is the wild and free kind of theatre that we're going to try like hell to bring to Salisbury State in our new season.'



They have told us to beware of the marriage manuals; to beware of the how-to-do-it sex books. Magazines tell us of new variations but they do not tell us about the two personalities involved. These worthless books do not tell us about the obligations and the responsibilities that two humans have to and for themselves and one another. Often, no mention of the rightful expectations of sex!

Would you believe (it's true) that as recently as 1957 reputable medical text

stated "women do not have an interest in or a capability of ever having orgasm." 1957!!! What a hell of an awful, terrible myth!!! But, what do you expect? The text was written by a man! Masters and Johnson reviewed all the literature on sexual response since 1954 and have thousands of references to femal orgasm (usually the writers say it doesn't exist) --Not one of them written by

Salisbury's program, under "College of the Air" by the Maryland Center for Public Broadcasting, will feature courses in "Fundamentals of Mathematics," "Personnel Management," and "Americans from Africa." Courses will run twice a week for a total of 15 weeks.

Other Maryland colleges in the "College of the Air" are Catonsville Community College, Community College, Dundalk Community College, Essex Community College, Harford Junior College, Howard Community College, Morgan State College and Villa Julie Junior College.

Anyone is eligible to take the courses upon registration at Salisbury State College prior to Tuesday, September 19. All the courses broadcast, carry three academic credits and registrants will be identified as special Salisbury State College students.

Persons registering will be assigned a teacher and they will begin taking the lessons at home. Books may be purchased at the Salisbury State College Book Store.

Courses will be given over WCPB, Channel 28, Salisbury. The Math course will be aired on Wednesdays and Fridays at 6:15 p.m., with repeats of these same lessons at 10 a.m. on Saturday and Sunday. Dr. Harry Suber, Assistant Professor of Mathematics, will be the instructor.

"Personnel Management" will serve as an introduction to the problems in business and industry. Lessons cover testing, performance review, motivating people, training, labor relations and all related subjects. Lessons are aired Tuesdays and Thursdays at 6:45 a.m., with repeats at 10:45 a.m. on Saturdays and Sundays. Dr. Donald Bowman, Professor of Business Administration and Economics, will be the instructor.

"Americans from Africa" is a history course covering the of Black Americans story from their origin in Africa through the Civil War to the new militancy that followed the movements of Martin Luther King. Lessons will be aired on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 6:15 p.m. with repeats at 11:30 a.m. on Saturdays and Sundays. Michael Marcson, Instructor of History, will be the Salisbury instructor.


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
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
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From Down

Most people build a house. They fix the lights, arrange the furniture, have kids, plant flowers, and wipe away the dust until they so become. Then someone else builds the house again. And such is life. Houses aren't really that

bad a commodity though. They often last for a number of years (depending on the neighborhood). They are isles of security and warmth in a somewhat insecure and cooly rational world. Our generation -- that is, the one that made its appearance at or about the middle of this century -- has vehemently opposed this trend. We have criticized people housed in Washington for bombing other people's houses; we have reacted against material progress for its own sake as conceived in the houses of industrialists and businessmen. Some of us have even come out long enough to try to get other people out of their houses, to wake them up to Truth, Humanity, and Justice. Most of us have remained inside however.

Perhaps we can now assess our efforts. Our own generation has for the most

part settled down to building houses. For some, like those who infest the union here, a full house is one of life's chief delights. But those vermin aside, despite rhetoric to the contrary, bombs still fall in Ireland, Vietnam, Bangladesh, and Silver Spring. Profit still yokes people caught in endless cycles of misery disguised as prosperity. Most folks don't appear to be too interested in our versions of Truth, Justice, and Humanity. Too busy building houses, I guess.

Therefore, many of us have degenerated into apathy or cynicism. We turn our backs to the world and drown it in drugs, erections, and orgasms.

We pout like children. What we have failed to realize is that housebuilding is an eminently rational activity. Throughout history most people have been given a bum rap. What our own time has gained in affluence it has lost in existential peace. Frankly, the world outdoors is still as scary as it was when wolves still roamed next door. The problem is the most of them come in human form nowadays. That is partly why people do not necessarily want their consciousness of the world heightened. They know it too well already; and they have no guarantee that the world we vaguely envision will be any better. So they

build houses (and thereby make certain that it won't

People will still be people no matter the social structure of their relationships. Admittedly, one social structure may be more conducive to compassionate behavior than another. But human beings are passionate beings; love, hatred, anger, jealousy, fear, pride, mercy and the desire for peace, justice, revenge, or order are the real forces that breathe life into the intellectual constructions of man. One can thus see why humanism is both a Truth Faith and incredibly naive. Man does indeed create his own world; but our century above all others should realize that even the issue of survival itself cannot prevent people from becoming victim of the passions that drive them so.

