From the GENTLEMAN'S MAGAZINE for August, 1749.

Mr. URBAN, which our Correspondence had oblige'd us to print last July's magazine, in the list of deaths, I saw the name of Matthew Martin, of Wivenhoe, Esq; who was a gentleman greatly esteem'd for his nobility, generosity, and amiable behaviour, as well as for the gallant action I am going to relate. First, I must set you right as to a mistake or two, which we there, that he died the 25th of June, instead of the 20th of July, and it was not from Angria, but from a much more formidable enemy, he made his escape, viz; from three French men of war, a 70 and a 60 gun ship, and one, the same force as himself, of 32 guns. These ships had taken a proper station in the East Indies, to intercept all the outward bound ships that year, but Capt. Martin, led 'em such a chase as luckily to escape himself, and to defeat their intentions. His ship was very rich, having above a hundred thousand pounds in foreign specie on board, and that he thought they knew, or else he imagin'd they would have sunk him with their lower tier, when they were so near as they were two or three times. The first time he saw them, was on Thursday morning, and it was Saturday night before he was quite clear of them. His officers and people would persuade him they were English ships, and mention'd their particular names, the largest they call'd the Barrington, upon which he haul'd up his sails, and was sending his boat to invite the captain to dine with him, and to enquire what news; but not being thoroughly satisfied, he kept viewing them with his spy glass, and at last, perceived the largest knock cut her lower tier of ports, and haul them to again, which made him ask, if the Barrington had two tier of ports, and being answer'd in the negative, he call'd his boat on board, and made all the sail he could, which they no sooner perceiv'd, but they began to fire upon him, and haul'd down English, and put up French colours, and so they continued smartly engag'd for two or three glasses, before he could get any distance from them. They kept chasing him till the next day, when they were so near, that they could hear what was said on board one another's ships, just at that time he perceiving thick weather arising, form'd a scheme that was of great service to him, which was this; Without any noise he order'd all his men to their proper posts, and to trim the sails as sharp as possible; then he went to the helm, stow'd helm, and told him, that when he order'd him to put the helm hard a weather, he must put it hard a lee, and that if he made no blunder, he would handsomely reward him, but if he blundered, the least in the world, he would shoot him through the head; then going on the poop, and seeing the French ship so near, he fell a stamping, and alking him if he had a mind to be on board her, and bid him put the helm hard a weather, but the man put it quite contrary, as he was order'd, and brought the ship quite round, almost close under the French ship's bowline, which surprised them greatly, and they imagin'd he design'd to board them. As soon as they were convinc'd that was not his design, they began to fire, and put their helm hard a lee to, but their sails not being prepared, as his was, were all taken back, which put them into great confusion, and had there been as much wind as he hop'd there would, from the appearance of the weather, in all probability they had lost all their mast, which was what he wished for. But as it was, before they could get in a proper posture to follow him, he got above a league a head. This was reckoned a very nice piece of seamanship, as well as a profitable stratagem. Being at such a distance, when night came on, he could easily alter his course, without their observing it, which he did, and got in close under land, and came to an anchor to refresh his people, and repair his rigging, and sails, which were pretty much shatter'd, and he has since he never slept founder in his life then he did for four or five hours that night on the bare

deck, and a log of wood for his pillow. But not being perfectly at ease, as soon as it was dawn, he order'd some men up to the main head to keep a good look out, where they had not been long before they call'd out, they seiz'd a pagoda, but he knowing the coast very well, knew there could be no such thing in sight, and guess'd it to be one of the French Ships, and immediately cut away his anchor, and made all the sail he could, and before he was well under way, as he thought, the French 60 gun ship was presto well up with him, and thus they continued all day, and at night he play'd them another trick. As soon as it was dark, he order'd a light to be put in the great cabin window, and no other light to appear in the ship. Then he order'd a water cask to be sawn in halves, and in one of the halves he fix'd a mast, exactly the height of the light in the window, to which he hung a candle and lantern, and putting the light out in the window, he turn'd it a drift. The French soon perceived and came up with it, and believ'd it was his ship, and that he design'd to fight them, they prepared accordingly, but before they could make out what it was, it sunk, and left them in the greatest consternation what to do. Capt. Martin kept on his course, and, in a little time, arriv'd safe in the port he was bound to, where they had not been long, before they heard the two biggest French ships were put into some port, pretty near, in a necky and shattered condition, and as the neighbourhood of two such ships could not be agreeable, it was given out that Capt. Martin was coming down to fight them, and to make it appear the more plausible, they put 100 soldiers on board and made him set sail, but the French ships not caring to receive him, went away for Europe in the condition they were in, and leaving all their load behind them; and in going about the Cape of Good Hope, one of the ships sprung a leak, and was in great distress, and the other going to her assistance, it being very dark, ran full a board of her, and both went down to the bottom, and not a soul was saved; this, Capt. Martin was told by the captain of a third ship that was in company with them, but could to say still either of them. This is a true account of the action, for which the India company made him the presents you mentioned. The medal is the company's arms emblm'd on gold, and set round with 48 rose diamonds. This very gentleman was offered to be knighted by Queen Anne for making her a present of a fine non, though the government took no notice of this gallant action.

PARIS, September 10.

BY letters from Moscow, bearing date the 12th of August last, we are informed, that they had received advices from Constantinople, wherein they were told, that the grand Vizir, having invited the Russian resident in that city to a private conference, he therein told him, in direct terms, that the Ottoman Porte were very desirous of preferring that peace and tranquillity which was at present subsisting between that court and their neighbours, and in a more peculiar manner with his mistress, the Russian empress; and that the grand Signor obcried with some sort of uneasiness, that such good understanding between them might possibly be interrupted by the military preparations which the Russian court were carrying on with vigour on the frontiers of the Swedes, who were their good allies; and that such proceedings were no ways agreeable, and that the Porte thought it incumbent on them, for that reason, to have a watchful eye over them; the resident replied, that the Czarina, plainly perceiving that her neighbours were putting themselves into the best posture of defence they possibly could, the imagin'd, that though she was entirely of a pacific temper, and very ambitious of preferring and main-

Ensuring the present tranquility in the North, yet it was equally incumbent on her to be upon her guard as well as her neighbours, and be duly prepared for any sudden and unexpected attack; whereupon the grand Vizier assured him, that as the Porte was in treaty with the Swedish court, it would be highly requisite, that the Czarina should take that affair into her consideration, and in order to prevent all jealousies and suspicions, forthwith to withdraw her forces.

An Extract of a Letter from the Hague, dated 17th. Dec.

"Our correspondent at Petersburg, which has hitherto informed us of the extraordinary preparations which were making there to put the empire in a condition of rendering abortive the designs which the court of Sweden is suspected to be meditating, of rendering that crown, after the death of the reigning king, despotic, now intimates to us, that a certain court having caused a proposition to be made to the emperors of Russia for her Imperial Majesty to disown, in order to take away from Sweden all subjects of distrust, the Empress made answer to the minister who proposed this, that Sweden having obliged her to do what she had done, her Imperial Majesty could by no means desist from going on with her preparations, and should remain armed till not only the Swedish ministry, but the Prince Successor, should in an explicit manner, and without any equivocation, declare their real sentiments in respect to the present form of government. In the mean time advices from the North unanimously agree in telling us of the extraordinary armaments which are making both in Russia and Sweden, and this makes every body believe, that the respective powers are preparing in good earnest to strike a mighty stroke next spring, unless some expedient, that shall be more to the liking of the parties than any that has yet been proposed, can be found out this winter for bringing matters to an accommodation."

