Administration Reorganizes

Effective this semester, the academic administration of FSC will be reorganized. According to President Guild, the reorganization is a response to the college's growing size and complexity, the need for expedience in communication both among the various departments and between these depts and the administration, and the need for "closer and more effective management and articulation" of the instructional program. Further, the reorganization enables the Vice-President and Dean of the College, Dr. Kenneth Jablon, to devoted more time to "planning, analysis, and issues of institutional and segmental concern."

Three Schools have been established, each of which incorporates roughly one-third of the faculty. The departments are grouped into Schools according to "traditional lines of broad academic affinity," and each School is headed by a newly appointed Dean. These Deans receive information from the academic dept heads, then synthesize and interpret some of the information before relaying it to the administration.

The School of Arts and Humanities comprises the departments of Art and Art Education, Communication Media, English, Foreign Languages and Literature, Music and Music Education, Philosophy, and Speech Communication and Theatre. The Dean of this School is Dr. Don Smith, former head of the English Department.

The School of Natural and Social Sciences comprises the departments of Biology, Chemistry, Computer Science, Economics, Geography, Mathmatics, Physics, Political Science, Psychology, and Sociology. The Dean of the School is Dr. James Cotton, former head of the Geography Dept.

The School of Professional Studies, headed by Dr. Ronald Kealy, comprises the departments of Accounting, Business Administration, the Center for Management Development, Education, Health, Physical Education, and Recreation, and Military Science.

The Graduate School will continue to function as an "academic entity" under the supervision of Dr. Paul Lyons. the Dean of the Graduate School. Two new positions have also been established: the Dean of the General Education Program will be Dr. Joseph Malak, who will continue to supervise the Special Instructional Programs; the Staff Dean for Academic Services will be Mr. Paul Trichel.

The administration does not envision any departure from the current governmental structure, which involves the College Forum, College Senate, and most committees. The administration hopes the net effect of this administrative shuffle will be a gain in productivity, effectiveness, and educational quality.

National

Α spanish-speaking man, wielding a bottle of unidentified liquid and threatening to set the plane on fire, hijacked a Tampa bound Eastern Airlines jet to Cuba on Saturday.

The hijacker took control of the plane an hour after takeoff from John F. Kennedy Airport in New York.

The plane touched down at Jose Marti Airport in Havana at 11:52 a.m. at which time Cuban authorities took the hijacker into custody and released the plane. This is the eighth U.S. plane to be hijacked to Cuba since August 10.

After hearing an hour of testimony, regarding the exhumation of the remains of Lee Harvey Oswald, Judge James F Wright adjourned his court to consider the case further.

Wright made no indication as to how he would rule on the case. The judge aslo made no mention as to when he would hand down his ruling on whether the burial site would be opened.

The controversy surrounding the case stems from reports of a British author who believes that a Soviet "look alike" agent and not Oswald is buried in the Fort Worth, Texas grave.

New York Air, a brand new airline created by Texas Air Inc., has proposed a plan in which it will offer flight service between Washington and New York for as little as \$29.

New York Air officials said that they are hoping the new lower rates will offer serious competition to Eastern Airlines which has a virtual monopoly on the well travelled Washington-New York route.

The Civil Aeronautics Board and the Federal Aviation Administration must approve the proposed service before it can go into effect. Both agencies are expected to grant their approval which means air service will begin on December 14.

As many as 100 people, including judges and legislators, could be indicted in the weeks to come as the United States Attorneys Office continues its investigation of one of the largest scandals in recent history.

The scheme, having to do with altered real estate assessments, has been said to involve \$33 million in fraudulent reductions in real estate assessments.

Fourteen people have been indicted so far in the case, five of which are former Chicago city officials.

Yearbook? ... December, Maybe?

If you ordered a yearbook last year, don't expect to receive it until the middle of December.

Bruce Banner, editor of the 1981 Nemacolin, was notified, by the Taylor Publishing Company, that the 1980 book could not be delivered before December 11th, provided it was finished by September 13th. If the book is finished any later than the 13th, a much later delivery date can be expected.



When Banner returned this year, in addition to finding a staff for the 1981 yearbook, he had to find a staff to complete last year's book. With less than a week remaining, to meet the deadline of the 13th, there are still 10-15 pages remaining to be completed.

When the 1980 book is finished, the staff will turn its full attention to planning and completing the '81 book. With the last staff and book as an example, Banner has no intentions of letting delays affect the next yearbook.



Did you Know that there are two full-time chaplains available for service at FSC? Yes, there are! Everyone, certainly freshmen, ought to be aware that Rev. Larry Neumark is the Protestant Chaplain and Fr. Kieran Fergus is the Catholic Chaplain. Both are very anxious to meet students, especially new ones.

The United Campus Ministry (UCM) building, the Osborne Center, is located on Loop Road, across from the back of the Fine Arts Building. Although it looks like a private house, it is very much a public placeand you should have no fear or reservations about coming over just to look around. There is no need to ring the bell or knock on the door. Just come in! It is open virtually all the time (Fr. Fergus has living quarters on the second floor). You can relax in the lounge, listen to the stereo or watch television, study in the library or even make a snack in the kitchen.


The two chaplains provide the thrust of UCM. Larry Neumark is a United Methodist minister and Father Fergus is a Dominican priest. Both are experienced counselors, ecumenical in spirit and involved in various dimensions of campus life. An advisory board for UCM is composed of students, faculty, administrators, local clergy and town people and they meet once a month to plan goals and evaluate directions.

Group meeting once a week in the Osborne Center-Thursday evenings at 7:00 p.m. Programs include films, special speakers, Bible sharing and parties.

"Cosmic Capers" is a chatty week-by week description of events taking place over your head.

Week of Sept. 8th--14th

Late this week, the moon makes a return appearance to the evening sky; weather permitting, you should be able to spot a slender crescent low in the western dusk on Thursday. This first sighting of the moon also signals Rosh Hasbanah, the first day of Jewish New Year 5741 A.M. (A.M. stands for year of the world). The Jewish calander is based on the moon's monthly cycle of phases and uses the fact that 19 years contain 235 lunar cycles.

"Children of the Stars," a science fiction account of our first encounter with aliens is being presented at the Frostburg State College Planetarium each Tuesday evening at 7:30 and each Sunday afternoon at 1:30 and 2:30. These free public showings are in the front lobby of Tawes Hall and last about 45 minutes. September 15-21

This week the moon grows to first quarter by mid-week, passing through the star group of Scorpius, Sagittarius and Capricornus. Only the orange planet Mars remains in the evening sky; both Jupiter and Saturn are close to the sun, and therefore invisible.

High in the eastern evening sky is the Great Square, an important stellar landmark for navigators. Facing east, this figure is tilted, resembling a diamond. Off the left side of the diamond is a string of stars that makes up the star group Andromeda. Above the middle star in this string is a fainter trail of stars that leads to a faint smudge of light. This "smudge" is a giant sister galaxy-the most distant object visible to the eye at a distance of 2 million light years.

The Frostburg State College Planetarium is now featuring "Children of the Stars", a science fiction program that details the development of life on the earth as seen by aliens. Free public showings are each Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. and each Sunday at 1:30 and 2:30 p.m. in the front lobby of Tawes Hall.

Wait until you see someone with a key that belongs to the dorm, and then ask the person if you can be a guest.






