### Patricia Jabbeh Wesley, Liberian Civil War Survivor

The FSU Center for Creative Writing will host a poetry reading by Liberian civil war survivor, poet and writer Patricia Jabbeh Wesley on



**Tuesday, April 24**, at 7:30 p.m. at the Lyric Theater, 20 E. Main St., in Frostburg.

Wesley is an anti-war and women's activist who immigrated to the United States in the 1990s. She is the award-winning author of four poetry books: "Where the Road Turns," "The River Is Rising," "Becoming Ebony" and "Before the Palm Could Bloom: Poems of Africa." Her awards include The Crab Orchard 2002, a World Bank Fellowship and three artist grants from the Kalamazoo Foundation and the Arts Council of Greater Kalamazoo in Michigan. In 2010, she won the Liberian Award, and in 2011, she was awarded the Blair County Barack Obama Presidential Award, both for her poetry. ### Marcellus Shale Roundtable Discussion

A discussion focusing on the science behind the pros and cons of drilling for natural gas in Marcellus Shale will be held on **Wednesday, April 25**, at 7 p.m. in Compton 327. **Dr. Robert Larivee**, a professor in FSU's Chemistry Department, and **Dr. Phillip Allen**, an assistant professor in the Geography Department, will speak. A panel discussion and question-and-answer session will follow. The event is free and open to the public.

Larivee focuses primarily on environmental issues. Working with the Maryland Department of Natural Resources, he established a laboratory at FSU to analyze coal and shale deposits in Western Maryland. Recently, his studies have centered on determining the possibilities of sequestering carbon dioxide on a long-term basis in abandoned Marcellus drill holes. He is also investigating procedures to extract methane from Marcellus Shale using supercritical fluids.

Allen is interested in many aspects of Earth science, particularly the Quaternary period. His main interest is geomorphic evolution of landscapes, especially in cold climate regions. Recently, he started a project to analyze the effects of salt pollution at FSU and in the surrounding area.

### Award-Winning Author and Educator Dr. Linda Griffin



Dr. Linda Griffin, a leading researcher in the way people teach and learn sport-related activities using a game-centered approach, will

speak at FSU as the 2012 Lillian Wellner Scholar on **Thursday, May 3**, from 9 a.m. to noon in the main arena of the Cordts PE Center. The event is free and open to the public.

Griffin has co-authored several articles and books, including "Teaching Sport Concepts and Skills: A Tactical Games Approach," which is becoming a third edition. Griffin has conducted workshops all over the world and is the recipient of the 2005 Physical Education Teacher Education Honor Award. She served in leading roles for the National Association for Sport and Physical Education Curriculum and Instruction Academy; American Alliance for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance Research Consortium; and the American Educational Research Association Special Interest Group in Physical Education. Griffin is the associate dean for academic affairs and a professor in the school of education at the University of Massachusetts-Amherst.

The Wellner Scholar Program was created from an endowment from the FSU Foundation, Inc., to allow the Department of Health, Physical Education and Recreation to host a series of lectures by nationally acclaimed scholars. It was named for the late Lillian Wellner, a former FSU registrar and physical education instructor.

born Bobby Ray Simmons was exposed to the best of both worlds, taking daily bus trips from the "burbs to the hood," and splitting his school years between attending magnet schools as well as the urban Columbia High School. These early adventures through these environments that he never really fit into forced Simmons to tune his ears to the many types of music that were out there.

"Rap wasn't my first exposure to music, but it definitely had the first impact on me," says B.o.B. "I was watching DMX, 2Pac, Biggie and then Eminem. Growing up, you see them breaking rules and want to do that. That's what made me turn from a fan to duplicate it and make my own."

B.o.B began experimenting with his new love for rap, and even became a member of a rap group called Da Clinic.

Starting his own career as a rapper at age 17, B.o.B performed a showcase at T.I.'s Club Crucial in spring 2006. In 2007 he released his debut single "Haterz Everywhere," immediately making him a name and face to remember. Even after his career came to a high point, B.o.B. expanded even more by tuning the world into the pop side of his musical talents, showcasing his keyboard, guitar and drum skills.

Each year librarians, educators, parents and students come to the campus to share their love of children’s literature and to learn more about successful ways to share that love with children.

The theme for the weekend will be “Bringing Dreams to Life.” David Wiesner, Pam Munoz Ryan, Peter Catalanotto and Judy Schachner will be the award-winning authors and illustrators headlining the event. Each of these writers has created children’s stories about bringing dreams to life.

Wiesner is a three-time Caldecott Award winner whose titles include “Flotsam,” “Art and Max,” “Tuesday” and “The Three Pigs.” Ryan is the author of more than 30 books for children and young adults. She has written “Esperanza Rising,” “The Dreamer,” “Riding Freedom,” “Hello Ocean” and “Tony Baloney.” Catalanotto has illustrated 42 picture books, including “Mr. Mumble,” “Emily’s Art,” “Matthew A.B.C.,” “Sleepsong,” “Dylan’s Day Out” and “Question Boy Meets Little Miss Know-It-All.” Schachner compiled the popular Skippyjon Jones book series. Her other works include “Willy and May,” “Mr. Emerson’s Cook” and “Grannyman.”

The agenda for the festival includes informative small-group sessions and large presentations offered in a personal and relaxed environment. Topics range from engaging children with literature to energizing students with innovative technology.

### FSU an AHA ‘Fit-Friendly Company’ for Fourth Year!

For the fourth year in a row, FSU has been recognized by the American Heart Association and Start! for maintaining its status as a “Gold-Level Start! Fit-Friendly Company.” This status puts FSU among an elite group of awardees and acknowledges the University’s efforts to promote and foster an institutional culture of health and physical activity in the workplace. FSU first received this award in March 2009.

The recognition by AHA acknowledges a year-long series of programs focusing on wellness, including many activities and events organized by FSU’s Office of Human Resources and CHILL (Creating Healthy, Informed, Lasting Lifestyles), a campuswide wellness initiative supported by a contribution from AstraZeneca Pharmaceuticals LP. Highlights from FSU’s efforts to promote wellness include several workshops with wellness and fitness expert Scott Cole, as well as campus walks and other activities focusing on exercise and stress management. FSU also added the AstraZeneca Fitness Center to its renovated Lane Center, which opened in spring 2011. Recognizing health problems associated with first- and secondhand smoke and wishing to provide a healthier environment for students, faculty, staff, alumni and visitors, FSU became smoke-free on Aug. 1, 2011.

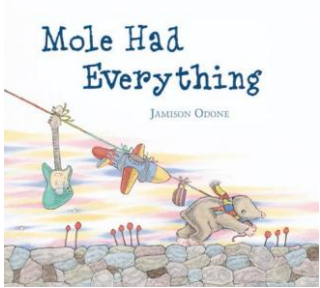
The Fit-Friendly Company Gold-Level award will help FSU become increasingly known as an institution committed to fostering wellness at the workplace and allow it to continue