Hamburg, S. 14. 14. By a convention which M. Tilley, the British ambassador, has concluded with the ministers of Denmark, the 10,000 men of the troops of that kingdom, to be held in readiness for the service of Great Britain, are to serve by sea, as well as by land, if it shall be required on the arrival of an English squadron in the Baltic.

London.

September 4. Last Monday a female child of six months old belonging to Mr. Staford, near Stokehill in the county of Devon, being in the arms of a little girl, her sister, a hog seized the infant by her arm, and pulling them down, eat the hand and arm off as far as the elbow, and broke the upper bone of the arm in two places, before it could be got away; notwithstanding which, the child is in a fair way of recovery.

Yesterday the Rockeller man of war was launched at Deptford, and the command of her is given to Capt. Philip Durell. The Hon. Philip York, Esq; is appointed one of the commissioners for surveying the boundaries of the British colonies in America; for which purpose he is expected in town to receive his instructions.

We hear that the negro, who hatch'd the late conspiracy in the island of Malta, has been broke alive on the wheel, as well as the 60 valets de chambre of the grand master, his associate; and that the most rigorous means are used for the discovery of all the accomplices, which are said to amount to upwards of fifteen hundred.

Last Wednesday a melancholy accident happened at Brindley in Staffordshire; one Mrs. Halley, a young married woman, who had a few hours before been deliver'd of a child, by some accident some linen took fire in another room, which burnt through the ceiling, and in the absence of the nurse, who was gone to visit a neighbour, Mrs. Halley and the child were both suffocated, and the house, barns, stables, &c, consumed.

Dublin, Aug. 31. 24. We are advised from Ballyniskreen, a mountainous part of the county of Londonderry, of a wedding celebrated there, in a very extraordinary manner, on Thursday evening; the whole was conducted according to the ancient Irish custom, and was as follows:

The night preceding the bride's joining hands, the designed bride and bridegroom, in way of trial of liking, were with much ceremony put naked to bed together, accompanied by the bride's maid, who lay in the middle to protect her mistress. And next day the nuptial vows were entered into; after which succeeded the assembling of about 200 of the neighbours, of both sexes, and all ages, to partake of an entertainment provided for the occasion, which consisted of 38 fat muttons, dress'd in various ways; about 150 brooms of oat bread; 50 gallons of strong ale; 150 lbs of bacon; and about 500 weight of fresh butter; together with bony rammer in abundance.

After the feast the company parcelled themselves out in small bodies, and each forming a ring on the green, merrily danced and sung in the old Irish taste, to a number of pipes and fiddles, without being incommoded by the weather, though it rained exclusively; but put about the madder of whisky between every song; nor did the company separate, 'till the greatest part, with drinking, dancing, and singing, being quite tired out, lay down promiscuously and fell asleep.

Bristol, Aug. 31. Three of his majesty's Justices of the peace for the county of Somerset, last week, made a visit to the colliers of Paulton, Timsbury, Clutton, and other coal-works, and severely reproached them for their late monastic march to Kingwood, with full purpose to join their brethren there, and then all in a body to proceed to Bristol, and demand the turnpike prisoners from the several goals; and when it was laid before them the great danger they run themselves into, and the bad consequences that were likely to ensue thereupon, to the ruin of themselves and families, they pleaded in excuse, That they were forced to it, by letters sent them from the colliers in Kingwood, who therein, on refusal of joining them, threatened to come in a body, cut off their ear, and fill up their coal pits, let who would be in them. The gentlemen then turn'd upon them a smart retort for their cowardice, and wonder'd that such a large number of lusty stout men should be intimidated by the trivial threatenings of the Kingwood people, and thereupon so suddenly to quit their works; when at the same time they were superior in strength, and capable to have withstood such a summons, and even to have handomely drubbed them, and sent them back, had they attempted to put their menaces in execution! And as this was the case, one of the justices in particular advised them all, To pull off their Brasches, and give them to their Wives, who perhaps might make a better Use of them! — But before they parted, the gentlemen caution'd them, that if ever any such an instance should happen again, that they would behave like them, and by all means give them immediate notice of it; when a supply of arms should be ready to be given them, and they would send them in person.

The colliers express'd their concern for what had pass'd, and gave their promise never more to be concern'd in such an affair; and at the same time bitterly cursed the promoters of their last expedition, and vowing revenge the first opportunity that occasionally should happen.

Annapolis.

On Wednesday the 27th ult. being the Festival of St. John the Evangelist, and the Anniversary of the Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of FREE AND ACCEPTED MASONs, the Gentlemen of the Brotherhood, belonging to the Lodge in this City, with several of their visiting Brethren from the Country, to the Number, in all, of about 30, celebrated the Day in the following Manner:

At Twelve o'Clock they went in Procession, with white Gloves and Aprons, from the House of their Brother Middletons, being preceded by their Master, Wardens, and Grand Stewards, to the Church, where an excellent Sermon, adapted to the Occasion, was preach'd by their Brother the Rev. Mr. Brogan. After Sermon they returned in the same Manner from Church to the Indian King, where, having Dined elegantly, they elected their Master and Officers for the ensuing Year, and then proceeded in the above Order to the great Council Room, where they made a Ball for the Entertainment of the Ladies, and the Evening was spent with innocent Mirth and Gaiety.

On Monday last died, in Frederick County, after a few Days Illness, Mr. John Thomas, High Sheriff of that County, a Gentleman who justly merited the Esteem of all who knew him, and by whom his Death is greatly regretted.

A few Days ago a small Sloop was found sunk and drove ashore on Thomas's Point, and was weigh'd and brought in here. One of her Cables was fastened to a Locust Tree, which she had tore up by the Roots, and is suppos'd to have been forced out of some River or Creek up the Bay, by the Ice.

We have had such very warm Weather, (considering the Season) for about a Week past, that the Rivers hereabout are almost clear of Ice, and the King Island Ferry Boats begin again to cross the Bay.

Upon an Information taken before Mr. Thomas Jennings, dated the 13th of December last, of one Dorothy Gale, a Transport in the Thames Frigate, Capt. Bobbins, a Report prevailed, that one of the Servant Women killed another, while the Ship lay off Annapolis, and that the deceased was privately buried by the Order of Capt. Bobbins. It is therefore a Fact of

From the REMEMBRANCE, September 16, 1749.

H A V E heard of an ideot, who being shut up in a room, and perceiving the house to be on fire, ran to the window, and bellowed out, *O myself! O myself! myself! myself!* And indeed, when ones self is the only distressed and endangered object, he ought to be esteemed an ideot indeed, who neglected any means of preservation.

B U T societies may be distressed and endangered as well as individuals; and he that belongs to any one worth preserving, and that in such case feels for himself, ought also to feel for the *whole*. There is a common stock, as well as a private one; Every abuse that injures the former, impairs the latter: And hence it follows, that he, at the long run, is the best friend to himself, who is the best friend to his country.

So also on the other hand, that government is the best established, which provides best for the interest of individuals. The more good it communicates, the better it is worth defending: And there is no other principle that I know of, by which the legislator can graft *social love* upon *self love*, and thereby avail himself of the great first principle that sets all the wheels both of nature and art in motion.

Instant and apparent danger will rouse the dullest apprehension, as in the case of the ideot above; on which occasions, instinct often supplies the place of prudence.

When the rebels were on their march towards Derby, terror itself assur'd the mass of public spirit; and thousands talk'd of fighting for the community, who had no other concern about them but for themselves.

We are not a nation of *Idots*; it is true: On the contrary, there is, I believe, no nation in the world, where both *common* and *widom* *sense* abound more among individuals, than among us: But nevertheless, I think it may be said, without exaggeration, that there is no nation in the world that is less benefited by the good sense of its individuals, and consequently that has more of *national idotism* to answer for.