Therefore, to change the world we must love it, love it passionately. But beyond this, we must seek something more than plain humanism to give us the conviction, to give others that conviction, that what we are attempting to do has at least the promise of beginning to build a better world. Passion of any timbre is eventually destructive unless combined with the conviction that the suffering involved will somehow fulfill the longings of

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HAITIAN DIVORCE: A MATTER OF SPEEDY DECREE

NEW YORK, NEW YORK— Though married Americans may never quite achieve the authority of a Moslem man who merely informs a wife that "I divorce thee," there is now a new way to obtain a divorce that involves a mere 24 hours. And, as many American divorcees who travelled to Haiti for their decrees will testify, what a difference a day makes.

Haiti has no residency requirements for a divorce. All it takes is the presence of one spouse and the written permission of the other. Incompatibility is sufficient grounds in every case.

One organization, Haitian Agency, Inc., assisted more than 200 lawyers across the United States in arranging Haitian divorces for their clients during the past year. The leader in this specialized field, Haitian Agency, of Hartford, Conn., can handle all support services through the mails. Personal contact with prospective divorcees or

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their lawyers is not necessary,

Explaining the procedure, William K. Halligan, Director of Haitian Agency, says the necessary forms are submitted by his firm to a couples' attorneys after his office is contacted. When both parties, after legal consultation, decide upon a Haitian divorce, Haitian Agency provides a package service for \$780 that includes round trip air fare from New York (guaranteed reservations), overnight hotel accommodations (two meals), all legal and court costs in Haiti, document registration, translation and fees, and personal attention in the Caribbean nation.

"Either spouse can go to Haiti," Mr. Halligan explains. "Our experience shows that about half the time the husband goes, and half the time the wife goes. The party not present in these 'mutual consent' divorces is represented

in Haiti by a power of attorney granted a Haitian lawyer."

The Americans fly to Haiti's modern Francois Duvalier International Airport in 3½ hours. There they are met by the Haitian Agency's representative and by a band playing folk music.

Shortly after arrival, they are briefed by an attorney who instructs them as to the time they must be in court and the proper clothes to wear—coat and tie for the men, skirts for the women.

The visitor is shown discreetly into a side office of the court house. Nobody is in the judicial presence for more than five minutes. After court, there are friendly exchanges with the attorney and, many times, the divorcees stay in Haiti for a sight-seeing fling. Normally, the divorce papers are processed and forwarded within three weeks.

"Frequently," Mr. Halligan relates, "an individual requires the decree right away, usually because remarriage is planned. In these cases, the divorcee stays in Haiti an extra day or two and returns with a copy of the decree."

What sort of people use the Haitian Agency's services? "Our clients represent a

cross-section of society," Mr.

Halligan claims. "We have served lawyers, doctors, secretaries, businessmen, working men, school teachers and diplomats from this country and abroad."

Why did more than 5,000 Americans utilize Haiti's speedy divorce services during the past year?

"Speed and simplicity," Mr. Halligan believes. "Months of anguish and legal procedures can be avoided by going to Haiti," he says.

It is not asking you to take a stand on the war itself. It is asking you to ask Hanoi to observe the humanitarian provisions of the Geneva Conventions.



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Students To Seek Trustee Spots At U. Of M., Md. State Colleges

The new president of the United Colleges of Maryland said today the group, which speaks for students at 10 colleges, will seek student representation "with equal voting rights" on the University of Maryland's board of trustees and the Maryland State Colleges board of

These groups really govern the colleges and it is important that we get in the mainstream and try to have more influence," said Charles

C. Mullings.
The 25-year-old chemistry

major at Coppin State College said the executive council of student organization would ask for three seats on the regents board and two on the trustees board when the proposal goes before the two bodies in September.

West Indies Native

Mr. Mullings, a native of Jamaica, West Indies, is the first black to head the organization now in its fourth year. He also heads the Copping Student Government Association.

The United Colleges of Maryland represents 100,000 approximately students at the University of Maryland. College Park; University of Maryland, University Baltimore county; Coppin, Frostburg, Towson, Bowie, College, Hagerstown Junior College, Allegheny Junior Community College of Baltimore and Essex Community College.

The council feels, Mr. Mullings said, that black colleges are not being given an equal share educational resources by the state and "we want to have that corrected."

Inferior Facilities

For instance, he explains, the physical amenities at Coppin, which has approximately 3,000 students, are much inferior in quality and quantity" to those at Salisbury State College, a white school with a smaller student body of some 1,599. "If you would just take a look at the cubby-holes that are used by men with doctorates at Coppin," he said, adding, "I would be terrified by claustrophobia."

budgets of the state colleges at Coppin it is nothing more and found inequality in the than a nurse. distribution of funds. State colleges are given funds according to the number of students on campus.

"Thorough Study"

Mr. Mullings would not say which schools are getting lesser amounts at this time because "we are making a thorough study of the situation."

The council would like free medical services, including those of a gynecologist, psychiatrist and general practitioner, at every state college campus.

"Most of them don't have much of this," he said, "and


"Some of the student on campuses today are really troubled and frustrated. A psychiatrist, particularly, would be of real value."

Student Legal Problems

Mr. Mullings said student government associations should be able to hire their own lawyers to handle student legal problems. At the University of Maryland, College Park, this is not allowed and the council wants

to know why.

A special committee, he said, will be named to coordinate political activity on all the campuses.
