Election Night Viewing Party Draws Enthusiastic Crowd

FSU's Lane University Center Manicur Assembly Hall was a packed house on Election Night 2008, Nov. 4, where a bipartisan gathering of more than 300 students gathered to watch television coverage as election results rolled in, as well as to participate in a World Café discussion.

The gathering was part of FSU's Student Center for Volunteerism's 2007-2008 "Raise Your Vote" Voter Registration Campaign. It was also sponsored by the Office of Leadership and Civic Engagement, the University Programming Council and the Department of Student and Community Involvement.

The "Raise Your Vote" Voter Registration Campaign assisted nearly 600 people to register to vote or to request an absentee ballot for the general election. Another 170 people were assisted for the primary election. Over the course of the last four years, more than 1,200 voters were registered or helped to acquire an absentee ballot.

FSU student Corey Ryan coordinated "Raise Your Vote" this year and has been an active volunteer throughout his FSU career.

Jazz Master Heath Brings Quartet to FSU

Legendary jazz master and saxophonist Jimmy Heath will bring his style of jazz to Western Maryland on Saturday, Nov. 22, when the Jimmy Heath



Quartet comes to FSU. Presented by the CES Jazz Club and sponsored by Kauffman Music, the renowned quartet will perform in the Alice R. Manicur Assembly Hall in FSU's Lane University Center at 8 p.m.

Prior to the concert, Heath will lead a discussion on his ensemble's style of music and share his experiences in the jazz industry at an Arts Outreach session at 4:30 p.m. that is free and open to the public.

Recognized as a brilliant instrumentalist and magnificent composer and arranger, Heath, 81, began as a Charlie Parker disciple in the 1940s and made a leap from stylistic jazz by changing from alto saxophone to tenor and soprano sax. He has performed with nearly all the jazz greats of the last 50 years, from Howard McGhee, Dizzy Gillespie and Miles Davis to Wynton Marsalis. The jazz icon Gillespie said of him, "All I can say is, if you know Jimmy Heath, you know Bop."

During his career, Heath has performed on more than 100 record albums, including seven with the Heath Brothers and 12 as a leader. He has written more than 125 compositions, many of which have become jazz standards and have been recorded by other artists, including Art Farmer, Cannonball Adderley, Clark Terry, Chet Baker, Miles Davis, James Moody, Milt Jackson, Ahmad Jamal, Ray Charles, Dizzy Gillespie, J. J. Johnson and Dexter Gordon.

After having just concluded 11 years' service as professor of music at the Aaron Copland School of Music at Queen College, Heath maintains an extensive performance schedule and continues to conduct workshops and clinics throughout the United States, Europe and Canada.

Volcanologist to Speak at National Geography Awareness Week Event

Volcanologist Dr. Michael Ryan will present the keynote address at FSU's celebration of National Geography Awareness Week with an illustrated talk describing "Plate Tectonics, Volcanism and the Earth's Interior" on **Wednesday, Nov. 19**, at 7 p.m. in Compton Science Center Room 226.

Ryan recently retired from the U.S. Geological Survey with over 25 years of service as a research volcanologist and research hydrologist. He earned his doctoral degree at Pennsylvania State University, was a post-doctoral research fellow at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C., and was assistant professor of geology and geophysics at the University of Hawaii and the Hawaii Institute of Geophysics at Manoa (Honolulu), Hawaii.

His research interests include magma migration mechanics and the fracture flow of hydrothermal fluids in active and ancient volcanic centers. He has conducted theoretical and field studies in active volcanic centers in Japan, Iceland, Hawaii and the High Cascades of Washington and Oregon. He is currently conducting research in the Mesozoic basins of eastern North America aimed at a reconstruction of the links between regional tectonics and magmatism. He is a fellow of the Geological Society of America and the Geological Society of London. In 2008, he started the Magma Physics Project in Hilo, Hawaii.

His presentation is sponsored by the Department of Geography, the Geography Club and Gamma Theta Upsilon, the International Geographical Honorary Society, at FSU.