I touched on this in my last; I will enlarge upon it now.

There is no man of any experience, in this town, that has not heard of a character which once infested it, under the name of a *Derby-Captain*: And from the flogging face that some of us put on, during the march and counter march of the young Pretender, I should be loth to have that contemptible character fallen upon the nation.

In short, we should not be heroes, patriots, and politicians, by fits; but whatever character we assume, we ought to sustain; whatever we undertake, we ought to prosecute: If we do otherwise, we shall resemble the waves of the sea, ever in motion, and never to any purpose: We shall grow contemptible to our neighbours; we shall draw down ruin on ourselves, and we shall entail it on our posterity.

Let us, for the present, only cast an eye backward to the rise and progress of our disputes with Spain; the unreasonableness of her claims; the nature of our sufferings; the height of our resentments; the purposes of the war, and the terms proposed for an accommodation.

First, then, the court of Spain, not contented with seizing and confiscating such ships as, at their own peril, ventured to drive an *illicit trade* with their subjects in the *West Indies*, thought fit, about the year 1716, to declare, that sailing within a certain distance of their coast, should be taken as a proof of an intention to drive such *illegal trade*. That they had a right to search all ships sailing in those seas: That the produce of any commodities on board such ships, as were the produce of their colonies, should be deemed a proof, that the said ships had actually carried on such *illegal trade*: And that the penalty of every such discovery should be confiscation: to some fine.

On the authority of these declarations, which were prescribed as laws, and which consequently were so many insults to the trading nations of Europe, the depredation began, which neither can, nor desire to enumerate; as wishing rather to see a cordial amity re-established between the two nations, on fair and equal terms, than to have the quarrel revived.

The merchants and mariners, as the first touched, were the first to prefer their complaints; and finding, that those in power were of the confederacy against them, had recourse to the representatives of the nation, so early as the year 1729, who were pleased to be of opinion, that their ships and effects had been unjustly seized; that their persons had been barbarously and inhumanly treated; and to join in an address to the throne, *mem. con.* that they might have satisfaction for their losses, and security for the free exercise of their navigation for the future.

The treaty of Seville followed next, and therein our ministers assured us, they had made sufficient provision for both: But notwithstanding the large concessions made to Spain by that treaty, to the prejudice of the house of Austria; and at the expense of the people of England, whose fleets were employed to give the Spanish troops an entrance into Italy; they continued their depredations as before; indeed, to obviate the complaints of the sufferers, our ministers procured a declaration from the Spanish court, that the *privateers*, or *guarda costas*, should give security to the governors of the places where they were fitted out, for their good behaviour, &c. But this was another quack remedy, which proved as ineffectual as any of the former: The same violences were continued; the sufferers grew more and more impatient, and at last applied to Parliament again: The Parliament heard; the Parliament adopted their complaints, and forwarded them to the throne; from whence his majesty was pleased to promise, ' That he would make use of the most proper and effectual means in his power, to procure justice and satisfaction to his injured subjects; and for the future security of their trade and navigation.'

The famous convention was the result of this gracious promise; which, instead of giving satisfaction to the publick, raised its indignation, if possible, ten times higher than ever. But even the conditions of that convention, illusive, precarious, and unsatisfactory, as they were, the court of Spain did not chuse to comply with; so that a war became unavoidable, and the issue of the dispute was left to the sword.

But what is more remarkable than all the rest, in the course of the very next session, both houses concurred in an address to his majesty, ' humbly beseeching him never to admit of any treaty of peace with that crown, unless the acknowledgements of our natural and indubitable right to navigate in the American seas, to and from any part of his majesty's dominions, without being seized, searched, visited, or stopped, under any pretence whatsoever, should be first obtained: a preliminary thereto.' And his majesty's most gracious answer was concurred in these very words:

' My Lords and Gentlemen, ' I thank you for this dutiful address, which is so agreeable to former resolutions of both houses of parliament: Your unanimous and vigorous support in carrying on the war, will be the best means of procuring safe and honourable terms of peace: And you may rely on my utmost care and endeavour to obtain *exactual assurance* for the *just, honest* and *safe* *navigation* and *commerce* belonging to my subjects.'

We have here the highest sanction, that of the legislature, which could be given to the demands of the people; and the most positive assurances from the throne, that in case we furnished the *means*, we should not be disappointed of the *end*.

We did furnish the *means* with an unparring hand: No one pecuniary demand upon us, by any minister, for any service, was ever unanswered: Then we did not prosecute the war as

We might have made, we were nevertheless superior to the Spanish through the whole course of it; and as it is confessed by one of the ministerial advocates, held those treasures in check, at the close of it, on which their efforts principally depended: And, instead of answering the just expectations of the people; instead of acting in conformity to the sense of parliament, and the royal engagement just recited or disappointing the ambitious views of the crown of Spain, which is stated as a matter of such importance in the gracious speech of December 1, 1743; but Ministers have been hardy enough to make such a peace (a DEFINITIVE PEACE) as gratifies the ambitious views of Spain in every point, and leaves every point of our own, in a more desperate state than ever.

Already we are told, in the common News-Papers, that the guarda costas begin to be as troublesome as ever; and whenever Gibraltar is mentioned, we betray all the apprehensions of a vanquished, wretched, desponding people.

And, now, if we have any concern for our national character, if we have any pretensions to national wisdom, and if we have one spark of national spirit remaining, what ought our reflections to be? And what our conduct, to justify the past, and prepare for the future?

If it is still in our power to retrieve our affairs, or detect the ill-management, which has reduced them to such an extremity, in my humble opinion we cannot set about it too soon.

If not, to know the worst of our condition, may teach us to conform to our weakness, though nothing could teach us a right application of our strength.



Extract of a Letter from Vienna, dated August 26.

OUR attempts to drive away the locusts (which have appeared in our neighbourhood in still greater numbers than last year, and lay waste every thing) by the noise of drums and other instruments, have proved altogether ineffectual: They appeared indeed to be somewhat disturbed therewith at first, and removed to a little distance; but it seemed to be only to return in greater numbers than last year. These insects are about three inches round, and from five to six in length. Though of one species, they differ in colour; some are brown others yellow, and the smallest numbers of a silver white: They fly in bodies, at which time they occupy a space of a quarter of a German league in the air. In the night they assemble on the most fruitful spots (which they never quit while there is anything left for them to eat) and place themselves one above another to the height of half a foot. New methods of destroying them are daily proposed, but none have had any success; so that we now trust wholly to the approaching frosts to deliver us from this plague. It should have been observed, that we had killed great numbers of them by the help of fire arms; but the stench that proceeded from these insects when dead was so great, that it infected the air, so that we durst no longer employ this method of getting rid of them, for fear of rendering the air contagious in the end.

Lughorn, August 29. The ships from the Levant assure us, there are at present twenty two vessels with oars, Barbary rovers, great and small, at sea; which is confirmed by the master of a Tuscan vessel, arrived in twelve days from Algiers; who adds, there were two others ready to sail from that port.

Rome, August 30. Letters from Civita Vecchia advise, that a Maltese gally had taken, off Fiumeino, a Barbary galliot of twenty-four men.

Vienna, September 18. Letters have been received here from Constantinople, which pretend that the People express the greatest eagerness for a war with the Christians; that orders have been actually sent to the Tartars to make incursions into the Russian territories, and that the Czarina's minister had not appeared for some days.

Hamburg, Sept. 25. By letters lately received here from Riga, we are informed, that the Russian troops, that had been gone back some time into Livonia, and Courland, to the amount of about 50,000 men, were very peaceable and quiet in their quarters, and spent the principal part of their time in the practice of their evolutions.

