Ruble to Present Talk on Russia at FSU

Blair A. Ruble, director of the Kennan Institute for Advanced Russian Studies of the Woodrow Wilson Center in Washington, D.C., and program director for Comparative



Urban Studies at the Woodrow Wilson Center, will present his talk "Diversity in the Contemporary Russian City" **Wednesday, Feb. 10**, at 7:30 p.m. in Dunkle 218.

Ruble has edited a dozen volumes and is the author of five monographic studies. His most recent monographic study – "Creating Diversity Capital" – examined the changes in such cities as Montreal, Washington, D.C., and Kyiv (Kiev) brought about by the recent arrival of large trans-national communities.

Ruble's talk is sponsored by the Martha T. and Ralph M. Race Western History Lecture Series funded through the FSU Foundation under the auspices of the Department of History.

Works on Paper by FSU Alum Shaffer to Be on Display at FSU



"On Second Thought: Recent Works on Paper," an exhibition featuring work by FSU alumnus *Sam Shaffer*, will be on display in the Stephanie Ann Roper Gallery. The exhibition will open on **Friday**, **Feb. 5**, with an opening reception from 7 to 9 p.m. The show will be on display **through Wednesday**, **Feb. 24**.

The collection features Recent Works on Paper as the basis for Shaffer's upcoming show, which are a broad representation of the works he has made over the past year. In this series, Shaffer has used scraps and images found on the floor or in some box. He has cut them out, pasted them together, moved them around, then moved them around some more. Combining drawing, spray paint and collage, he has made something free flowing and has looked for gestures even awkward ones - that lead somehow from one image to the next. The images are emotional ones of circus scenes, artist friends, selfportraits and family portraits sometimes ugly, sometimes beautiful but always displaying motion, colors and textures and the touch of the hand on paper.

Shaffer graduated from FSU in 1978. He received a master's degree in fine arts (printmaking) from the Pratt Institute. He is a winner of the Liquatex Excellence in Art Award.

Nominated six times for a Pushcart Prize, her poems have appeared in numerous journals, including "Southern Review," "Hunger Mountain," "Crab Orchard," "Spoon River" and "Passages North," where she won the 2009 Elinor Benedict Poetry Prize. She was awarded a grant from the San Francisco Arts Commission and a residency from Hedgebrook. Sweeney holds a master's in fine arts from Vermont College and serves as assistant editor for "DMQ Review."

Center for Creative Writing to Hold Playwriting Workshop

The FSU Center for Creative Writing will host a 10-week playwriting workshop with local award-winning playwright Ty DeMartino. Sessions will begin on Feb. 11 and will be held on Thursday nights, starting at 7 p.m. at the center at 22 E. Main St. in Frostburg.

The workshop is open to novice and established playwrights who want to learn more about the craft and the art of writing for the stage. Participants will go over such topics as how to tell strong stories in a theatrical setting, create memorable characters and write natural-sounding dialogue. Over the 10 weeks, participants will develop their own play ideas and receive feedback and quidance from DeMartino and their fellow workshop participants.

A resident of Frostburg, DeMartino's plays have appeared on stages from Hollywood to off-Broadway in New York City and the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. In 2007, he was named Best Playwright of the Year by the "Baltimore City Paper" for his political piece "The Blessed Mothers of War," and in 2008, his family drama "Finding Fossils" was honored as Best Production of the Baltimore Playwrights Festival. Over the past decade, he has been recognized by the Maryland States Arts Council with three Individual Artist Awards. Currently, DeMartino is working on two dramas for the stage - "Cluttered," a play about hoarding disorders, and "The Darling Siblings," a story about children dealing with the murder of a family member. Both plays are being workshopped for possible productions in 2010. In addition, he serves as the head writer for Reel Movie Kids, an initiative to train and showcase young actor-comedians.

The cost for the 10-week workshop is \$100 per person, with partial proceeds benefiting the FSU Center for Creative Writing. For info or to

Be Heart Smart This February

According to the Centers for Disease Control, heart disease is the leading cause of death in the United States. Lack of physical activity can lead to heart disease at any age. CHILL wants FSU to increase its heart health this month by staying active despite these frigid temperatures.

From Feb. 1 to March 1, CHILL will host a "Be Heart Smart" program to encourage Bobcats to keep track of their daily fitness activities by using the American Heart Association's Start! program. This free online program will allow participants to join the FSU network and document the frequency and intensity of aerobic exercise.

Every participant is a winner! Each participant who accurately documents weekly required exercise, i.e., 2.5 hours a week of moderate-level aerobic exercise, will be eligible to receive a free CHILL T-shirt. This program is open to students, faculty and staff.

The Biggest Loser Returns to FSU

CHILL is bringing its "The Biggest Loser on Campus" program back to campus for the second year in a row.

"The Biggest Loser on Campus" is designed to promote student wellness by encouraging increased participation in aerobic activities and health programs on campus. During this two-month program, teams of four will be awarded points for completing tasks that aim to improve participants' overall well-being, including meeting with personal trainers, submitting nutritional analyses and engaging in campus programs.

This program rewards campus engagement and self-awareness, not weight loss. However, past participants noted that their shrinking waistlines were a benefit of their new diet, exercise and stress management techniques. In spring 2009, the top three teams lost a combined total of 114 pounds, and each accumulated multiple participation points by being involved in campus blood drives and

walking in the annual Relay for Life event.

Infant/Preschool & Youth Swim Classes

An infant/preschool swimming class for children ages 3 to 36 months and a

youth swimming class for children ages 4 to 12 years will be offered Mondays and Wednesdays, Jan. 25 through Feb. 10, in the Cordts PE Center. The infant/preschool class will be held from 5:30 to 6 p.m. and the youth class will be from 6 to 6:50 p.m.

The infant/preschool class requires parents to be in the water with their children. Parents and children participate in water exploration activities with the objective of having fun and becoming comfortable in, on and around the water.

Youth swimming instruction is separated into skill levels based on the child's swimming ability when enrolling in the class.

Tumbling Classes

Various tumbling classes will be offered for children ranging in age from 3 and up, all held in Cordts PE Center Room 170.

The Preschool classes are for children ages 3 to 4 and are limited to 12 participants who have little or no formal tumbling training. (Children should preferably be potty-trained.) They will be conducted Tuesdays, **Jan. 26 to April 6**, from 4:30 to 5 p.m. The class will include activities such as cartwheels, rolls and other simple movements. It is designed to teach flexibility, strength, muscle control and coordination. This is a parent/child class, and an adult must participate with each child.

The Beginner classes are for children ages 5 to 12 and are limited to 15 participants with a minimum of 7. They will be conducted Tuesdays, **Jan. 26 to Feb. 23**, from 5 to 6 p.m. The class will include basic floor tumbling exercises and some work on the low balance beam.

The Intermediate/Advanced classes are for all ages, with prerequisites including a round-off and a kick-over from a bridge (back walk-over). Classes are limited to 12 participants with a minimum of 6 and will be held on Tuesdays, Jan. 26 to Feb. 23, from 6 to 7 p.m.

Water Aerobics

Water Aerobics classes will be offered on Tuesdays and Thursdays, Jan. 26 to Feb. 25, from 6 to 6:50 p.m. at the FSU pool in the Cordts PE Center. Participants may register for Tuesday or Thursday classes, or both evenings for a discounted price.