Stockholm, Sept. 9. Orders are sent to several ports of this kingdom, to finish all the galleys that are upon the stocks before the winter, that they may be ready for service early in the spring. As the season is too far advanced for the fleet to put to sea, the men of war and frigates that are in the road of Carescoo, are to return into harbour, and wait for orders to disarm.

It's assured that the sailors will not be permitted to absent themselves this year.

Hamburg, Sept. 15. The last advices from Copenhagen, confirm the renewal of the subsidy treaty with France, and observe that it contains no new articles, only the subsidy has been increased from 900,000 to a million of livres. They add, that the Danish ministry have declared to all the foreign ministers, that there is not the least clause in this treaty which may give any umbrage, either now or hereafter, to any power whatsoever.

Paris A-la-main, Sept. 22. According to the letters from Genoa of the 11th instant, there is such a ferment amongst the people upon account of the bank of St. George, as tends to nothing less than splitting up a fresh revolt. Last week several papers were found fixed up at the corners of the streets, setting forth the signals which were to be made for this purpose, and inviting all bodies of tradesmen and others to take up arms upon pain of being kill'd and plundered in case of refusal. Some nights after several others were found, notwithstanding all the pains that was taken to discover the authors. As the nobility are very much divided among themselves, it's apprehended that these disturbances may be fomented by the opposite party.

L O N D O N.

Sept. 2. The margrave of Anspach, on being invested with the order of the Garter, presented to Sir Hanbury Williams a magnificent ring set with a large brilliant; and to Mr. Anspach he made a present of 300 ducats, besides the gold hilted sword, and a 100 ducats more for his eleaths, which belonged to the king at arms by virtue of his office.

They write from Chebucto in Nova-Scotia, the 2d of July, that a floop is arrived with four companies of English troops from Cape Breton, and Col. Hopson was expected there the 3d with the rest of the fleet.

The Invincible man of war is ordered to be cut down to a go gun ship, and fitted for sea as a guard ship.

On Monday night as a blacksmith, servant to Mr. Dewkes in Rotherhithe, was passing by Cherry Garden stairs, he happened by accident to jostle an Italian sailor, who stood there smoking his pipe, which occasioned some words between them, and on a sudden the Italian pull'd out his knife, and stabb'd him to the heart, of which wound he instantly died, and has left behind him a wife and four children. The villain immediately made his escape, but as he is very well known, it is not doubted but he will soon be brought to justice.

Monday one Haines a waterman at Rotherhithe, lately come home from the West-Indies, being under some misfortune, stabb'd himself in several places in the left breast at his lodgings in Red Lion alley, near Rotherhithe, and died immediately.

Saturday last Vickers Tucker was committed to Newgate, for setting fire to the dwelling house of Mrs. Catherine Lloyd, in the borough of New Windsor in the county of Berks.

Monday a woman was committed to the Compter for decoying a young child from its parents house in Whitecross street, and detaining the child from them three weeks, and in that time begging about the streets with it.

The excise on beer and ale, from Midsummer 1748 to Midsummer 1749, amounted to 1,385,420 l. 10 s. being above 200,000 l. more than in the preceding year.—The whole revenue of the excise amounted to 3,487,129 l. 12 s. 6 d. the greatest ever known.

Newcastle August 29. We have advice from several places in Yorkshire, that the distemper among the horned cattle continues to rage violently in that county.

Last Saturday the troops quarter'd in this town, were reviewed in the town moor by general Howard; when they went through their exercise, in the presence of many spectators, with great applause.

Last Monday two men playing for a wager at Long Bowls, between Ferry-hill and Sunderland bridge, two other persons, who had laid bets on the issue of the game, quarrel'd, and having gone into a field to box, the one kill'd the other in about three minutes.

Dublin, August 27. We hear from the Isle of Man, that a near relation to the right hon. the lord viscount Castlecomer, of this kingdom, who resides there, has by exact, easy, and mathematical methods and schemes, discover'd the longitude and square of the circle, which he is preparing to lay before the lords of the admiralty.

By a private letter from Roscommon we learn, that on Friday last came on there the trial of lieutenant Tucker, of ga-

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general Blakney's regiment, for killing Lieutenant Reeves of the said regiment; when after a tryal of six hours, the jury (consisting of the principal gentlemen of that country) brought in their verdict Manslaughter in his own defence.

Saturday one Patrick Murray was committed to Newgate, for robbing Mr. Bartholomew Duff, wine cooper, of 4 casks, which were full of vinegar, and which he let run out, that he might the more easily carry off the said casks; two of which he afterwards sold for a shilling.

ANNAPOLIS.

We have just now received the melancholy News of the Death of Osborne Sprigg, Esq; High Sheriff of Prince George's County, on Monday last: A Gentleman who was one of the Representatives of that County in many Assemblies, and greatly beloved, not only in his own County, but by all who knew him.

George Gordon, Esq; is appointed High Sheriff of Frederick County, in the Room of John Thomas, Esq; deceased.

And John Cooke, Esq; succeeds Mr. Sprigg in Prince George's County.

Our Rivers and Bay are again so full of Ice, that they are become impassable.

LEGHORN, September 6. We have advice from Corsica, that two deputies from the malecontents having waited on M. de Cursay, in the neighbourhood of Bastia, in order to fix the time of holding the congress at this place, as formerly mention'd, the French general told them, that he had received orders from the King his master, not to meet them at Leghorn, but at Massa-Cafara. This answer so much displeased the ch. ch., that they told him plainly, they would not go there.

Sept. 10. We are well informed, that the republic of Genoa, having requested from France an additional supply of forces to those already in Corsica, to the amount of 8000 men; the British court being inform'd thereof, have represented, by their minister at Paris, the ill consequences of such a scheme, as it may embroil Italy in fresh troubles.

Sept. 12. The master of a Danish vessel, who arrived yesterday from Alicant, brings advice, that as he was coming out of that port, he met the English squadron under the command of Mr. Keppel, reinforced by two fireships, steering for Algiers.

Pienna, Sept. 20. On Monday last the states of Lower Austria assembled, and the emperors queen made a speech from the throne, wherein her Imperial majesty, solemnly confirmed all the privileges of the states; and declared that she had no new subsidy of any kind to demand, being quite satisfied with those which the states had formerly given for ten years.

Madrid, Sept. 15. The letters from Alicant, of the 10th instant mention, that the two Spanish men of war, and the two xebecques, were returned to Cartagena, from sounding the bay of Algiers, which they were two days performing under Dutch colours; but that when they had finished, they fired a gun and hoisted Spanish ensigns: That it was believed the ships and xebecques would be disarmed, as the bomb-ketches were already laid up.

It is wrote from Cadiz, that a vessel arrived there the 7th instant from Vera Cruz, and last from the Havanna, in sixty days, with advice, that the two men of war at Vera Cruz were to sail in the month of June with five millions of dollars, that two others were arrived at Cartagena; and that the said four men of war may be expected in Europe about the end of next month.

From the Paris *A la main*, September 22.

By letters from Genoa of the 11th instant, we are credibly inform'd, that there are such tumults and commotions amongst the populace of that city, on account of the bank of St. George, that 'tis much to be feared, that nothing less will be the consequence than a new revolt.

Last week several bills or papers were posted up in the corners of almost every street; and even cartels, or a kind of challenges, which were very bold and audacious, and full of invectives against the government, whereby they intimate what is expected to be done; and enjoin all their fellow citizens and others to keep up arms, on the forfeit of their lives; threatening further to plunder the effects of all such as shall decline to be aiding and abetting them in their designs.

On the night following several other cartels of the like rebellious nature were stuck up, but the authors cannot as yet be produced, notwithstanding the strictest search has been made, in order to find out the ringleaders of such a dangerous combination.

As the nobility are greatly divided amongst themselves, it is greatly to be feared, that these tumults are fomented by the disaffected parties.

Stockholm, Sept. 15. The directors or superintendants of the trade and commerce of this kingdom, having for some years past used their utmost endeavours to render their na-

vigation to the East-Indies as flourishing as possible, are determined to extend their views, and do all that in their power lies, in conjunction with France, to carry it even into America.

Amsterdam, October 2. A deputy from their high mightinesses sat at the court of directors of the West India company held this day, in order to deliberate upon the method which must be made use of, for presenting to his serene highness the prince stadholder, the diploma of governor-general of the West-Indies, and of the colonies thereto dependent; as also upon the dividend which is proper to be made upon the actions of the said company.

Extract of a Letter from Hamburg, Sept. 13.

The late frequent conferences of Mr. Tidey with the ministers of Denmark, turned on the project of the English to establish a fishery in the Croadick [Orkney] isles, and particularly Schetland. The court of Denmark pretends, that the English have no right of navigation in those seas, to the exclusion of the subjects of Denmark; but that on the contrary, these last possess that exclusive right, seeing those isles belong properly to the kingdom of Norway.

Extract of a Letter from Naples, Aug. 28. 50.

" For some days past we have been in a continual alarm at the news, that a squadron of eleven Algerine xebecques was cruising within a league of this capital, of which the commandant's vessel was of 40 guns and 500 men, four of 30 guns and about 350 men, and the six others from 18 to 24 guns and at least 250 men; which squadron was not supposed to be come into these seas, without a design of executing some great project: And we learn by an English captain, who arrived here last Monday from Tunis, that having been met by the chief of the said squadron, named Agi Mouria (and who formerly belonged to our galleys), and detained by him two entire days, he had, during that time, discover'd that the corsairs intended to attempt some enterprise of éclat, and that the commandant with his vessel only, had been in the night to reconnoitre the island of Procida, in order to know whether the king was, or would be there, to take the diversion of hunting pheasants, as his majesty is accustomed to do in this season. The arrival of this corsair in our seas has occasioned such an alarm, that for three days the inhabitants have abstained from going to take the fresh air on the sea coast, which is so agreeable at this time, for fear of being surprized by the Algerines. The government has taken divers precautions on this head, having sent detachments of troops into the castles and small neighbouring isles, and reinforced all the posts. Many light vessels have been sent out to watch their motions, and as they have not been seen for these two days, 'tis supposed the Barbarians have retired: Those many think, that as the weather will probably continue favourable a month longer in these parts, Agi Mouria will defer his retreat to Algiers, and, for want of better employment, amuse himself with taking on the coasts of this kingdom, and Sicily, all the merchant ships which fall in his way."

Extract of a Letter from the Hague, Sept. 23.

" Baron d' Aylva, appointed by their High mightinesses enjoy extraordinary to the court of Sweden, after having been 3 months preparing for his departure, has now put off his journey *sine die*, which occasions various speculations with respect to the affairs of the North, in which there is great likelihood that their high mightinesses will avoid taking any part, as far as is possible; the present system of the republic being only to concern themselves about their domestic interest, 'till such time as they are in a more flourishing condition; and that the rather, they not being able to give a helping hand, as they have hitherto done, towards maintaining that balance of power which has cost them so much blood and treasure, since the placing King William III. of glorious memory, upon the throne of Great Britain. So long as the republic forbears to send a mil-

hither to Stockholm, he will not be embarrassed by being drawn into treaties which are negotiating on all hands, and 'tis for that reason M. Van Haren has been told he may put off his journey for some time, perhaps it may not take place at all. If it be true that count Bentinck will be absent five or six months. But this is a secret which will not immediately, with any certainty, be unravell'd. Notwithstanding all the pains taken by the prince his master, be otherwise, as before the condition of the Republic to that power and figure they were in both before and since the peace of Utrecht.

The deposed magistrates continue to have great influence over the public affairs, and the government of which are many of their relations, friends, and creatures, to whom they were great benefactors during the time they were in power. They have weight enough either to divide the assembly of the States of particular provinces, or that of the States general; by which they are so much embroiled, that many things which have been near a twelvemonth under consideration remain undetermined.

The provinces were debolent in the payment of their respective quotas into the public treasury, at the time of the elevation of his serene highness to the said Holkeriship, and they continue still to be in arrear, so that the council of state is enable to supply the military chest, inasmuch that there are fifteen or eighteen months pay due to many of the regiments. 'Tis impossible, under our present circumstances, even to think of repairing the fortifications, much less to fill the magazines with necessary provisions and stores.

A short ESSAY ON GAMING. By an intelligent Gentleman.
WE shall not here consider the actions of men, as they are the children of divine providence, but only take a cursory view of the power and activity of human reason, in the quick apprehension and laying hold of proper opportunities, in order to discover how far outward circumstances may conduct to the raising a man's fortune: In the framing of which, we must take care to provide proper materials, before we begin to erect the structure. If we do not first prove the goodness and intrinsic worth of our design, upon the touchstone of wisdom and prudence; if we do not conceive honest intentions and noble ends; all our endeavours will be vain and fruitless; we shall only build a *Babel* of confusion, a lasting monument of our own ignorance and infelicity! For there is as much difference between action and meditation, as between dreams and things really perform'd; the one has only the appearance of things communicated to their understanding; the other has the knowledge of every particular, by the guide of experience. Hence, therefore, it is evident, that to act without prudent forecast, or premeditation, is to throw ourselves entirely upon chance; and, as it were, to jump into the river with our eyes open, regardless of the eventual danger, and not so much as looking out to see if any boat lies near to come to our assistance!

Now, among all the follies and vices of the age we live in, there is not one which shews the want of this discretion to much as to venture our sustenance upon the turn of a card, or the chance of a dye; which, it is next to an impossibility to foresee, without being guilty of fraud, or delusion, and running the hazard of a goal, or of the pillory. Nor is there any practice more detrimental to society, more prejudicial to trade and business, or productive of more pernicious consequences, than the *sick* of gaming; for, how can it be imagin'd, that a person who is infected with this malady, should have the least regard for the welfare of the community, when his heart is beat upon plunder, his eyes is blinded by the infinite lust of avarice, and all his thoughts and desires terminate in that one object? This goads him on to corrupt the innocent, to inveigle the unwary, to forfeit his word, and absolutely to disavow his conscience; hoping, by these fatal means, to be able to rifle the pockets of his companions, to enrich himself with the spoil, and so indulge his sensual appetite.

We are not ignorant, that some who have run headlong into this error, are not to plead, in abatement of their own guilt, the vain hopes of advancing their fortune, or making a short cut to the abundance of riches; but, like the dog in the fable, by catching at the shadow, they have lost the substance. How much more prudent had they been, to have observed how Solomon reprehends this immature access of wealth? An *admonition* says he, *may be gotten before at the beginning, but the end thereof shall not be blessed*. Some again, grow desperate by continual losses, and reduced to extreme want and poverty, have turned from gaming to thieving, for the immediate support of themselves and their families; till at length detected,

and condemned to exile or the gibbet, they have received the just reward of their villainy.

In short, a *garnish table* is the school of iniquity, where all the vices of the age are taught and practis'd; the temple Lucifer, in which immorality and prophaneness, drunkenness and debauchery, cheating and lying, rapine and murder, have their place of residence; nor can any man enter, without great danger of infection: But, what is still worse, the dissenter is of such a malignant nature, that however his *conscience* may catch it, remains incurable, for there is not one in a thousand that ever recovers. Age and experience, time and reflection, have in some cases reform'd numbers, and turn'd them aside from their favorite vices. The debonair, who has been maimed in the services of Bacchus and Venus, is very apt, on retrospection to censure his past conduct, and will often retire to repent of his folly; but the gambler's stars, increase his malady, age adds to his avarice, and though often ill and bedridden, he continues to follow the *field games*, fortune till his hands and eyes fail him, or death puts an end to vain pursuit.

H. useful Machine the Press, I have made it my Busi-

ness diligently to search the Writings of the Learned, in order to collect whatever has been said in Praise of Printers, and their noble Arts; and having found the following Observations, in an Author of great Learning and Reputation, I send them to you, that for the Honour of Printers, you may communicate them to the Public.

We are told by Antiquarians, that the first Printing House in England was set up in a Chapel of Westminster Abbey; therefore that Part of the House where a Printer keeps his Press, has ever since been called a Chapel.

If a Printer therefore sets up in a House, where never any Printer worked before, that Part of the House where the Press is erected is *consecrated*; which Ceremony is performed, at the Master's Command, by the *junior Freeman*, or *Father of the Chapel*. It is performed by drinking *Succa* to the Master, sprinkling the Walls with Strong-Beer, and singing the *Credo*, and the whole Solemnity is concluded with a Supper given by the Master.

THE Workmen in a Printing House, are called *Chapelians*, and are obliged to submit to certain wise Laws, framed for the Good of the Company, and for regularly carrying on the Master's Work; to each of these Laws is annexed a Penalty, which, if a *Chapelion* refuses to pay, upon any transgression, there is assembled a general Convocation, who determine whether he is to remain any longer a *Chapelion*; and if it is carried against him by a Majority of Voices, he is immediately *excommunicated*, and declared a *Brisbane*, whence he is deprived of his Share of any Premium given by Booksellers, and Gentlemen Authors, to make the *Chapelions* drink; and is also excluded from the grand anniversary Solemnity, commonly called the *May-Gate-Fest*: Nor can he, in such a State, have any Redress for any *waggish Trick*, or *Mischief*, offered to him; which soon makes him glad to pay the Penalty, and a discretionary Fine besides, to reconcile himself to the *Chapel*.

WHEN a Boy is bound an Apprentice to a Printer, before he is admitted to the honourable Degree of a *Chapelion*, he must be made a *Care*, or *Deacon*; which is done in the following Manner: The *Chapelions* walk thrice round the Room, with their Right Arms under the Lappets of their Coats, the Boy who is to be made a *Care* carrying a wooden Sword before them; then the Boy kneels, and the *Father of the Chapel* exhorts him to be mindful of his Business, and not to discover the Secrets and *Mysteries* of the Trade, squeezes a Spunge of Strong-Beer on his Head, and gives him the noble Title of *Duke* of some Place of the least Repute near the Printer's Dwelling-House; *viz.* *Duke of the Dunghill*, or the *Hog-sye*, or the *Little House*; or, in case he lives near any Lane, *Alley*, or *Dock*, with such like Appellations as the following, he is styled *Duke of Thuringham*, *Piffing-Alley*, or *Puddle-Dock*. This noble Title being conferred, the venerable *Father of the Chapel* tells the Boy of the Safety he will enjoy, by being a *Care*; that is, how no considerable Damage can follow, should any Accident befall him; such as his tumbling from a Steeple or Tower, or dropping into the River; or pat the Cais, that a Pile-Pot, Pot and all, should be discharged upon his Head.

When the Boy is thus upon his Knees, the *Chapelions*, with their right Arms a cross the Lappets of their Coats, walk round him, and sing the *Care's Anthem*, which is done in a mu-

fical Tone of Voice, by adding all the Vowels to the Consonants, as follows:

The CUZY ANTHEM.

B A, Ba.
B E, Be, Ba-be.
B I, Bi, Ba-be bi.
B O, Bo, Ba-be bi bo.
B U, Bu, Ba-be bi bo-bu.
C a, Ca.
C e, Ce, Ca ce.
C i, Ci, Ca ce-ci.
C o, Co, Ca ce-ci co.
C u, Cu, Ca ce-ci eo cu.

AND so proceeding through the rest of the Consonants.

THESE, besides a great many other decent Solemnities, are sufficient to shew the Sacredness of a Printing Office: What Reverence then ought we to have, for a Plate consecrated in so awful a Manner? a Manner, which tho' the Ignorant and Profane may look upon as trifling and putrid, yet, in itself carries many important and significant Symbols: Symbols, every whit as significant as those exhibited in other Consecrations and Initiations; and I hope the Noble Orders of the *Garter* and *Bath* will not take snuff, if we affirm, that their Symbols and Ceremonies are just as significant as theirs: and some others too, which we could name, but we are cautious of giving Offence, or laying a Foundation for endless Controversy; yet notwithstanding all this, how often have the Walls of these sacred Chapels been profaned, and their Immunities been violated with Impunity, by a Parcel of Ruffians, who have made no Scruple to break open the *Sanctum Sanctorum* by mere Force and Violence, and to destroy the sacred Utensils; to drag away the very Priests officiating at the Altars, even with Pistols cock'd at their Heads, pretending to accuse them of Treason, Sedition, Infidelity, Atheism, and such like sham Charges: This surely is Sacrilege of the deepest Dye, and ought to be punished in the highest Manner; but alas! we live in a profane Age, when every Thing sacred is turned into Mockery and Ridicule, and trod under Foot; and the MYSTERIES OF PAINTING, like some *Mysteries in Religion*, are become the Objects of Derision and Contempt.

P R I S, September 18.

THE Abbé Aubert de Vedanur Meiss has invented a curious and admirable instrument, which he calls a forenoon anerometer, by which elegant contrivance, without the assistance of weight, pulleys, or wheels, and without any care taken of it, all the alterations of the weather, as to the heat and moisture of the air, winds, mists, &c. are perpetually predicted, with far greater certainty than by the barometer; and this by a kind of music, agreeable to the ear, which may also be adjusted as to answer a variety of purposes for pleasure and amusement, as it will play continually, if left to itself, but may be stopped at pleasure.

An Extract of a Letter from a Justice Minister at Lisbon, dated August 13.

The King of Portugal has really declared himself in favour of the propositions that have been made to him by the court of Spain, which was, to join in the armament preparing against the coast of Barbary; and orders have been given to them used of war to put to sea and ordain at the entrance of

the Straights, towards the coast of Algarves, and afterwards to enter the Mediterranean, in order to join the Spanish squadron. The ships which are to compose it are every day sailing out of the port of Malaga, Cartagena, Barcelona, and Majorca, one by one, in order to repair to the rendezvous. The states of Italy have promised to join this armada with their galleys and some frigates and armed rebecks; and very probably will be commanded by a Spanish admiral. Beware of a division upon that head. The republic of Venice will however content itself with cruising in the Adriatic gulf and towards the Archipelago.

As for France and Great Britain, which the above mention'd powers were in hopes would have entered into the confederacy, there is very little room to think that they will comply with the instances of the ministers from Spain, Portugal, Genoa, &c. the interest of the trading subjects of these powers, as well as those of the Dutch, clash, with that of the subjects of the Italian states; and the more the corsairs interrupt the navigation of the Mediterranean, the greater advantage will accrue to the English and Dutch merchants. The Italians nevertheless flattered themselves, that the court of London would have interest in the quarrel by way of revenge, because of the insult given by the Algerines to the English flag, because of the taking of the prince Frederick packet boat. Besides that, it's very much doubted, whether the Maltese and Portuguese will act any otherwise than by tea, unless the Spaniards, will permit them to share in the conquests. The Portuguese are not desirous that the Spaniards shou'd become more powerful on the coast of Africa, and the Maltese ought not to wish the total ruin of the corsairs in the Mediterranean, where there would then be no more occasion, for their caravans.

B O S T O N, November 20.

A few days ago an ox was kill'd in a slaughter-house in this town, one of whose thighs had a bunch or swelling upon it about the place commonly called the Pope's Eye, and upon opening it, there was taken thence a lump or rather cake of hard solid suet, which weighed twenty two pounds, and has been viewed by a great number of curious persons. 'Tis thought an account of this uncommon and unusual production will be sent to the Royal-Society, it being esteemed a greater curiosity than many that have been communicated to that body of learned gentlemen.

December 4. The following letter from the Cape Sable Indians, to his excellency governor Cornwallis, was brought hither by a vessel lately arrived from Halifax; viz.

S. I. R.

T H E place where thou art, the place where thou dost lodge, the place where thou dost fortify; the place where thou thinkest to establish, the place thou desirest to make thyself master of; that place is mine.

I am sprung from this land as doth the graft; I that am a Savage am born there, and my fathers before me. This land is mine inheritance, I swear it is; the land which God hath given to be my Country for ever.

I tell thee plainly the thoughts of my heart concerning thee; for the works thou makest at Chibucto, affords me subject of serious reflection.—My king and thy king have agreed among themselves, upon certain distribution of lands, and therefore are at present at peace; for my part, I can neither enter into an alliance, or make peace with thee.—Shew me where I, an Indian, can retire. 'Tis thou that chacest me; shew me where thou wilt that I take refuge. Thou hast taken possession of almost all this country, inasmuch that Chibucto is my last recourse; yet thou enstil me even that spot, thou wouldest drive me from that. This evinces me, that thou wilt oblige me never to cease making war against thee, and never to think of an alliance with thee.—Thou gloriest in thy great numbers.—For my part, who am a very small number, I cannot do better than trust in God, who must judge between us. The worm creeping, that creeps, knows how to defend itself when attacked; surely, savage as I am, am better than a worm, and must know how to defend myself when attacked. I shall come to see thee soon; yes, trust me, I will see thee.—I hope that what I shall hear from thy own mouth will afford me some comfort.—I greet thee well.

Signed, All the Savages of Isle Royal and Malibecumock, and Port Jaudoux, and St. Michael.

We have a report in town, that a ship from England is cast away on Nantucket shoals; and as one has for some time been expected from Bristol, it is fear'd she is the ship. It is said the people are all saved.

December 11. By a vessel which arrived here last Tuesday in six days from Chibucto, we have advice, that the people

there continue generally very healthy and cheerful, having either houses or comfortable huts to shelter them from the inclemency of the weather, in the winter season; as also plenty of provisions and fire-wood: And that at present they are mostly employed in clearing highways.

Extract of a Letter from Halifax in Nova Scotia, dated December 3, 1749.

"We had a most terrible passage of seventeen days from Boston. We were not above six hours from the long wharf, before some of our deck load was wash'd overboard; the third day we had a very hard gale at N. W. with snow, and a great sea, when our vessel wou'd not lie to, nor could we do anything with her, 'till we hove over the most part of the timber on deck: In the mean time the sea made a continual breach over us, wash'd away our binacle and compasses, rails, oar, and every thing that was not lash'd fast on deck, fill'd our cabin and steerage with water, and it was with difficulty we kept ourselves on deck. In short we had nothing but continual storms and gales of wind for the whole time, and often ready to sink with ice and snow on our decks, which would employ all hands for a whole day before we could stir a rope; and now we are got in, it blows and snows, and the weather is so bad, that 'tis impossible to land our goods as yet. We could take ketle on deck but three times the whole passage."

Philadelphia, December 19.

Last week died here Mr. Thomas Godfrey, who had an uncommon genius for all kinds of Mathematical learning, with which he was extremely well acquainted. He invented the New Reflecting Quadrant now used in navigation.

A N N A P O L I S.

Last Monday evening, as Alexander Knight, an Overseer of Mr. Bordley's, was driving home his Cart from Town, accidentally run over him; and bruised him so much, that he died soon after.

On Wednesday last arrived here the Ship Britannia, Capt. Linley, in about 8 Weeks from Bristol, with 80 Transports. He has brought no late Papers; but says there was much talk of another War.

We hear from several Parts of the County, of a Sicker, which some call the Winter Fever, that carries off great Numbers. It has been very rise in Cecil County, St. Mary's County, and on Kent Island; in which last-mention'd Place, near 40 People have died in a short Time.

We hear from Cecil County, that a Woman is in Goal there, on Suspicion of being concerned with her Servant Man in the Murder of her Husband.

Last Saturday, being the Anniversary of the Birth-Day of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the Wife of the Printer of this Paper was happily delivered of a Son, who will be baptiz'd by the Name of FREDERICK.

MOSCOW, September 9.

ER Imperial majesty has presented lord Hyndford with her picture set in diamonds, valued at 12,000 Rubles. Last Friday a grand council was held in the empress's presence, at which the senate, all the great officers of state, the ministers for foreign affairs, together with the great council of war, and the college of the admiralty, assisted; in which, 'tis said, some favourable resolutions were taken with regard to the peace in the North. Her Imperial majesty having notified to the senate her resolution of returning soon to Petersburg. Orders have been issued to the whole court to hold itself in readiness to set out on the first notice.

Madrid, Sept. 16. Orders have been sent to all the ports of this kingdom, for keeping the navy upon a better footing than it was during the late reign.

Copenhagen, Sept. 16. Two deputies from the duke of Saxe-Hildburghausen were admitted yesterday to a private audience of the king of Denmark, at which they presented a letter, formally demanding the princess Louisa in marriage for the duke their master.

Amsterdam, October 2. A deputy from their high mightinesses assisted at the court of directors of the West India company held this day, in order to deliberate upon the method which must be made use of, for presenting to his serene highness the prince stadholder, the Diploma of governor general of the West-Indies and of the colonies theron dependent; as also, upon the dividend which is proper to be made upon the actions of the said company.

Constantinople, August 22. The Porte is greatly concerned to hear that the bashaw of Rhodes has been arrested at Malta, as author or accomplice of the plot contrived in that island against the grand master and the knights of that order. This has been the more vexatious, as this bashaw is the son of a captain bashaw, one of the principal officers of the Ottoman empire, and besides very much esteemed at court. 'Tis assured that the grand vizir has spoken of this affair to the marquis de Desfœlours, ambassador from France, and that his excellency has wrote to his court about it.

From the Paris A la-main, October 10.

By letters received from Genoa bearing date the 20th of September last, we are informed, that advices were arrived there from Leghorn, intimating, that a considerable number of workmen were employed by orders from the court of Vienna, in removing all the valuable furniture out of the palace of the grand duke, where the governor general resides.

As the like orders have been issued out for the removal of the effects that are contained in all the country seats of the former grand dukes, those orders are the subject matter of some speculation amongst the connoisseurs.

The same advices, from Genoa assure us, in general, that they have heard from several masters of ships, that the island of Corica was in a state of peace and tranquility; but whether such intelligence was to be depended on, they could not absolutely determine, 'till they were rightly informed in what manner the new regulations which have been lately published there, have been received. 'Tis hoped, however, that they shall hear in a very short time, that they have met with a favorable reception.

Notwithstanding such hopes, there are some who pretend to know the temper of those islanders perfectly well, insinuating that the inhabitants will never live in subjection to the republic of Genoa, let the measures proposed be what they will.

There is a squadron of three Venetian men of war expected in that port, who are to sail for Gibraltar, in order to be on the cruise against the Barbary corsairs.

Paris, Sept. 8. The refusal which has lately been made of administering the sacraments to the late Sieur Coffin, has made so much noise in this capital, and in such manner divides the advocates and divines, that in spite of the rigorous Prohibition made by the king, in order to calm the minds of the people, and prevent an insurrection, which there seem'd to be some danger of, from the warmth which has been expressed on both sides on this subject, the feuds are still rancorously kept up. It is very much to be apprehended, that his majesty's zeal for preserving tranquility amongst the ecclesiastics and lawyers will not succeed, seeing there daily appear writings for and against this subject, and in such numbers, that the public is overwhelmed with them. It is, however, not doubted by some people here, but that the gentle means that have hitherto been made use of by the king will in time produce the effect which is expected from them. His majesty is not desirous of making use of any other method than what proceeds from mildness, believing it to be the speediest for remedying the present evil, foreseeing that the continuation of these domestic dissensions can not fail of being fatal to the most powerful city in this kingdom. There is indeed, an ordinance talk'd of, which, it is said, is immediately to appear on this subject, and which will condemn to a severe punishment all those who shall publicly enter into these disputes, whether advocates, or any other persons of what condition or character soever.

The news writers are again fixing the time of the departure of the infanta duchess of Parma, and now make it to be the 2d of October next. But as we have private intelligence, that ought to be rather credited than the public News papers, which assure us, that the demand of the Infanta for an augmentation of a pension has not yet been complied with at Versailles, one may consequently infer, that the departure of her royal highness will not take place so soon as has been published, she having directions not to come away till she has obtained an addition to the annual revenues of don Philip her consort.

LONDON.

August 28. Friday night several fellows were detected in picking of pockets in Bartholomew fair, and being delivered into the hands of the mob, underwent the discipline usual on such occasions; one of whom we hear is since dead, and two others are in danger of losing their lives, from the severe treatment of the populace.

Sept. 23. The right honourable the lord Anson will, 'tis said, be appointed one of the lords of his majesty's bedchamber.

Sept. 23. By letters from China, lately arrived at the court of Madrid, we are assured, that the four Spanish dominican friars, who were taken with one of their right rev. bishops of the same order, formerly put to death by the emperor's orders, having been sentenced to have their heads cut off, had been strangled with a bow string in their prison of Fochien, the capital of the province of Fodien on the 23d of October, 1748.

By advices of the 17th of December, in the year last mentioned, from Macoa, a city of the province of Canton in the empire of China, we hear further, that the fathers Anthony, Joseph, Hieriques, and Petitan of Arethys, all members of the society of Jesus, who have been loaded with chains in a dark dungeon, for having professed to promulgate christian tenents in that country; after undergoing the rack, in order to oblige them to renounce the truth, had been likewise strangled with a bow string, the sentence of their death having been first confirmed by the emperor's express commands.

Sept. 26. We have advices from Dusseldorf, that public prayers are put up in all the churches of the Palatinate, to beg of heaven to be preserved from the locusts; this dreadful plague having already travelled so far as the river Mayn.

October

October 6. We hear that a proclamation will speedily be publish'd for the meeting of the parliament on the 16th of November, to fit for the dispatch of business.

Yesterday a great quantity of ordnance stores were shipp'd on board a transpckt for Port-Mahon, on board of which several deserters from lord Harry Beauclerk's regiment of foot, lately gone thither, will embark for that garrison, in order to be tried by a general court martial. Several recruits, now in the Savoy, will also embark on board the said vessel.

Sept. 16. There is a project upon the carpet: for making a causeway from Liege to Cologn, by means whereof the merchandise and goods of England, which are landed at Ostend and Nieuport, may be sent directly into a great part of Germany.

We have advice from Carniola, that the town of Crainburg has been entirely reduced to ashes, being set on fire by vagabonds in three different places.

Sept. 18. We hear the land tax will be reduced next session of parliament to two shillings in the pound.

Wednesday se'ennight sailed from Portsmouth the Wasp sloop of war, bound to Dunkirk, having on board some dispatches for the court of France.

NEW YORK, December 4.

We have an account from Perth-Amboy, that on Tuesday evening last two seamen belonging to a Brig in that harbour, being at a tavern, one of them took occasion to boast of his bravery; which the other resenting a little, they agreed to walk out, and take a tryal at boxing; which having exercised a while, they were parted, and came in and drank friends, where the person who boasted of his strength, died in a few minutes after. We hear the other has since made off.

December 18. Monday last a very melancholly accident happened on board the brig Charming-Polly, Capt. Keteltas, in this harbour, as they were firing the minute guns at the funeral of Mrs. Provoost: A lad of about 15 years of age, apprentice to Capt. Riven, attended on the gunners, and standing near one of the guns with a cartridge of powder under his arm, the cartridge unhappily took fire, and shatter'd his right arm in a very terrible manner, burning and hurting many other parts of his body: His arm was oblig'd to be cut off, as also the thumb of the other hand, and he now lies in a poor condition, though in a fair way of recovering, much contrary to the opinion of all that saw him in his mangled condition. This ought to be a warning for people to take more care when they deal with those combustible matters.

ANNAPOLIS.

About a Fortnight ago, three Sailors belonging to the Ship Ogle, Capt. John Brown, going from Dorchester County in the Ship's Long-boat, loaded with Lumber, the Long boat filled, and they were all drowned.

A Gentleman in the hither Part of Virginia, writes, in a Letter of the 26th Instant, "We have had a very severe Winter, and a very great Mortality among the People; whole Families dying almost at the same Time."

By the following Instructions to the Gentlemen who represent this County in the Lower House of Assembly, (which is banded about here, and meets with a very good Reception,) the Public may see what Amendments our County think are necessary, in order to facilitate the Execution of our Inspection Law.

To NICHOLAS GOLDSBOROUGH,
ROBERT LLOYD,
JOHN GOLDSBOROUGH, and
EDWARD OLDFHAM,

WE the Freeholders of the County of Talbot, hereto sub-scriv'd, considering, That by Experience it hath been found, that the Act entituled, *An Act for amending the Staple of Tobacco, for preventing Frauds in his Majesty's Customs, and for Limitation of Officers Fees*, with the several Acts made in Supplement thereto, are in some Measure defective; and that the supplying of such Defects highly deserves the Attention of the Lower House of Assembly; and that it is the Duty of All, who are represented in it, to contribute as much as lies in their Power, towards the procuring such Amendments as appear necessary for securing all those Advantages of an Inspection Law, which, under proper Regulations, would naturally arise from it; Judge it our Duty, to recommend to you, our Representa-

tives, in the Lower House of Assembly, to use your stand Endeavours to procure the Enacting of the following Amendments.

First, That the Inspections be single; or, that Inspectors be obliged only to attend one House.

2dly, That no Person be allowed to bring to the Inspection-House any Quantity of Transfer Tobacco, in Cask, under Eight hundred, after the last Day of June.

3dly, That no Person be permitted to bring above one pound in a Year; and that the Inspectors may refuse any Parcel after the last Day of June.

4thly, That some Provision be made in the Case of a fit Inspector; as the present Method (of calling one from another Inspection) seems rather to shift than remedy the Inconveniency, as we have experienced in this County.

We take the Liberty earnestly to recommend these Things to you, hoping that the distressed Condition of the County, which loudly calls for such Regulations; the great Difficulty of getting Inspectors, to serve as the Law now stands; as well as the Sense and Opinion of those who have sent you to represent them; will readily determine you, both to concur in, and to promote as much as in you lies, the Enacting of them at the ensuing Assembly: And we do assure you, that it is not from any Distrust or Suspicion, that we have recommended these Things to you; but because we are persuaded that it will be agreeable to you, to know our Sentiments upon Matters so important to the Good of the Province in general, and of our own County in particular.
